SANTA FE SPECIAL HERE DECEMBER 2ND.

Model Silo, Dairy and Poultry Equipment—Domestic Science and Better Tillage.

Continuing the great work inaugurated in years past, the Santa Fe railway is this year sending out a Silo, Dairy, Poultry and General Farming train, which is scheduled to be here on Tuesday, December 2nd, for two hours, from 11:40 a. m. to 1:40 p. m.

Included in the special demonstration will be the following: Two cars with model silos and silo equipment; a dairy car, with dairy cows and dairy equipment; a car of poultry and equipment; a domestic science car, and better tillage methods demonstration. J. D. Tinsley, agricultural demonstrator, will lecture on the subject of dairy cows; L. L. Johnson will advise as to the best methods of poultry raising; Misses Frances Lowen and Amanda Stoltzfus of the University of Texas will tell the ladies and girls about home management, while H. M. Bainer, Santa Fe agricultural demonstrator, will demonstrate tillage methods and better seed selection.

The demonstration is wholly educational and the efforts put forth by the Santa Fe are highly commendable. Their entire purpose is to help the citizens of Texas to become more prosperous, as their prosperity depends upon the prosperity of the citizens. The lecturers are all practical men and women and the lectures are entirely free.
