### PROFITABLE RABBIT RANCHES.

9,000 Cottontails Shipped to Fort Worth in Three Weeks.

Establishment of rabbit ranches in West Texas is the newest wrinkle in present day business, and so profitable has been the marketing of rabbits in that section this year, says W. L. Sargeant, immigration and industrial agent of the International & Great Northern and Texas & Pacific railroads that a rabbit industry has been established.

Mr. Sargeant returned to Fort Worth Friday from San Antonio, Pecos and Coahoma, and while at the latter town, he said he was informed that more than 9,000 rabbits had been shipped to the Fort Worth and Dallas markets during the last three weeks, or an average of 3,000 per week. The rabbits are of the cotton tail variety and have been selling from 12 1/2c to 25c each.—Ft. Worth Record.

### Dissolve Bone in Throat.

Sitting at a planked shad dinner, a laughing guest drew a bone into his throat and he began to strangle. Some one suggested that the sufferer swallow a fragment of dry bread. "Oh, no," exclaimed another. "Don't give him bread. It might catch the bone and it might not. Give him something that is sure to give relief." Beckoning to a waiter, he said: "Bring me a lemon, cut in two." And it was brought without delay. Taking one section he offered it to the choking guest and told him to suck the juice and swallow it slowly. Directions were faithfully followed, and in about a quarter of a minute the afflicted one placed the half lemon on his plate, looked into the anxious faces around the table and smiled.

"Well," said one, "how about it?" "It's gone," was the reply, "the bone has slipped down."

"Not exactly that," said the other. "The bone slipped down, all right, but it was melted first by the citric acid. I never knew it to fail to dissolve a fish bone. You can test the power of lemon juice by dropping some on the fish bones you may have lying on your plate."

Several diners tried the experiment. In each case the acid reduced the bone to liquid gelatine.

OIL IN DUG WELL.

Brownwood Has Oil at Depth of Only Thirty Feet.

Oil has been found all around Brownwood in many wells, but yesterday afternoon it was found at a depth of thirty feet in a well being dug by the Brownwood Ice & Fuel Co., at the ice factory on Fagg street at the Santa Fe crossings. The well is four feet in diameter and is thirty feet and one inch deep. In oil sands resembling that found in all the great oil fields of the state, the well digger encountered a flow that necessitated stopping the work, and the oil continues to flow at a rate estimated at four barrels a day. The oil is the same quality found in all the shallow wells around Brownwood—a heavy, thick oil of high grade.

Shallow wells are scattered all around Brownwood, and about the same flow of oil is found in each of them, the flow averaging about four barrels per day. The depth of these wells runs from 100 to 300 feet, but much surprise is manifested in the finding of this well. The well was being sunk by the ice factory people in an effort to secure sufficient water for use at the factory, and the idea of striking oil was never considered. The well is a freak that stands alone in its class, and so far as can be ascertained is the shallowest bona fide oil well in the state.

It is not known just what disposition will be made of the well. After the oil was struck the hole was sunk a few inches deeper and water was struck, but the oil continues to flow apparently as fast as ever. It is being baled out in an effort to determine the amount of the flow.—Brownwood Bulletin.
