City Council Orders Floor of Storm Sewer Raised.

The city council met in regular session Tuesday night, routine duties being attended to.

One of the most important actions of the council was the passing of an order for the raising of the floor of the storm sewer in order to secure proper drainage. It is proposed to raise the floor about eighteen inches, beginning at Abney & Vincent's corner, and graduate the slope through the length of the sewer. The job will likely be turned over to Street Superintendent S. M. Wooten, and work will begin in the immediate future.

**BATTLESHIP "TEXAS."**

Efforts to Raise Funds for Purchase of Silver Service.

Galveston, Texas.—Governor O. B. Colquitt has formally designated Thursday, March 18, 1913, as "Texas" battleship day. This announcement means that on that day the school children of Texas will hand to their teachers in their class rooms a sum not exceeding five or ten cents each; that the teachers will transmit these amounts, together with a list of the contributors, to the principal of the school, and through him to the county or city superintendent for forwarding to the state committee at large in charge of these collections, to be appointed by Governor Colquitt, of which Hon. Lewis Fisher, mayor-president of Galveston is the chairman.

These contributions will be made in all educational institutions, public, parochial, private or of whatsoever nature, of Texas at the same hour and with appropriate ceremonies.

The funds thus collected will be expended under the supervision of the committee to be appointed by Governor Colquitt, in the purchase of a suitable silver service for the battleship "Texas," and some time following this date this silver service will be presented to the battleship "Texas" at Galveston, and in these presentation ceremonies the school children of Texas will play an important part.

It is the intention of the committee in charge of this work and of the citizens of Galveston to so arrange the ceremonies of presentation that as many as possible of the children of Texas may be present and participate therein.

Lithographs of the new battleship, which is the largest battleship in the new American navy, are being prepared and will be distributed to all the schools of the state and remain posted in the school rooms until this fund is collected.

It is also contemplated that special studies regarding the new American navy will be conducted in the interim in the various schools, so that the chil-

dren of Texas may, because of the construction of this battleship, have a full and complete idea of the American navy, past and present.

Special attention is being given to the question of transportation to Galveston at the time of the presentation of the service to the battleship, and all interested parties are uniting in an effort to secure at this time the cheapest rates that ever have been given for any purpose of similar character, so that the largest possible proportion of the people of Texas may have an opportunity to see the battleship and to participate in the presentation ceremonies.

## \$10,000 IN GOLD.

Prizes Offered by Texas Industrial Congress to Farmers.

There are a number of farmers who are interested in the announcement made last week in regard to the offering of \$10,000 in prizes to the farmers of Texas who grow the best crops. In order to give as full information as possible we have arranged for a series of articles explanatory of the plans and methods of the Industrial Congress in the offering of the prizes. The prizes are offered for the best crops grown, and the crops have been placed in five classes—A, B, C, D and E. The following article will explain the rules and conditions governing the contestants in Class A. Other classes will be explained in future issues.

**Class A.—4-Acre Model Farm.**—Last year the Congress offered \$5000 in prizes in this class for ten acre farms with the object of inducing their intelligent operation in every neighborhood in the state and proving by actual results the necessity for and the value of conservation, rotation and diversification by alternating specific crops in successive years and plowing under a leguminous crop on one-fourth (and a different fourth) of the land in cultivation each year.

By this plan, once in every four years all of the land cultivated will have a splendid application of green manure that will supply the necessary humus and draw vast stores nitrogen from the atmosphere. For the purpose of inducing more land owners, more tenant farmers and especially more boys, to enter this class, the amount of land to be cultivated has been reduced from ten to four acres and the prize offer in 1913 is for the largest combined yields of merchantable crops, cost of production considered, produced on four-acre plots. The four plots must lie side by side and make one body or tract of land.

On the first plot corn is to be grown; on the second plot, cowpeas; on the third plot, either kaffir corn or milo maize as the contestant prefers, and cotton on the fourth.

First Prize, \$1,000; second prize, \$500; third prize, \$250; fourth prize, \$150; fifth prize, \$100, and for the twenty best results, \$50 each, a total of twenty-five prizes in all, amounting to \$3,000.

Competition in this class is open to everybody. Women or girls are not required to do manual labor in cultivating their crops, but are expected to supervise and manage them only. The crops mentioned must be grown in the order named, as shown below:

First Plot—One acre corn.  
Second Plot—One acre cowpeas. (Vines to be plowed under at maturity.)  
Third Plot—One acre kaffir corn or milo maize, as contestant prefers.

**Fourth Plot—One acre cotton**  
**Competition by Schools.**  
The teacher and trustees of every public school district are invited to secure a four-acre tract of land to be entered in the class in the name of the school, and to be cultivated by the pupils, as a most practical course in agriculture.

Contestants who are entered in this class last year are requested, as nearly as possible, to cultivate in this contest four of the ten acres on which the 1912 prize crops were grown, and corn should be grown where the cowpeas were cultivated.

All of the corn must be actually weighed in the shuck when it is fully matured and thoroughly dry, in the presence of two disinterested witnesses and no estimate of the yield will be accepted. This rule will be

strictly adhered to in every case. A complete record by hours of the labor necessary to make this crop must be kept and reported on blanks to be furnished for that purpose.

At maturity and when thoroughly dry the kaffir corn or milo maize must be headed, leaving shanks not more than three inches long and all of the grain must be actually weighed in the presence of two disinterested witnesses. No estimate of the yield will be accepted. This rule will be strictly adhered to in every case. A complete record by hours of the labor necessary to make this crop must be kept and reported on blanks to be furnished for that purpose.

All of the cotton must be weighed in the seed in the presence of two disinterested witnesses and no estimate of the yield will be accepted. This rule will be strictly adhered to in every case. A written statement of the gin weight of the lint cotton, signed by the ginner, must also be made and a complete record by hours of the labor necessary to make this crop must be kept and reported on blanks to be furnished for that purpose.

The cowpeas may be harvested, but the weight of same, when thoroughly dry, must be reported and the yield must be determined by actually weighing the peas in the presence of two disinterested witnesses. No estimate will be accepted and this rule will be strictly adhered to in every case. The cowpea vines, when thoroughly matured, must be plowed under as a fertilizer for next year's crop. The ground rent, cost of preparing the soil, cost of seed and cost of cultivating this crop will be refunded to prize winning contestants and every landlord is asked to co-operate with his tenants who enter the contest by remitting the rent, cost of preparation, cost of seed and cost of cultivation, as the land receives all of the benefit and its fertility is conserved and increased.

When the cowpea vines are at their best and are ready to be plowed under, each contestant, in the presence of two disinterested witnesses, shall cut and weigh the vines from a plot measuring ten feet each way (making one hundred square feet) that is a fair average of the vines on the entire acre. He and his witnesses shall make affidavit as to the number of pounds of hay produced on this average plot on blanks to be furnished for that purpose. The yield must be determined by actually weighing it, as no estimate will be accepted. The number of pounds of peas from the entire plot and the number of pounds of hay calculated from the weight of the vines on the average plot of one hundred square feet, will be included and considered in the total production on the four acres.

While our opinion and advice may be of no consequence, yet it is offered free and without a charge of any kind, and everyone is privileged to profit either by accepting it or letting it alone.

If you have loved ones laid away in the Brady cemetery, aren't you interested in having proper attention given the place, and wouldn't it add to your peace of mind to know that the graveyard had not been given over to the weeds and the briars? Then you should feel it your duty to become a member of the Civic League—a body of public spirited men and women who have undertaken just such work as above outlined.

## THE CLEANEST TOWN.

Brownwood is rejoicing over the winning of the handsome prize of \$500 awarded by Holland's Magazine to the cleanest town in Texas, and well may she rejoice. It is a proud achievement, for be it remembered there are many clean towns in Texas—at least comparatively clean.

It is a matter of much comfort to an individual to be clean, to be free from filth, to feel the glow of a bath and a rub-down, and to enjoy the luxury of fresh linen. So with a town; it increases the self respect of the citizenship to observe clean streets, to smell no ill odors and to know that the cleanness of person and of home pervades the atmosphere of the community.

And that isn't all; it pays. New York state is just now congratulating itself upon a reduced death rate due to improved sanitation. Health Commissioner Porter well remarks that "public health is a purchasable commodity," and calls attention to the "magnificent achievement of Colonel Gorgas in the canal zone," which he says "can be duplicated in every hamlet wherever the people of the community make up their minds to have it thus." We have not the figures at hand to show the precise measure of improved health

in the canal zone under American administration, but newspaper readers are familiar with the general facts. That hole of pestilence has been purified to the degree that it is about as healthful a place as can be found anywhere. In like manner American methods banished yellow fever from Havana; our coast cities have become as healthful as the mountain and plains, and river communities have rid themselves of malaria previously supposed to be inevitable. And it is all done by sanitation, by cleaning up and keeping clean.

Lives are saved, human energy is conserved and productive effort is strengthened by modern methods of science. More and more ill health is becoming inexcusable; we cannot avert death, but we can escape much of disease and ailment by keeping clean.

Filth is costly; a dirty town is not only discriminated as bad form, but it is an environment of illness from which the clean and healthy person cannot escape.

We congratulate Brownwood upon her achievement. She has a right to rejoice and be proud. We trust that other towns—including Fort Worth and other pretentious cities—will emulate her example.—Record.

### BOOST YOUR OWN BEST INTERESTS.

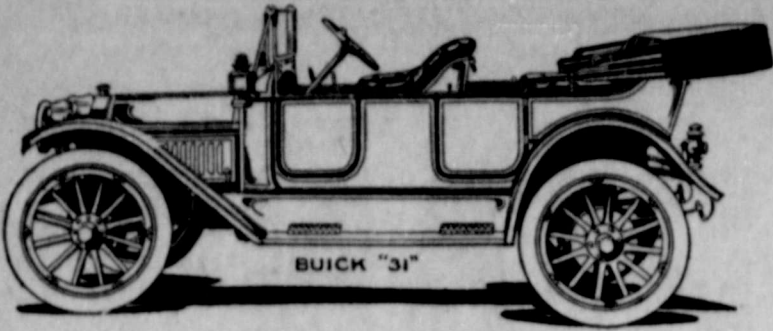

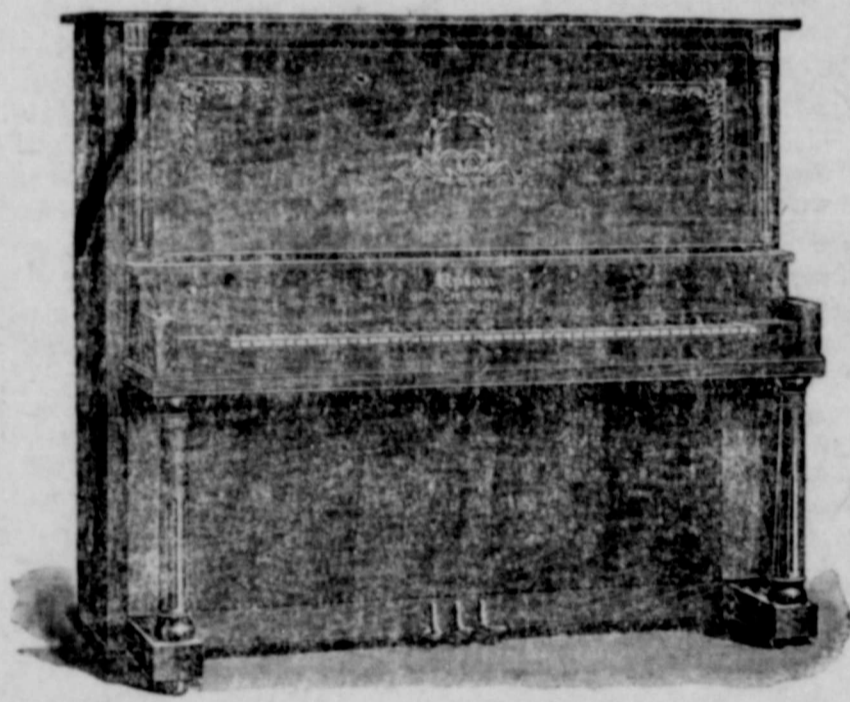

**PHYSICIANS MUST REPORT.**

Registrar of Vital Statistics to Take Drastic Action.

Austin, Texas, Jan. 17.—R. B. Babcock, State Registrar of Vital Statistics, is preparing to prosecute those physicians of the state who have been guilty of violating the law relative to the report of all births, deaths and contagious diseases to the state department. A fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$1000 is the penalty provided for such violations, and a stringent prosecution will be urged.

About a week ago letters were addressed to the various registrars of vital statistics, urging a campaign for complete monthly reports and requesting them to notify all physicians that the law would be enforced to the letter compelling them to report births, deaths and contagious diseases promptly. A large list of names of physicians throughout the state who have been guilty have been furnished the Registrar.

Mr. Babcock said: "We are going to have complete reports: The physicians have been urged to respond, and now they must suffer unless complying with the law. Complaints will be filed in courts if necessary to bring about this filing of prompt records."
