W. S. Gattis Dead.

It is with deepest regret that The Standard chronicles the death of W. S. Gattis of Lohn, who passed away at Temple, where he had gone for treatment, on Sunday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock. The body was shipped to Brady on Monday, his sons, Blake and Tom, accompanying the remains from Temple, and upon its arrival here the body was received by members of Ben McCulloch Camp No. 563, U. C. V., and the Daughters of the Confederacy, who draped the coffin with flags and beautiful floral wreaths.

The funeral cortege then proceeded to Lohn where interment was made in the cemetery, funeral services being conducted by Rev. Simpson.

At the time of his death Mr. Gattis was about 68 years old. He was a member in good standing of the local Ben McCulloch Camp No. 563, and was highly

honored and respected by his comrades as well as by all who knew him. He served about three years in the Fourth Tennessee cavalry, Forrest's command, with a splendid record. After the war he settled in Texas, and some ten or eleven years ago he removed from Williamson county to McCulloch, making his home here ever since.

Mr. Gattis was an exemplary Christian, and was an elder in the Christian church at Lohn. His home life was ideal, and none knew him but to admire and praise him. For the past year or more he has been in failing health, and his condition gradually grew worse. As a last resort he was taken to Temple last week, but the doctors there were unable to do anything for him.

Surviving him are his wife, four sons, Tom, Jim, Blake and Grover, and three daughters, Mesdames W. M. Campbell of

Waldrip, John Stoughbough of Lohn and J. O. Ware, of Mercury.

BRADY MONDAY BIG DAY

IMMENSE CROWD ON HAND FOR FESTIVITIES.

Merchants Report Biggest Trade Since Fair Days of 1908. Gentry Show Excellent.

The Standard's predictions for or anticipation of a big crowd for First Monday were fulfilled in the largest measure. The crowds that thronged the streets of Brady were the crowds of the old-time Brady—a reminder of the good old days when 50,000 bales of cotton were marketed here. And the spirit was the same. The folks came to have a good time—and they had it. They came to take advantage of the merchants' offers—and they spent their money freely. They wanted to see the show, and they saw a good one. And those who came to sell their stock had the advan-

tage of the services of a first-class auctioneer, and from all accounts the sale yesterday afternoon was highly successful. And we must not forget to mention that those who anticipated a good dinner "just like mother used to serve" were the best pleased of all, for the Presbyterian ladies more than did their share towards making the day a success.

So the day was just one successful event piled on top of another, until the aggregation reached a height that will make the day an enduring monument to the credit of Brady and her citizens.

A better spirit never prevailed among the folks—a more orderly crowd could not have been had. The merchants were busy from early until late—and more than one has compared his business for the day to that of the McCulloch county fair days of 1908.

The Gentry Bros. show was crowded to capacity at both per-

formances, and more than pleased. In addition to the wonderful trained animals, the show boasts trapeze artists of the highest degree—and their funmakers combined skill and ability with their jollifications that astounded the audiences and all the while kept them convulsed with laughter.

On account of the numerous other attractions the horse and mule sales dragged yesterday morning, but in the afternoon interest heightened and many sales were made, the aggregate of which amounted to an immense sum.

Quite a number of exhibits were on hand yesterday, and practically all the chickens and other fowls were in place—and the showing was superb. Many of the exhibitors realizing the rush that would be on Monday and knowing that the judging would not take place until today, preferred not to place their exhibits until today; consequently the exhibit hall will be aug-

mented by numerous exhibits yet to be placed. A complete list of the premium winners will be published in our next issue.

Dick B. Taylor of Richland
 Springs has been spending sev-
 eral days in Brady demonstrat-
 ing his wonderful deep-rooted,
 drouth-resisting cotton, for
 which he claims a turnout of
 40% to 43% lint. Mr. Taylor
 has a stalk on exhibition at the
 Brady Commission Co. that is
 truly wonderful, and which
 bears out Mr. Taylor's state-
 ments. The stalk contains 118
 bolls, each boll having five locks,
 and every boll fully opened. The
 cotton is 1 1/8 inch staple, and
 in addition to all its other mer-
 its it has a small stalk—another
 feature in its favor.

A large number of progress-
 ive farmers have called upon
 Mr. Taylor and great interest
 has been taken in the cotton,
 many buying seed from him.
 Among the heaviest purchasers
 have been J. M. Stephens of
 Eden and E. A. Davis of Brady,
 each of whom have purchased
 twenty bushels.

Farmers are beginning to real-
 ize that it is just as important
 to have the best seed as it is
 to have the best stock, and the
 progressive farmers of McCul-
 loch county are always to be
 found in the lead when it comes
 to improvement, whether it be
 of method, management, stock
 or seed.

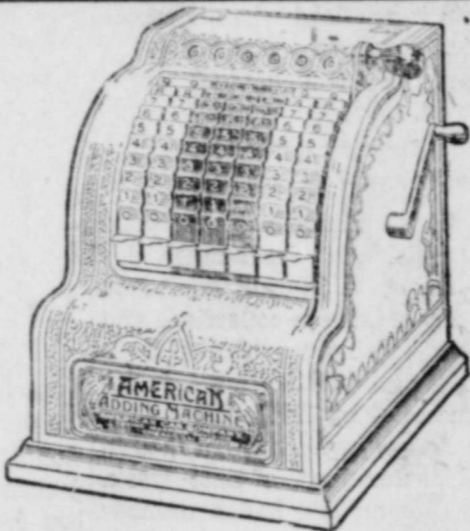

H. L. Potter, the public weigher, had weighed about 1950 bales Thursday at noon.

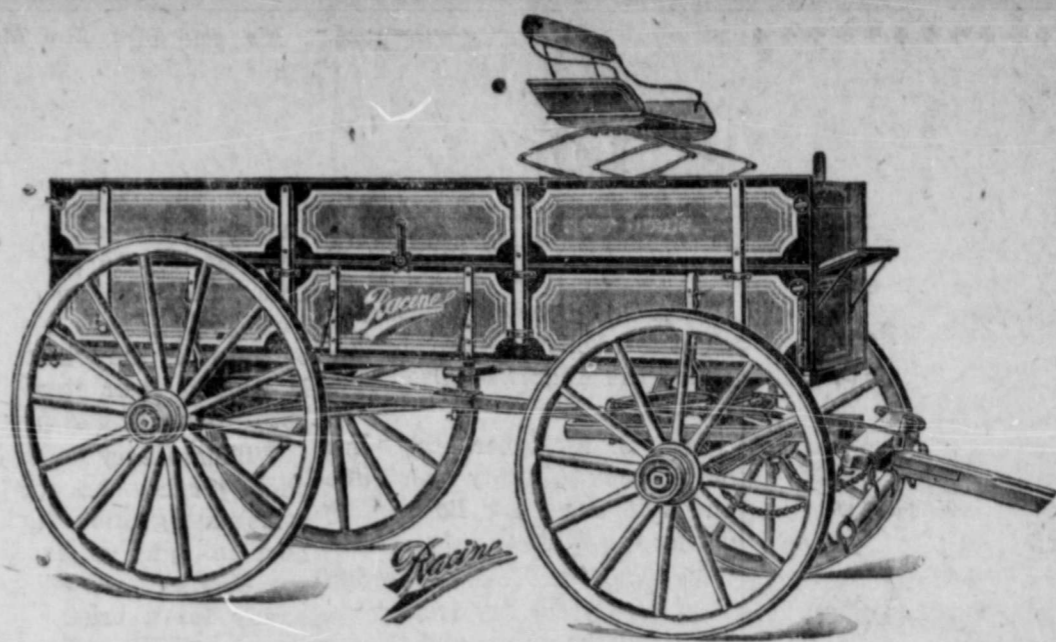
Mrs. Ed Baker and children of Brady were the guests of Mrs. J. C. Bourland a day or two this week.
