BIG TUNNEL STARTED.

Grading Crews Move and Work Is Being Pushed.

Actual work was started on the long 900 foot tunnel of the Fredericksburg railroad on last Thursday when several heavy charges of dynamite tore away great piles of rock in the "big hill" that has been the main obstacle in keeping the city isolated from the commercial world for so many years. When finished the tunnel will be 900 feet long, and will be the only one in Texas. The large crew at work have been putting in their time making the approach to the tunnel for the past several weeks, but are now in position to push the work rapidly.

Both the grading crews on each side of the "big hill" have moved camp and within a short time the entire grade will be completed up to the tunnel.—Fredericksburg Standard.
