**Northeast Texas Farmers Union Meeting.**

The improvement of the marketing system was one of the leading questions that was considered. The local delegates report a great meeting.

**FIRE ESCAPES ORDERED**

**MOTHERS OF BRADY TAKE DECISIVE STEP.**

**Assume Responsibility of Act, and Meet With Assurances of Hearty Approval.**

To the mothers of Brady goes the credit for the ordering of the urgently-needed and long-talked-about fire escapes for the Brady high school, for it was the Parent-Teachers club that consummated the securing of this important factor for safety in the high school.

For the past two or three years the need of fire escapes at the high school building has been recognized, and the placing of such means of protection for the children has been urged from time to time. Finally the mothers of Brady decided to take upon themselves the responsibility of placing the fire escapes, and accordingly an order was placed for the same. A committee composed of Mesdames Joe White, H. C. Boyd, W. D. Crothers and Lewis Brook was named to meet with the city council and the school board and solicit their financial co-operation, and also, if necessary, to solicit assistance from the citizens of Brady. However, the committee met with such ready response from the first two bodies that it was unnecessary to solicit further financial assistance, the city council contribut-

ing \$50 to the fund, while the school board made up \$100, the balance of the required amount.

Having met with such ready response, and encouraged by their success, the ladies are now inaugurating a move in which every citizen is expected to join—the cleaning up of every street, alley and premises in Brady. The ladies conferred with the health department of the city, and also with the Commercial club and other civic bodies, with the result that hearty co-operation was assured upon all hands, and it is expected that within the next ten days Mayor F. M. Richards will issue a "clean-up" proclamation setting aside one day to be observed by every citizen in cleaning up the streets, alleys and premises of the city. The city will provide wagons to haul off the rubbish from the premises of those unable to have same done at their own expense.

To arouse enthusiasm in the move, a meeting has been called for this afternoon at the Methodist church at 3 o'clock, at which time the general observance of "Clean-Up Day" will be urged, and a number of addresses will be made by prominent citizens, urging the necessity of general co-operation. Everybody is urged to attend the meeting.

The Parent-Teachers club has under consideration a number of other plans for the betterment of conditions in Brady, and more especially with reference to the Brady schools. Among

the plans contemplated is the installation of sanitary bubbling fountains at the school building, and also the offering of a premium to the boy raking up the largest pile of rocks from the play grounds. These and other worthy moves will be inaugurated if the citizens of Brady lend the proper encouragement, and upon the success of the clean-up move depends largely the accomplishing of the rest. The citizens of Brady, therefore, should lend every assistance in the good work—for the glory of Brady, and the welfare of her citizens.

C. J. Danielson made us reluctantly accept a dollar last Saturday. Mr. Danielson says he has no complaint to make over his crop last year, he having made 54 bales off of 160 acres, and big bales at that. In fact, if his cotton had been put up in 500 pound bales he would have had 58 bales, and 420 pounds of lint over. This year he expects to put in 283 acres all told, and of this number 235 acres will be in cotton. He plants the best Mebane cotton seed obtainable, costing him \$2.50 per bushel, but believes it pays big returns to do so, and each year he has greater demand for cotton seed than he can supply.

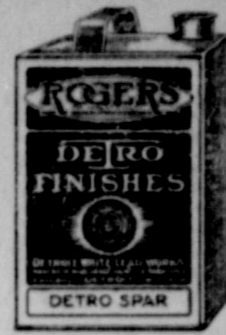

Listen, "From in McCulloch county, near Placid," some will say. Of course, you all would like to know about the Indians. Well, to my surprise, they are the most civilized and intelligent people we have. They are fine people.

We have fine schools and church and Sunday school, but not so much as you people. Yes, hogs all run at large, and get fat on the mast. Yes, we have hog thieves, and when you people think this is a land of flowers and sunshine, please remember it is in its season.

Now, I certainly would like for every reader to tell what they did with the Christmas cover of our grand old Standard. I took mine and glued it on a

large square piece of blue paper, about two feet, and then put mosquito bar over it so it wouldn't get torn and sewed a back on same of pretty flowered muslin and then tore up Brady Standards of past copies and stuffed it and call it a "Remember Pillow." I certainly sit on it in my cozy corner, and if you people want to get this foolish, leave home and you will.

So now I am wishing all the correspondents a little more time, so they will always write; and let me say, "Wake up, Placid and Cowboy."

I send all good wishes to our kind editor for 1913, and will say if any of you people want to hunt, come out, we will entertain you in summer with blackberries, ticks and other fruits and mosquitoes in respect to the dear old Standard.

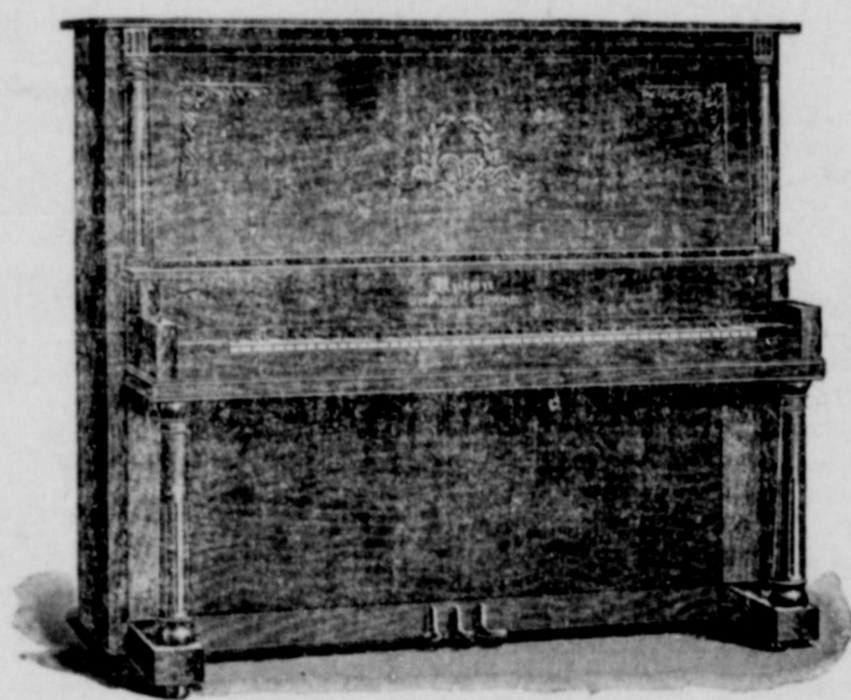

**BONES OF MASTODON.**

Remains of Prehistoric Animal Found in Richland Springs Gravel Pit.

Richland Springs, Jan. 8.—Bones of a mastodon were found eighteen feet under ground here yesterday by James Murray while working on a gravel pit on the T. A. Baker place. One of the teeth of the skeleton weighed four and a half pounds and is in excellent state of preservation.

Another bone four feet long and nineteen inches in diameter, weighed a hundred pounds. The remains of the prehistoric animal are now on exhibition here.
