## IMMENSE DEALS IN DIRT

TWO DEALS AGGREGATE  
ALMOST \$100,000.

W. D. Crothers Buys Johnny  
Baker Ranch—Dick Sellman  
Buys J. C. Smith Ranch.

Two land deals were closed last Friday, the first by R. D. Dyer and the second by W. T. Melton Land Co., the aggregate of which is \$82,700. In each deal the purchasers were McCulloch county citizens, and the land purchased is in the Brady country, which is good indications of the faith of our citizens in the land of this section.

The first deal was the purchase of the Johnny Baker ranch in Kimble county by W. D. Crothers, the deal being closed by R. D. Dyer. The purchase includes all the remainder of Mr. Baker's holdings in Kimble county, consisting of 11,540 acres, and the consideration paid was \$5.00 per acre. The ranch is a fine body of land, and Mr. Crothers expects to stock it and place it in charge of Boy Crothers. The ranch is at present under lease to Mears Bros., whose lease expires June 1st.

The second deal, closed by Melton & Co., was the sale of the John C. Smith ranch of 3,000 acres to Dick Sellman for a consideration of \$25,000. The ranch is located on Deep creek, lying just north of and adjoining the Sellman ranch. The ranch includes about 750 acres of the finest land in McCulloch county, and is a valuable piece of property. Mr. Sellman will likely stock the ranch also.

### Herman Vandever Captured.

Sheriff P. C. Baird passed through Brady last Thursday returning to Mason with Herman Vandever, wanted in Mason on three or four counts, among which are the firing of the Benham store at that place about three years ago, cattle theft and other charges. The prisoner made his get-away from Mason shortly after the events named above, or about the time he was indicted, and has safely eluded his pursuers. Our own sheriff, J. C. Wall, at one time had a line on him while he was in New Mexico, where he was going under the name of Jack McCoy, but Vandever left before Sheriff Wall could make use of the information. Sheriff Baird finally located his man in Trinidad, Col., going after him last week, and upon his return had him handcuffed and shackled in such a manner as to preclude any possibility of escape.

Last Sunday's San Antonio Express contained the picture of another of Brady's bright little chaps—Sheridan, the 3-year-old son of Judge and Mrs. F. M. Newman being the favored one. The picture was a most excellent likeness of the young man, who posed for his photo clad as a day laborer, his costume consisting chiefly of his favorite overalls.

### BUD AUTREY KILLED.

Shot to Death at Eden by Man Named Halk.

Bud Autrey, one of the best known stock and ranch men of this section, was shot and instantly killed at Eden Saturday. The man who did the shooting was named Halk, and had worked for Autrey on his ranch for several years. A disagreement arose between the two, and Halk left Autrey's employ a short while back, and for the past two or three weeks had been working in Kimble county. Halk returned to Eden Thursday, and Saturday he came upon Autrey who was seated in front of a store engaged in conversation with ex-sheriff Maddox of Concho county. Without a word being spoken Halk raised a gun and fired, the shot striking Autrey in the breast and ranging through the body. Both Autrey and Maddox arose from their seats and grappled with Halk for possession of the gun, and in the struggle the gun was discharged the second time, the shot going in the air. Maddox secured possession of the gun, and as he did so Autrey dropped to the ground and expired without saying a word.

The body was taken to Menard, where the funeral occurred Sunday.

Autrey was a man of about 50 years, and made his home on his ranch between Menard and Eden. He is survived by five children, all of whom are grown. Halk is a young man about 25 years of age, and has a wife and one child.

Family trouble is said to have been the cause of the tragedy.

### Vote for Stock Law.

The election returns of the stock law election held in the Voca, Lost Creek and Mt. Tabor precincts March 22nd were canvassed last Saturday by Judge Harvey Walker, W. J. Yantis, R. M. Elliott and J. A. Watkins, the official count showing 33 votes cast for the proposition, with 17 against. The election means that 30 days from the time of holding the same the horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle will no longer be allowed to roam at large in the above named precincts.

C. A. Engdahl was in last Saturday from the Brady-Rochelle community, and slipped a dollar under our door. Mr. Engdahl says he has 90 acres of oats that are looking fine, and which were not hurt in the least in the late freezes. In fact, Mr. Engdahl was wishing the freezes had thinned them out a little, as the stand is entirely too thick. He planted corn yet, with an acre of a few rows of sorghum. He expects to put 100 acres of cotton, and most of the folks, if they will be a good crop, will show how good they are.

### For Better Farming Methods.

T. L. Sansom was up from Mercury last Saturday, and excited much interest by having in his possession a long heavy iron, shaped much in the manner of a bent spear. Teddy set at rest all questions as to his being on the war path by explaining that it was a simple agricultural tool of his own invention. The object is something on the order of a goose-foot or sub-soiler, and was made to attach to a planter. It is about 12 inches in length, and its purpose will be to loosen up the ground as deep as T. L. can put it. While loosening up the ground deep down, the sub-soiler will not disturb the surface.

Mr. Sansom proposes to experiment with the tool by running it in the rows on part of his land, between rows on another part, and not using it at all on some of his land just to see which method will prove out best. He already has 150 acres well broke, starting the breaking as early as possible, and breaking six to eight inches deep with a six-mule team. After using the sub-soiler on part of his land he will list it all in the same manner.

Mr. Sansom is a firm believer in early plowing and deep plowing, and says the wisdom of this manner of plowing was proven to him two years ago, when he made 14 bales of cotton off of 25 acres, where a renter on his place made 5 off of 33, two farms farms joining and the land being practically identical, the difference in production resulting from the fact that Mr. Sansom had his land more thoroughly broke and worked.
