### CLEANEST TOWN CONTEST.

#### Brady Scores Within Three Points of Leaders.

December Hollands Magazine gives the standings of the towns in the various classes of Holland's "Cleanest Town" contest, and it is a source of gratification to the citizens to note that Brady, while not winner in her class, is among the leaders, having scored but three points below the leaders—Ballinger and Gonzales. These latter two towns tied for first place with a score of 90 points, while Brady tied with Big Springs for sixth place, each having scored 87 points.

There is reason for Brady citizens to congratulate themselves upon the result attained, for not only was it Brady's first attempt in a contest of this nature, but the leaders in Brady's class are in every instance cities of much greater population, and Brady's success in taking rank with them is a feather in her cap. In their attempt, Brady citizens worked faithfully and earnestly toward securing the desired results, and their failure in any respect was due more to unfamiliarity with the rules than to neglect of any particular detail. One point against Brady—the failure to screen stores—has since been overcome, and this would most likely aid in her score should another inspection be made.

### WILL REPAIR ROADS.

#### Commissioners to Take Action Today for Improvement.

At a called meeting of the Brady Commercial club yesterday morning the matter of the condition of the road in Road District No. 1 was taken up, and the following petition to the commissioners court was adopted:

"Whereas, we, the citizens of Road District No. 1 of McCulloch county, have some time ago voted the sum of \$75,000 upon ourselves for the improvement of the roads in said district, and

"Whereas, these roads are now in very bad condition, and going from bad to worse,

"We petition the honorable commissioners court of McCulloch county to take this matter in hand and use such money as may be necessary to make such repairs as may be needed.

"We call attention of the court that this sum of money named above—\$75,000—spent for roads above mentioned was spent without calling upon the funds of our county.

"We believe that the county should see that these roads are kept in repair."

Messrs. Lewis Brook and D. F. Savage circulated the list among the citizens of Road District No. 1, securing several hundred signatures which, together with the petition, were presented to the court.

While no action has been taken by the court at this writing, it is understood that the petition is viewed with general favor by that body, and that immediate steps will be taken to secure an expert road man to take charge of a crew of road workers, and that the county engine and road scrapers will be put at work at once upon all the roads in the district. # COUNTY CORRESPONDENCE

## LOST CREEK ECHOES.

Voca, Texas, Dec. 4.  
 Editor Brady Standard:  
 (Too late for last week.)  
 As I could not get you over the telephone Wednesday, will write you some of the happenings.  
 Wednesday morning we had the biggest rain of the thirteen days' rain. It fell two and one-half inches in less than twenty minutes.  
 John Norwood, after crossing his children over the creek at the school house, went back two or three times with his back to cross others. In the meantime the heavy rain fell and the creek was rising fast—much faster than Mr. Norwood thought, and after he had put all the children across he attempted to go back across some two or three boys started across with him. He saw it was getting dangerous and he told the boys to jump and make it back, and if he crossed all right he would come back after them, but by this time it was coming in big rolls, and when he struck the main current it washed his horses down and turned his back over. He jumped out of the back, the horses rolling over and over. He was in the water with his heavy clothing and boots on, and at one time he said his team and back was only about three feet above him. His team drowned and his back went about a mile down the creek and lodged in a drift, but was a complete wreck. Had it not been for the fact that Mr. Norwood was an excellent swimmer he would have drowned. He said at one time he thought his chances were slim to escape with his life, but good judgment and forethought overbalanced his fright and he made a desperate effort, with the result that he made it out safely. He said the most surprising thing was that when he got out his hat was setting on his head just like it was when he went in. The creek rose to a height of about nine or ten feet in about thirty-five minutes. The oldest settlers say they have not seen anything to equal this. The roads are torn up and washed out until it is next to impossible to travel them. The mail has not made but one or two trips in a week. I am told it takes four horses to get to Brady with an empty wagon.  
 We will have a bread famine in this country soon if the rain doesn't hold up.  
 Everyone has a pen full of fat porkers, but the warm, rainy weather won't permit of any butchering.  
 Volunteer oats are a foot high, but the ground is so boggy they can't be pastured down.  
 The ground is so boggy it is dangerous to ride out in the road, or even drive a team in the road.  
 No plowing can be done for three or four weeks, if then, if we have no more rain. A CITIZEN.
