TWO YEAR SENTENCE.
Cal Woodward Convicted of Swindling at Menard.
Cal Woodward was given a sentence of two years in the penitentiary in the district court at Menard on a charge of swindling Tuesday, the jury reaching a verdict at 11:30 Tuesday night.

WONDER WORDS.

From Wonder, Ore., by the Way-Worn Wanderer of the Western Wilds.

Beg pardon; Aunt Susan doesn't like "foolish gibberish," so I will proceed to give you the news.
 This is Monday—next day after Easter, and we have had snow storms three days in succession.
 Superstitious ideas seem to conflict on the present occasion, for, according to the old saying, "an early Easter brings an early spring."
 And again, "if it snows on Easter Sunday, it will snow seven Sundays in succession." An apparent discrepancy, but I hope in favor of the former saying.
 The altitude of Wonder is 1077 feet above sea level.
 With a gradual incline for eight miles to the west of us until it reaches an altitude of 3000 feet, where the snow is several feet in depth.
 Fruit trees are just beginning to bud; and violets and daffodils commencing to bloom.
 Fruit growers are spraying their orchards with a mixture of lime and sulphur to kill the San Jose scale.
 The people of Oregon have the microphone scare, and have it bad. They have passed several very stringent laws—to prohibit a public drinking cup on trains and at hotels and public places of business.  We have had only about one-half our annual precipitation this winter so far—20 inches of water; so we look for twenty inches more this spring before it quits for good.

Our big pine and fir trees here must look like babies compared to them.

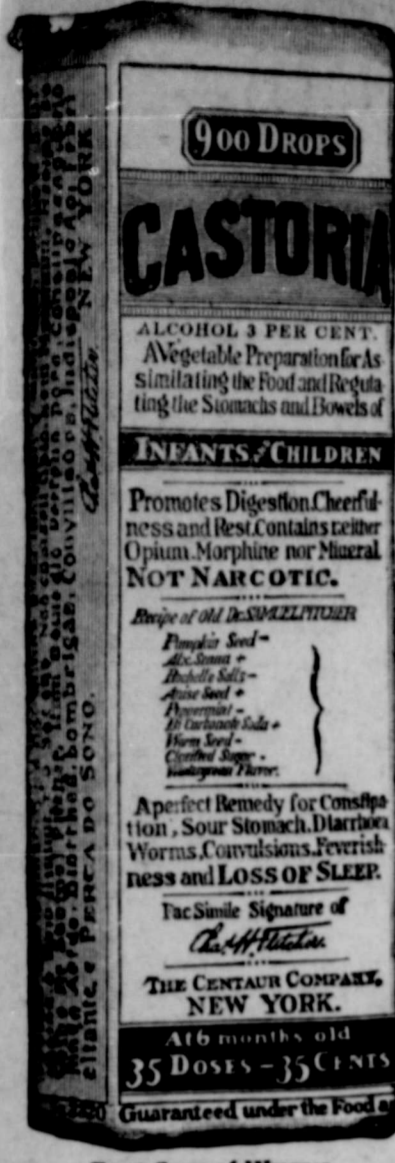

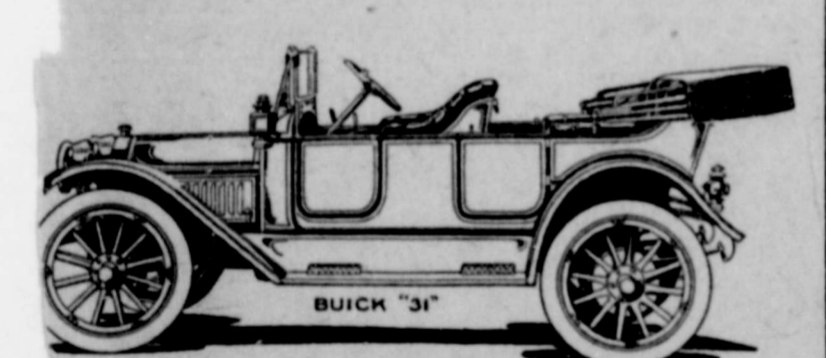

CONSOLIDATE SCHOOLS.

Agreement in Voca, Lost Creek Mt. Tabor, Liberty, Martin.

Supt. E. L. White Tuesday attended a meeting in Voca of the patrons of the Voca, Lost Creek, Mt. Tabor, Liberty and Martin districts, the purpose of the meeting being to discuss the consolidation of the five schools and the establishment of a central high school. The proposition was thoroughly discussed and resolutions were unanimously passed favoring such consolidation. A committee composed of members of each school district was appointed to further advise in the matter, and to reach an agreement upon the site of the central high school building.

It has been estimated that a building fully suited to the needs of these communities for years to come could be erected for \$8,000. The tax rate for maintenance and for interest and sinking fund would not be over 40c. The high school would employ five teachers, where seven are now employed in the five districts, thereby not only reducing the expense along this line, but providing greater efficiency and range in school work, and longer terms of school. Next year, if the present schools are continued, it will require the services of eight teachers at a cost of \$480 per month to handle the work.

The citizens of these districts are taking a step in the right direction, and it is to be hoped that they will succeed in carrying their present plans out in full.

There is but one way to successfully operate street sprinkling, and that is by universal co-operation. If no other way is to be found, a tax should be voted for the purpose.

In order to dispense entirely with the gasoline engine, both on account of the high price of gasoline, and the fact that such action will secure a further reduction in the key rate of about 3c, the board of managing trustees has purchased a new direct-connected steam engine, which was shipped some time ago, and which is expected to arrive any day. This will enable the furnishing of steam power for both night and day current.

INTRASTATE SHIPMENTS.

Shipments of Liquor From Wet to Dry Districts Prohibited.

Austin, March 31.—Governor Colquitt today signed two liquor bills. The first was the Allison bill, prohibiting intrastate shipments of liquor from a wet to a dry district. The offender, upon conviction, will receive from one to three years in the penitentiary.

The governor also signed the 9:30 o'clock closing bill relating to the criminal statutes. This provides that a saloon keeper who violates the 9:30 closing law shall be fined from \$50 to \$500, or six months' imprisonment, or both. It has teeth in it, as a violator will discover to his sorrow. It becomes effective July 1st.

FARMERS' INSTITUTES.

To Be Held—State Agriculturist Coming.

Hon. Ed R. Kone, commissioner of agriculture, Austin, Texas, is sending to this county Mr. B. L. Nance, a practical agriculturist, for the week beginning April 7th. Mr. Nance gives interesting lectures on scientific farming and industrial education.

Mr. Nance desires to visit six centrally located communities in McCulloch county. It is his plan to address the school and then hold a farmers' institute. The purpose of the institute is to have a general discussion by any and all present as to the best methods of general farming. Mr. Nance will likely be able to give practical answers to questions on the following subjects: Fertilization and soil preparation, conservation of moisture, seed selection, plant cultivation, economic harvesting, intelligent marketing, breeding of live stock, etc. Considerable interest in this movement has been manifested by the local farmers, some of whom have agreed to assist Mr. Nance in his work. Mr. W. J. West of Rochelle will likely have something of interest to say at Rochelle and he will probably accompany Mr. Nance to Fife and Lohn.

As Mr. Nance will be in this county only one week he cannot visit each school, but it is expected that the people will attend the nearest institute. The teachers and their schools are cordially invited to attend the nearest meeting place, and make it a day for acquiring expert knowledge on industrial conditions.

POULTRY DEPARTMENT
 By S. J. Striegler.

More About Poultry Hobbies.

Quite a few people know that poultry is one of my hobbies, though it is not only a hobby, but a straight-forward business proposition. This subject consumes quite a bit of my spare time and thought, and the work itself—the care of the real, live birds—consumes considerable of my physical energy. To be successful in any undertaking of any nature, persistent application of thought and energy is required, and knowing this as I do, I am free to say that my birds get about the best that I can stand up to after an all day's work at other employment, and it is from this actual experience that I now attempt to write this article. I hope it will be a matter of information to readers of The Standard as well as a word of worthy praise in behalf of the industry of which I am duly proud.

No one will dispute the assertion that the poultry industry has made rapid strides during the past few years, nor would it seem wise to question the future of the industry. The future looks especially bright for those who contemplate engaging in this business—one of the most pleasant and profitable pursuits, and one which is growing in favor among all classes. And in the majority of these cases this popularity is due not to sport or fancy in any degree, but it has been won by favorable and convincing facts. It is due principally to the earning power of the beautiful hen, her ability to aid in the high cost of living, and the assistance she leads in the accumulation of substance. The progressive farmer looks at the poultry industry through different eyes, and realizes now that the hen is one of the best assets of the farm, not only as a food producer, but also as a mortgage lifter. Even our self-styled "upper tens" in the cities have taken up the business on a small scale in order to increase their income and to reduce expenses. It is astonishing to know how many people in our cities are raising pure bred fowls.

To anyone who contemplates engaging in the "billion dollar industry" I would say be sure to start right. Be careful about selecting your breed; that is, endeavor to be sure that you have decided fully as to which is your choice, and then stick to the breed pretty closely. I do not recommend a division of time and energy among several breeds. Get some good magazine and search them thoroughly for different advertisements to assist you in your selection. When you have finally selected the breed that you intend to start with, read all you can about this particular breed, so that you may fully understand the strong points, etc. Then select some good reliable breeder, preferably one located near you, and purchase from him your stock and your eggs for hatching. If you can secure your eggs and stock from a breeder

located near you it is greatly to your advantage. In the case of eggs, it means a saving in express charges and lessens the liability of their becoming chilled or over-heated in transit. In the case of stock, it also means some saving in rates, and the short haul is not so hard on the fowls. Get the best to be had, for this is cheaper in the long run, and far more satisfactory.

If you buy a high priced setting, don't think for a moment that they will all be prize winners, for if you do you will be sadly disappointed. If you get one extra good bird, you will be

well repaid. Remember it takes years to build up a large flock of all good ones, and there must be a beginning in the poultry business as there is in any kind of commercial enterprise.

One of the surest ways to get winter eggs is to hatch your stock early. Any kind of a hen will lay in April and May when the weather is warm. Another thing to remember is that a poultry man's work is never done. They must be properly sheltered; regularly fed and watered; must be kept free from all lice and mites; must be culled at the right time; they must be

mated at the proper time to be ready to supply the demand for early eggs for hatching, and above all, houses and entire premises must be kept sanitary and free of disease. But for all that, it is a pleasure and a work that all poultrymen enjoy.

If you go into it for the fancy, you will start in early fall to condition your birds for the fall and winter shows; and if you are a beginner, the show will afford you enough excitement for another twelve months. When you come out of your first show your ambition is at once to show again, and win over those

who defeated you at the previous shows.

There is more money to be made from raising poultry for the amount invested than from any other business. The field is a large one, and like the old saying about the omnibus, there is always room for one more. Some breeders have made themselves independently rich from poultry and egg farms. Why not you?

Better get a fish pole and a line or two and spend an afternoon down on the creek. Fish are biting fine, so they say. Broad Mercantile Co.

CITY COUNCIL

Permits Phone Companies to Build Lines into Brady.

The city council held an interesting meeting Tuesday night, at which time the following business was transacted:

Report of City Collector J. M. Anderson showing collections of city taxes, \$38.14; fines, \$8.80; dog taxes, \$3.00, was approved.

Report of City Treasurer S. M. Richardson showing balances of general fund, \$2,813.42; street fund, \$740.08; bond fund, \$6,191.00; officers fund, \$268.69; waterworks sinking fund, \$5,338.66; waterworks bond fund, \$1,334.77, was approved.

The committee appointed to solicit subscriptions to the street sprinkling agreement was given further time to complete their work.

Permission was granted to the Pear Valley Telephone Co. and the Martin Telephone Co. to build lines into the city, subject to the ordinances of the city, the route after entering the city to be subject to the written permission and approval of the street committee.

The council accepted the water heater of the Brady Water & Light Co. at \$75.00. The heater was not included in the machinery and equipment invoiced to the city by the former owners of the light plant, and its purchase was recommended by the board of managing trustees.

The council also decided to loan the board of managing trustees of the Brady Water and Light Co. \$1000 with which to complete the improvements now in progress at the water and light plant, provided such loan be found to be legal.

A strip of land 60x110x feet was purchased from W. Dutton for \$30, the land to be used for opening a street.

Returns of the city election were canvassed and Messrs. Broad, H. P. Roddie and Tipton declared elected as men.
