D. 1914, the same being the 15th day of February, A. D. 1914, then and there to answer a petition filed in said court on the 6th day of October, A. D. 1913, in a suit, numbered on the docket of said court No. 1438, wherein Beulah White is plaintiff and B. F. White is defendant, and said petition alleging:

In the District Court McCulloch County, Texas, February Term, A. D. 1914.

To the Honorable John W. Goodwin, Judge of said Court:

Your petitioner, Beulah White, hereinfor called plaintiff, complaining of B. F. White, hereinafter called defendant, represents that plaintiff is an actual bona fide inhabitant of the state of Texas, and has been a bona fide inhabitant of said state for a period of twelve months next preceding the filing of this suit, and plaintiff has been a bona fide inhabitant of the state of Texas and McCulloch County for many years next preceding the filing of this suit; that the residence of defendant is unknown to plaintiff, and for cause of action plaintiff re-

### FIRST:

That on or about the 15th day of November, 1908, plaintiff was legally married to defendant in McCulloch County, Texas, and continued to live with defendant as his wife until about the 30th day of November, 1908, when defendant, without fault on the part of plaintiff, left plaintiff with the intention of abandoning her, and did abandon plaintiff, since which time defendant has never returned to plaintiff to live with her and since which time plaintiff has never heard of or from defendant and has never known his whereabouts from the date of said abandonment to this time, and does not know the whereabouts of defendant. During all of the time that plaintiff and defendant lived together as husband and wife she conducted herself with propriety, and managed the household affairs of her said husband with prudence and economy, and at all times treated her said husband with kindness and forbearance, and plaintiff never, during said time, gave defendant any cause or provocation or excuse to abandon her, and plaintiff neither caused, procured nor consented to such abandonment; but defendant, disregarding the solemnity of his marriage vows to plaintiff, went away from plaintiff, telling her at the time he left her that he was going away on some sort of business for the day and would return at night or in a short time, but did not return at the time he told plaintiff, but then and there abandoned plaintiff wholly without provocation or excuse and without any fault whatever on the part of plaintiff. Defendant left plaintiff more than three years prior to the filing of this suit, and left her with the intention of abandonment, and did abandon her; all of which was wholly without cause, excuse or fault on the part of plaintiff. Plaintiff has never seen defendant since he abandoned her on or about the 30th day of November, 1908, as aforesaid, and since said abandonment they have never lived together as husband and wife, nor co-habited together in any manner, and defendant has never contributed anything whatever to the support of plaintiff since said abandonment.

### SECOND:

When plaintiff married defendant she was a single girl by the name of Beulah Peel, and she sues for the restoration of her maiden name in this action as well as for divorce.

Wherefore, premises considered, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited as the law directs to appear and answer this petition, and that on final hearing plaintiff have judgment dissolving the marriage contract between plaintiff and defendant, and that plaintiff be restored to her maiden name, Beulah Peel, for all costs of this suit, and for such other and further relief, general or special, either at law or in equity, as plaintiff may be entitled to receive.

### The Pecan as Shade Tree.

Residents of San Antonio, Texas, are planning to replace the hackberry with the pecan for shade tree purposes. The grafted pecan, produces the large paper shell variety of nuts, will begin bearing the third year after planting. Furthermore, they may be planted in the midst of hackberry and other unprofitable trees, where they will thrive as if they were out in the open. In a few years after the pecan reaches a proper size the common forest tree can be gradually removed. Another advantage in having pecan trees in the front yards and ornamenting the parkings is the fact that flowers and shrubbery will grow and prosper underneath them, whereas, if planted in the shade of hackberry trees, flowers and shrubbery pine and die. The roots of the pecan reach deep into the earth, while the hackberry, it is argued, draws its chief substance from shallow soil.—American Fruits.

### SHOOTING DUCKS ILLEGAL.

New Federal Law Makes Killing of Wild Ducks Criminal.

A new federal law prevents the shooting of wild ducks in the United States has gone into effect. The law was passed the last congress and was signed, and the signing of the bill was one of the last acts of the former President Taft. This is known to very few, even among the regulars who annually shoot ducks.

Notwithstanding the fact that state codes may specify what the season shall be, these are null and void insofar as they relate to ducks and geese, a new federal statute making it an offense to shoot any of these fowls according to Washington reports. Relative to the new law a Washington correspondent says: "Hereafter it will be a crime to kill a wild duck anywhere in the United States. Wild ducks are not classed as migratory birds in the law just enacted, and a fine of \$100 and ninety days imprisonment are provided for a violation of the law.

"For a long time there was no agitation in favor of legislation for the protection of game fowls to prevent their complete extinction. It has been said that wild turkeys, wild geese and some other wild fowls have almost entirely disappeared all over the country. Wild ducks have become scarce and wild pigeons have disappeared, the only wild pigeons known in the country today being in the zoo at Cincinnati.

"So the government put a bill through congress as an order of the sundry civil appropriation bill to prohibit the killing of migratory birds and those which do not spend the entire year in one state, but which move from the north in the fall to the south and from the south to the north in the spring.

"Since the federal law has been passed the states cannot do anything to change the law. They cannot make duck shooting legal."—Brownwood Bulletin.

CARRIED FIRE FROM POWDER

Bravery and Presence of Mind of British Soldiers That Averted a Terrible Disaster.

On the taking of St. Louis Rodrigo, in 1812, by the British army under Wellington, Captain William Jones of the 52nd regiment, having captured a French officer, employed his prisoner in pointing out quarters for his men. The Frenchman could not speak English, and Captain Jones—a fiery Welshman, whom it was the fashion in the regiment to term "Jack Jones"—knew no French; but dumb show supplied the want of language, and some of the company were lodged in a large store pointed out by the Frenchman, who then led the way to a church, near which Lord Wellington and his staff were standing. But no sooner had the guide stepped into the building than he started back, crying "Sacre bleu!" and ran out in the utmost alarm. The Welsh captain, however, went on, and perceived that the church had been used as a powder magazine by the French; barrels were standing round, samples of their contents lay scattered on the pavement, and in the midst was a fire, probably lighted by some Portuguese soldiers. Captain Jones and the sergeant entered the church, took up the burning embers brand by brand, bore them safely over the scattered powder, and out of the church, and thus averted the most terrific disaster.

Woodchuck's Name.

One of the most noticeable traits of woodchucks is the throwing up of large piles of dirt in front of their burrows. It is from this practice that the woodchuck got his name. In olden times—probably in the time of Aesop—the lower animals used to live in one happy country with a judge over them, the dog. One day a rabbit whose burrow adjoined that of a marmot complained to the latter that the rabbits' eyes were continually filled with the dirt which he threw out of his burrow. The marmot paid no heed to this remonstrance, and the rabbit was compelled to appeal to the judge. His honor immediately sent word to the offender that greater care must be taken in the future. But the insolent marmot, notorious for his incivility and indifference, replied to the messenger that he "would chuck" his dirt just where he pleased.



First Encyclopedia.

The most ancient attempt at what is called in these days an "encyclopedia" was Pliny's "Natural History." This old work, a very high authority throughout the Middle Ages, is really a remarkable production and well deserves the fame that for so many ages belonged to it. Pliny, who died in 79 A. D., was not a naturalist, a physician or an artist, and did not pretend to be the wisest man of his time, yet such was his interest in knowledge that he devoted the leisure hours of a busy public life to compiling the work which did a vast amount of good in the world and paved the way for the comprehensive encyclopedias of the present time.

Enameling.

The process known as enameling is not of modern origin. On the contrary, it goes back to a venerable antiquity. If you will read up on the subject you will learn that excellent enamel is still preserved on some of the bricks that have been found among the ruins of old Babylon and Assyria, which have been placed back as far as the seventh or eighth century B. C. Beautiful glazes were made by the Egyptians as early as the sixth dynasty. The Greeks and Romans were acquainted with the art of enameling, as the museums of the world clearly show.
