



Poultry Keeping for the Boys. in this desire. Most of their cantile Co. time, of course, out of school hours, is spent in playing, but it is an excellent plan for parents to begin early with boys it over. to develop in them thrifty habits and some sense of responsibility. More business ability among our general public is an urgent necessity.

Most boys love animals and pets. Children are naturally endowed with a desire for living things. Many boys possess a pony, horse, dog, rabbits or chickens that they can call their

The size of the parents' pocketbook generally determines the fact as to whether the boy has a dog or horse of his own, or whether he has to be content with less expensive animals, such as rabbits, pigeons or chickens. There is hardly a boy but who would jump at the chance if his father or mother made him the proposition to start a small poultry business in the back yard.
