BRADY FAIR IN OCTOBER

DIRECTORS ABOLISH RACING AS A FEATURE.

Committee Named on Arrangement and Attractions—To Meet Again July 11th.

The question of races was brought up, and the directors voted to eliminate this feature, devoting the entire fair to agricultural, livestock, poultry and like exhibits.

A committee on arrangements and attractions was named as follows: D. F. Savage, H. H. Sessions, Lewis Brook and D. R. Hardison, the latter acting as secretary of the meeting in the absence of the regular secretary.

A committee of S. S. Graham, F. M. Richards and W. D. Crothers was named to arbitrate the claim of the fair association against the old Brady Water and Light Co.

The directors adjourned to meet again on Friday, July 11th.

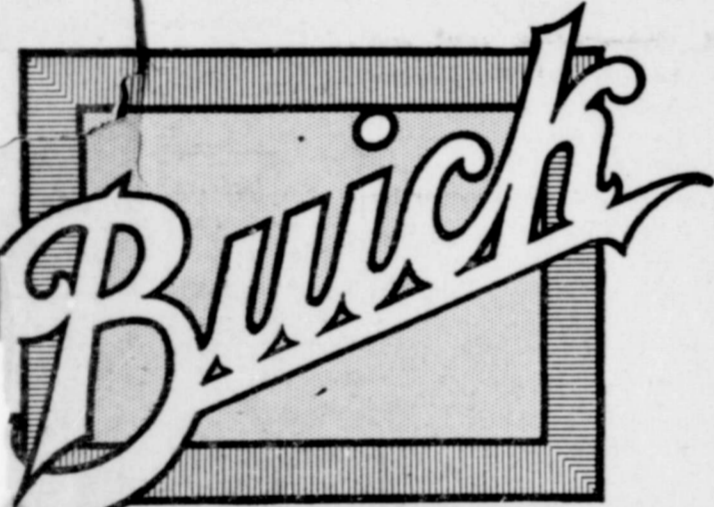




Good Looking Beans.

Russian Thistle.

Possibly all the farmers did not notice the warning given a few weeks ago to look out for this weed, and as it has been found in four other fields, I again ask the farmers to look in your millet patches for specimens of this thistle. From the fact that it is being found altogether in millet, it is very probable that there is more of it in the county. Go through your millet thoroughly and pull up all you can find before cutting if you have not already done so, and as soon as you can after the crop has been removed plow deeply or double disk with the disk harrow often enough to keep the plant from appearing above the surface. The leaves of all plants are their lungs or breathing pores, and if not allowed to get out of the ground, they will finally be smothered out.
