#### SAD DEATH.

Fred, Son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Miller Died Tuesday.

One of the saddest deaths recorded was that of Fred, the 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Miller of Brady, who died Tuesday at Dallas, where he had been taken for treatment by his parents. The lad had been confined to his bed for seventy-four days with tuberculosis of the hip, and as a last resort his parents took him to Dallas last Saturday night to place him in a sanitarium, where it was hoped an operation might save his life. Before the operation could be performed, however, death came as a relief to his sufferings.

Fred Miller was 8 years 4 months and 11 days old at the time of his death. He was a bright young lad, loved by all who knew him, and during his long illness he bore his sufferings with remarkable fortitude. The body was brought to Brady on the Wednesday morning train and taken to Voca, where interment was made in the family burial ground at 1:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, Rev. D. R. Hardison conducting the services.

#### HOME DESTROYED.

Explosion of Gasoline Iron is Cause of Bad Fire.

The fire originated from the explosion of a gasoline iron, which set fire to a quilt, and in just a few minutes the house was a mass of flames. Mrs. Kindley and the children ran screaming from the house, and neighbors hurried to the scene in time to remove practically all the furniture and household goods. The chemical engine also responded to the alarm, but before it could arrive upon the scene the house was beyond saving.

The loss is a severe blow to the family, and they have the sincere sympathy of the public in their misfortune. But \$300 insurance was carried upon the house, and \$50 upon the household goods.

Herbert Mason has been over from Brownwood the past few days arranging a game for Daniel Baker college with the local high school team.

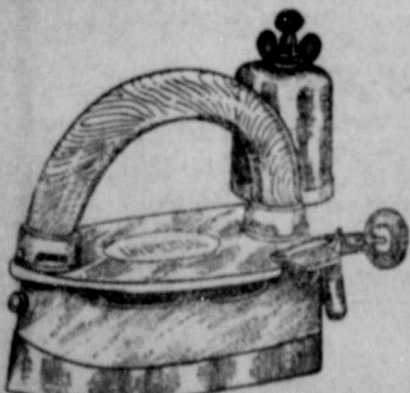
Miss Daisy Clingman, who has been the guest of Miss Rosa Stallings the past several days, left last night for her home at Brownwood.

INTERESTING FIGURES.  
Penalty of Over-Production in McCulloch County.

The Texas Commercial Secretaries association sends out the following interesting article upon cotton statistics and prices. The federal census report proves the wisdom of the Farmers Union in appealing to the farmers to reduce the cotton acreage this season and the statistics bring out with mechanical exactness the penalty of over-production. The federal report shows the United States produced 16,109,349 bales in 1911, which sold for \$732,420,000 and in 1910 there were 11,965,962 bales produced which sold for \$820,320,000. The 1911 crop exceeded the 1910 production by 4,137,387 bales and sold for \$87,900,000 less.

There are 121,126 acres of cultivated land in McCulloch county and 65,229 acres are devoted to the production of cotton. The record shows that 54 per cent of our improved farm land is devoted to cotton and it has been the predominating crop ever since the county was settled.

McCulloch county produced 13,268 bales of cotton in 1911, which sold for \$597,060 against 9,697 bales in 1910, which sold for \$659,396, making an increase of 3,571 bales and a decrease in the value of \$62,336. The average farm value of cotton was \$23.09 per bale less in 1910 than in 1911.

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**COMMERCIAL CORNER**  
 By the Secretary.  
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We have had some real good work done in our county recently by J. W. Neill, director of agricultural work of the state department at Austin, our county superintendent of public instruction, Mr. White, and farm demonstrator J. W. Griffin. These men have given their time and means and have succeeded in organizing several farmers institutes and boys clubs. This is always helpful. Our farmers are an appreciative set of men and are always glad to discuss both old and new methods that may prove helpful. The day of criticism of farm demonstration work and federal assistance is about gone. Anyone today who may oppose modern methods of seed selection, soil preparation and culture under government supervision does not appreciate his own interests. Seed selection seems to be holding the attention of quite a number of our farmers. The agitation along this line alone has been and will prove very helpful.

We have some reason to rejoice over our victory for the retention of our present tariff rates. Last Friday the Interstate Commerce Commission handed down the final decision in this case and secured to us common justice. The chapter is at an end at last, after a prolonged fight, and I may add a very expensive one. The first trial we secured before the Commission was at Dallas, the next at St. Louis and the last at Washington, D. C. several weeks ago. In the decision made last day the I. C. C. stated that under the circumstances and with what data they had had given them by the commercial bodies in this section of the state, that it would be unjust for the railroads to raise the freight rates. That voiced the sentiments of the people of this part of the state exactly. At any rate, it is a victory for the consumers of the western division of Texas. It saves thousands of dollars to the people.

Our state special news service through the co-operation of the commercial secretaries of Texas furnishes some good reading. Lots of news along industrial lines and some very wholesome advice. Allow me to quote a few expressions from the page of "City Building Notes":
