

# **COMMISSIONERS COURT**

ORDERS POOL HALL ELEC-TION FOR AUGUST 9TH.

Set Aside Sum of \$800 for Farm Demonstration Work-U. S. Government Gives \$400.

The county commissioners adjourned Wednesday after being in session since Monday.

Chief of interest among the transactions of the court, was the ordering of an election as to whether or not the pool halls should be prohibited within the limits of Brady Independent School District No. 1. The order for the election followed the presenting to the court of a petition signed by Rev. W. G. Caperton and 103 qualified voters, representing twenty per cent of the qualified voters in Brady voting precinct, in which the petitioners prayed the court to order such an election. According to the law, the date of election must be set not less than fifteen nor more than thirty days from the time of action. The court compromised by ordering the election set for Saturday, August 9th-three weeks hence. The following were appointed to hold the election: T. P. Grant, presiding judge; Thos. S. Wood, J. M. Duke, W. W. Jordan, judges. All legal qualified voters who are residents of Brady Independent School District are entitled to vote.

The court also set aside the sum of \$800 for the fiscal year of 1914 to be used in carrying on the farm co-operative demonstration work jointly with and under the supervision of the United States Department of ly installments. The action of the court is conditioned upon the U. S. Department of Agriculture setting aside the sum of \$400 for the same purpose.

The clerk was ordered to issue a warrant on the road and bridge fund for the sum of \$311 as first payment on Cow Creek bridge; also, 5 per cent interest bearing warrants on the road and bridge fund, payable one and two years from date for the sum of \$341 each for the second and third payments for said Cow Creek bridge.

A warrant was ordered issued for the digging of a grave for a Mexican pauper.



# TWO DROWN IN LLANC

CHAS. BURKES AND MISS EFFIE GAMEL VICTIMS.

Sad Ending of Pleasure Party. River Is Dragged and Bodies of Both Are Recovered.

A message was received here Tuesday telling of the drowning of Chas. P. Burkes and his fiancee, Miss Effie Gamel, of Mason in the Llano about eight miles south of Mason. The victims were members of a pleasure party composed of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Durst and a sister of Miss Gamel's. All were in bathing. and Mr. Burkes, who was an expert swimmer, had been carrying the ladies of the party back and forth across the river. He had carried all back safely for the last time, with the exception of his fiancee, and the party was preparing to abandon the sport. As Mr. Burkes started to carry Miss Gamel back from the other side of the river, he was suddenly seized with a cramp, and both sank before the eyes of their companions.

The alarm was given and six touring cars carrying a number of persons left Mason for the scene. Search for the bodies was commenced at once, the river being dragged until 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, when the body of Miss Gamel was found. The body of Mr. Burkes was not found until 10 o' lock that night, it having drifted some distance down the river and lodged against a ledge of rocks. When brought to the surface the body was found with the heels drawn almost up to the back of his head, and his left arm still retained the po sition in which he held Miss Gamel while carrying her across the stream, indicating without question of a doubt that the tragedy was caused from his being taken with a cramp.

Miss Gamel was the daughter of John Gamel, a prominent ranchman of Mason, and had served as deputy county clerk of Mason. She was considered one of the most beautiful young women in Mason. Mr. Burkes was well known throughout the state, having formerly been sergeant-at-arms of the Texas house of representatives, and since deputy United States marshal. He was the son of D. C. Burkes, sheriff of Bell county for six years, and who made the race for state comptroller four years ago. Chas. Burkes was a member of Ben Hur Temple of the Mystic Shrine. He resided in Belton until recently, when he moved to Waco. He was 30 years of age.

Mesdames S. J. Striegler, Karl Steffins and Frank Millerkin, cousins of Miss Gamel, left Tuesday for Mason to attend the funeral, which took place Wednesday. The body of Mr. Burkes was sent to Belton for interment.
