FIRST.

That on or about the 15th day of November, 1908, plaintiff was legally married to defendant in McCulloch County, Texas, and continued to live with defendant as his wife until about the 30th day of November, 1908, when defendant, without fault on the part of plaintiff, left plaintiff with the intention of abandoning her, and did abandon plaintiff, since which time defendant has never returned to plaintiff to live with her and since which time plaintiff has never heard of or from defendant and has never known his whereabouts from the date of said abandonment to this time, and does not know the whereabouts of defendant. During all of the time that plaintiff and defendant lived together as husband and wife she conducted herself with propriety, and managed the household affairs of her said husband with prudence and economy, and at all times treated her said husband with kindness and forbearance, and plaintiff never, during said time, gave defendant any cause of provocation or excuse to abandon her, and plaintiff neither caused, procured, nor consented to such abandonment; but defendant, disregarding the solemnity of his marriage vows to plaintiff, went away from plaintiff, telling her at the time he left her that he was going away on some sort of business for the day and would return at night or in a short time, but did not return at the time he told plaintiff, but then and there abandoned plaintiff wholly without provocation or excuse and without any fault whatever on the part of plaintiff. Defendant left plaintiff more than three years prior to the filing of this suit, and left her with the intention of abandonment, and did abandon her; all of which was wholly without cause, excuse or fault on the part of plaintiff. Plaintiff has never seen defendant since the 30th day of November, 1908, as aforesaid, and since said abandonment they have never lived together as husband and wife, nor co-habited together in any manner, and defendant has never contributed anything whatever to the support of plaintiff since said abandonment.

SECOND.

When plaintiff married defendant she was a single girl by the name of Beulah Peel, and she sues for the restoration of her maiden name in this action as well as for divorce.

Wherefore, the premises considered, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited as the law directs to appear and answer this petition, and that on final hearing plaintiff have judgment dissolving the marriage contract between plaintiff and defendant, and that plaintiff be restored to her maiden name, Beulah Peel, for all costs of this suit, and for such other and further relief, general or special, either at law or in equity, as plaintiff may be entitled to receive.

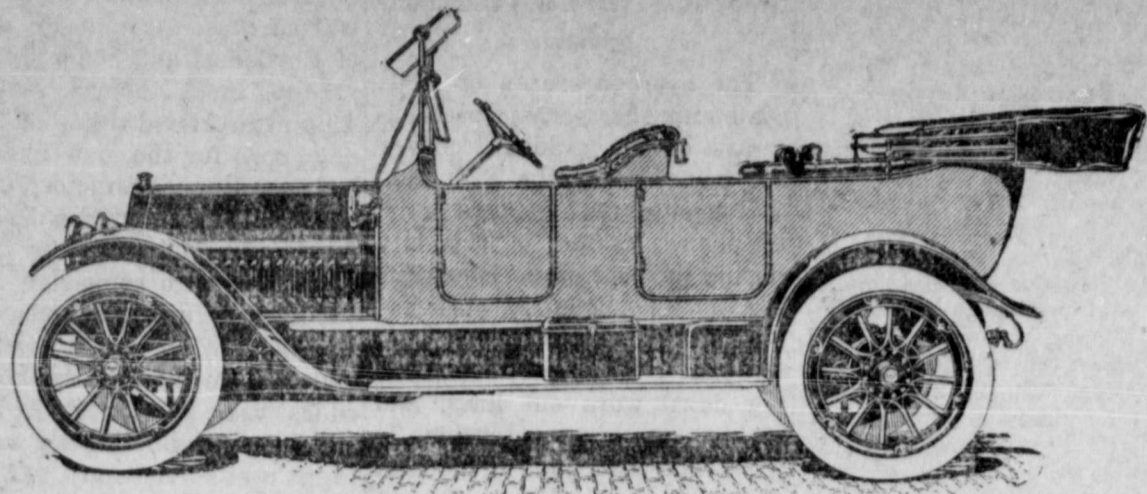

Monthly report of Tax Collector S. H. Mays on delinquent taxes collected in August and September was examined and approved.

Quarterly report of E. B. Conolly, Justice of the Peace Pre. No. 8 was examined and approved.

Quarterly report of District Clerk P. A. Campbell showing amounts collected for stenographer fees was examined and approved.

Pre. No. 1 reported all roads in bad condition on account of the heavy rains; also all mile posts gone.

B. B. Awalt, commissioner Pre. No. 2, reported all roads in bad condition as a result of the heavy rains; culverts and bridges in good condition.

J. L. Smith, commissioner Pre. No. 3, reported all roads in bad condition account of heavy rains.

H. E. McBride, commissioner Pre. No. 4, reported roads in reasonably good shape; bridges very good; bridges needed, three small spans, \$2,000; culverts needed, \$50.

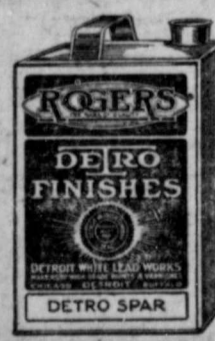

WORK IS COMPLETED.

Brady Has First-Class Telephone System.

The average citizen of this community has perhaps been unaware of the gradual change and improvement the West Texas Telephone Co. has made in the telephone system of this city during the past year. Nevertheless, a vast amount of work has been done in the way of re-constructing existing pole lines, taking down worn out lines, and making numerous extensions in the outlying portions of the city.

At the time this exchange was purchased by the West Texas Telephone Co., practically every line was operated on a so-called single line, or grounded circuit basis, and on account of the great number of paralleling wires, the service was anything but good, the lines being interfered with by cross talk, and other noises incident to the single wire, or grounded system.

All this has been changed. Every subscriber's line within the city limits of Brady and those just outside of the city limits, has been equipped with a two-wire, or metallic line, thus eliminating the cross talk and noises before mentioned.

In the work of providing a metallic circuit for every subscriber's line, upwards of 9,000 feet of lead-encased cable was strung up on existing and new pole lines, and the vast amount of open wire strung on cross arms, which was both unsightly and difficult to maintain, was removed.

The company has spared no expense in the matter of re-building the plant at this point, and as it stands today it is equal to and probably a little better than anything at any town of the same size in the state. Besides re-building, improving and extending the outside plant, practically every station has been rewired with new wire in a neat and secure manner.

The West Texas Telephone Co. has made especial effort to have its outside telephone plant as inconspicuous as possible, as is evidenced by the removal of the many poles, cross arms and innumerable overhead wires around the court house square, and other parts of the city, thus to a great extent improving the looks of the square and other thoroughfares around town.

The fact that the West Texas Telephone Co. has done so much work in Brady would seem to indicate it has great faith in the future development of Brady and McCulloch county. In fact, in the work just finished, provision has been made to connect something over 500 telephones in Brady and they are, therefore, prepared to fill all orders on short notice.

County Judge's Election Order.

Whereas, upon the petition of twenty, being a majority of the legally qualified voters and freeholders in a subdivision of the following territorial limits, to-wit:

Beginning at the N. W. corner of W. N. White survey No. 200; thence along the meanderings of the Colorado river to N. W. corner of the John Batton Survey No. 1080; thence south to the S. W. corner of Christian Schadt Survey No. 1075; thence west to the J. H. Othold Survey No. 1095; thence south a distance of three miles and one-half to S. W. corner of Wilhelm Rasche Survey No. 1066; thence east a distance of six miles to the N. E. corner of C. F. Reidel Survey No. 622; thence north to the place of beginning, the same being and including Fife Common School District No. 14, did present to the Commissioners Court in regular session, on August 15, 1913, a petition in conformity with the law, praying for an election to determine whether or not horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said district, and

Whereas, the Commissioners Court did, acting upon the petition, order an election held within said subdivision on Saturday, November 8, 1913, to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle shall be permitted to run at large within said subdivision; therefore, I, Harvey Walker, County Judge of McCulloch County, Texas, hereby call an election to be held in compliance with said order of court and that the polls shall be opened at the Fife voting precinct on Saturday, November 8, 1913, at regular hours, and the following shall be manager of said election: E. B. Baldrige, and he shall appoint his own clerks to assist him in holding said election, and shall on or before the tenth day thereafter make due return on all votes cast at said place for and against such proposition to the County Judge.

No person shall vote at this election unless he be a freeholder of the county and is a qualified voter under the constitution and laws.

All votes shall be by ballot, and all voters desiring to prevent the animals designated in this order from running at large shall place upon the ballots the words: "For the Stock Law"; and those in favor of allowing such animals to run at large shall place upon their ballots the words: "Against the Stock Law."

It is further ordered that publication of this order be made in The Brady Standard, a newspaper published in McCulloch County, Texas, for thirty days before the date of said election.
