S. NEUMEGEN DEAD.

Death Comes Suddenly Saturday After Short Illness.

The death of S. Neumegen occurred Saturday at 11:50 a. m. after an illness of just about a day. Mr. Neumegen had suffered an attack of indigestion the early part of last week, but had apparently fully recovered, and Thursday night appeared in usual good health and spirits. Friday he was again taken severely ill, his malady being pronounced acute indigestion, and his condition was at once recognized as serious. Saturday morning he had two hemorrhages, and death came as a merciful relief from his sufferings. His wife, who had been notified of his illness, accompanied by her brother, Mr. I. Marx, was unable to reach his bedside before death came.

Mr. Neumegen was born in Posen, Germany, and was 68 years of age. He came to America when about 15 years of age, and had lived in Texas for about 15 years. Mr. Neumegen was a prominent merchant of Fort Worth for eight years, engaging in the gents' furnishing business up to four years ago, when he came to Brady and engaged in the same line of business. He was of a quiet and reserved nature, but all who came to know him more intimately found him jovial and friendly withal, and possessed of the highest sense of honor and integrity.

Mr. Neumegen was married in Waco in 1870 to Miss Rachel Marx, who together with two sons, Joe of Brady, and Morris of Tulsa, Okla., and six daughters, Mrs. M. A. Lehman and Mrs. A. E. Marks of Corsicana, Mrs. M. A. Rosenthal and Misses Rose, Addie and Fannie Neumegen of Fort Worth, survive him.

The body was shipped to Fort Worth Saturday night, Mrs. Neumegen, Mr. Marx, Joe Neumegen and Dr. Lindley accompanying the remains. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon, and interment was made in the Hebrew Rest cemetery.

Mr. Neumegen was a member of the Knights of Honor.

BROWN CIVIL CASE.

Suit of Mrs. Brown's Children Decided for Defendant.

In the court of civil appeals yesterday a decision was handed down in the case of the children of Mrs. George Brown, deceased, against George Brown for \$50,000 for the alleged murder of their mother, in which the court held that the plaintiffs had no cause for action, thus affirming the decision handed down by Judge Goodwin in the district court of Brown county when the case was tried here last spring. Mrs. Brown had three children by her first husband, Lum Wilson, and one child by her second husband, L. H. Brown, and the suit was brought in their behalf by their guardian, J. L. Wilson of Comanche. The plaintiffs were represented by L. V. Reid of Comanche and Brown by Judge Wilkinson of this city.

In the criminal case Brown was charged with the murder of his wife on Sept. 9, 1911, at their home near Brownwood. On a change of venue, the case was tried in Ballinger last April and a verdict of life imprisonment was rendered, from which Brown appealed. He has since then been in the Runnels county jail, having been denied bail in habeas corpus proceedings. The case has attracted state-wide attention, and many are interested in the outcome.—Brownwood Bulletin, Dec. 19.

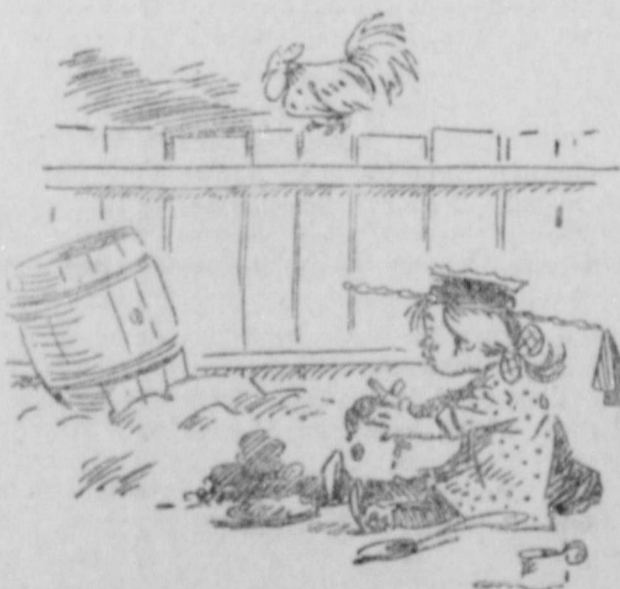

### PARCELS POST JAN. 1ST

#### IMPORTANT ADVICE TO PATRONS OF POSTOFFICE.

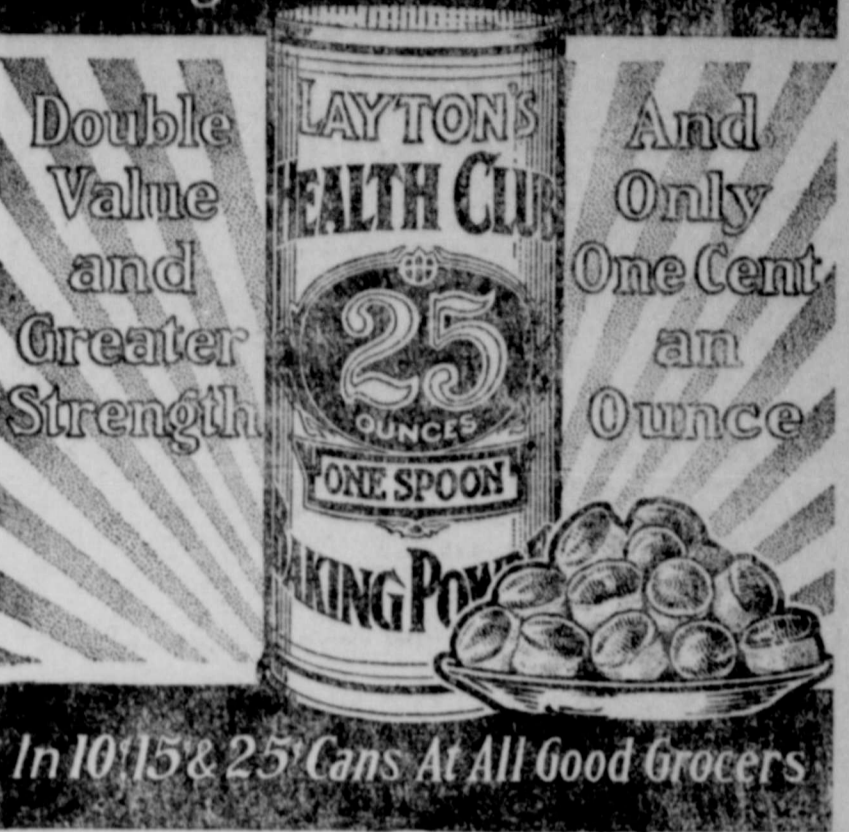
Parcels Unmailable Unless Parcels Post Stamps Are Used. Other Useful Information.

Parcels post stamps, instructions and equipment for putting the system into operation at the Brady office have just been received and, in the rush of the Christmas business, it is not possible to give out the information in a newspaper article that I would like to do, but it is hoped that, with the kind assistance of the publisher of this paper, such information will be given out from time to time, as will enable the public to become thoroughly conversant with the features of the system. In the meantime we respectfully invite you to ask us for such information as you may desire and we trust that you will soon realize the benefits to be derived.

The two principal things I wish to call your attention to now are: First—Parcels weighing not over 11 pounds and not measuring more than 72 inches in length and girth combined can be sent by parcels post.

Second—Distinctive parcels post stamps (which can now be purchased at this office) must be used on all fourth class mail matter, beginning January 1st, 1913, and such matter bearing ordinary postage stamps will be treated as "held for postage" (just as if they had no stamps on them at all.) Parcels will be mailable only at the post office. All parcels must bear the return card of the sender; otherwise they cannot be accepted for

mailing. A table of rates is here given and we will be glad to explain anything concerning it that you do not understand.

Please remember that you are to put nothing but parcels post stamps on your parcels (fourth class matter) and that you are not to use parcels post stamps on your letters or other mail matter.

Kindly remember, also, that we are not responsible for your mistakes and will be compelled by law to hold your mail, as indicated above, when you do not properly prepare it and use the proper stamps.

The post office force desires to join me at this time in thanking the patrons of our office for the many kindnesses we have

received at your hands during the past year, and to say that we have appreciated to the fullest extent every kind word and act. It is our earnest desire to give you the best service in the United States and, to that end, we will bend every effort. We wish you one and all a Happy New Year. May it be the best you have ever seen and the worst you will ever see.

### RATES OF POSTAGE FOR PARCELS POST

Parcels weighing four ounces or less are mailable at the rate of 1c for each ounce or fraction of an ounce, regardless of distance. Parcels weighing more than four ounces are mailable at the pound rate, as shown by the following table, and when mailed at this rate any fraction of a pound is considered a full pound.
