Mustangs Hosting Happy Cowboys

The B.H.S. Mustangs are hoping for a change of luck when they host the Happy Cowboys in a 7:30 p.m. district game on Friday at Mustang Field.

The Cowboys will bring a 1-3-1 season record into the contest, while the Mustangs are still searching for their first season win.

Coach Rock Stanley admits that Happy poses a realistic chance for the Mustangs to break into the win column. "They beat White Deer, 8-7, and tied Vega last week, and Vega is tough, but we should have a chance at beating them," Stanley said.

Kory Mitchell sustained a partially separated shoulder, and Genaro Ruvalcaba a bruised sternum in Bovina's battle with Farwell, but both may be able to play on Friday.

Although the Mustangs fell, 36-0 to the Steers at Farwell, Stanley was encouraged by his team's performance. Bovina held the potent Steers scoreless for the first half, before they finally broke loose for 22 points in the third quarter.

"Although we didn't score, we were able to run the ball for good yardage, and that's a tribute to the hard work of our players," Stanley said.

The Mustang coach singled out Robert Guevara, with 13 tackles, and his brother Hector, with 12, as the top defensive players for Bovina in the Farwell game. Robert has been slowed with an ankle injury, and this has hurt the Mustang offense, but he is progressing.

Fr. Dran Tours Rome

Father Timothy Dran, pastor of St. Ann's Catholic Church in Bovina, recently returned from a trip abroad. He and a classmate priest attended a five-day World Spiritual Retreat for priests at the Vatican.

"It was a beautiful experience," Fr. Dran relates, "to mingle with over five thousand priests from all over the world."

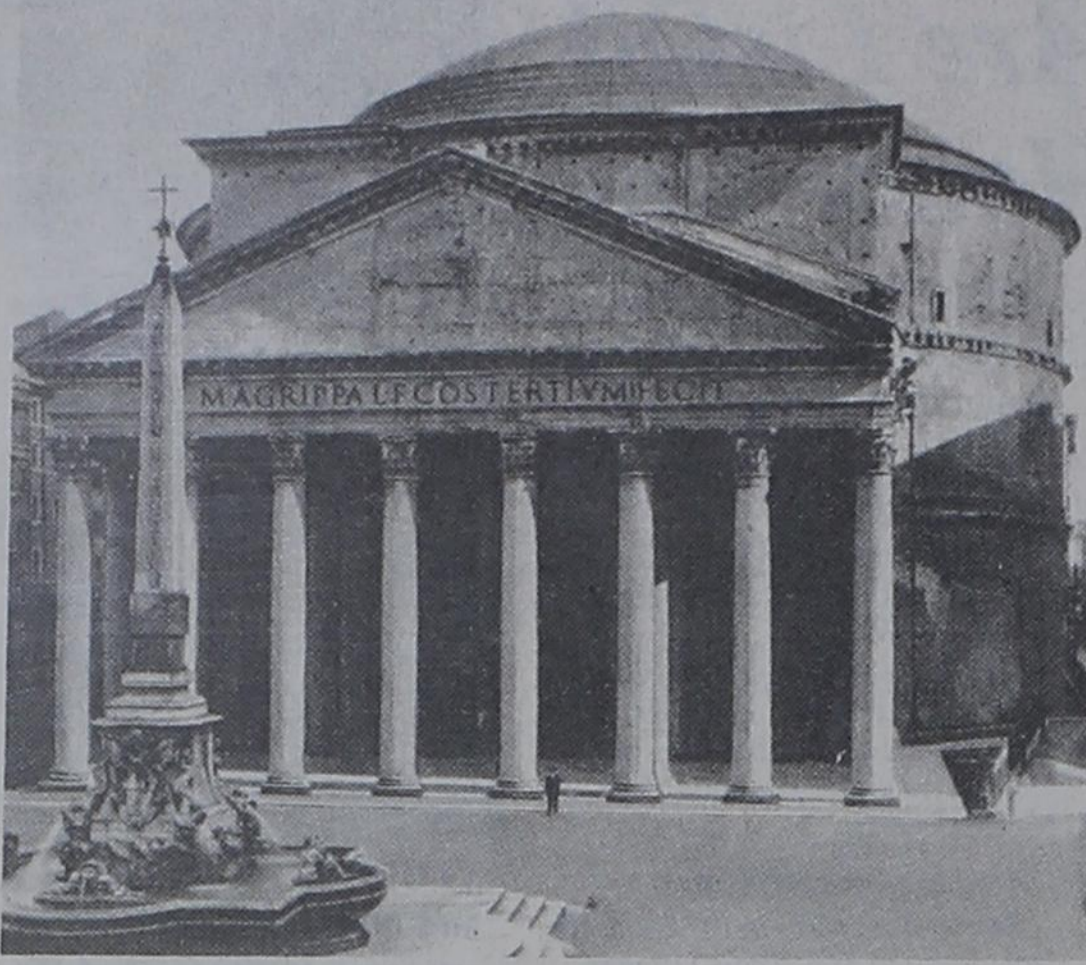
Since it's a small world, he met two friends, one from Canada and one from New Zealand. There were also one hundred Bishops and three Cardinals present for the retreat. Mother Teresa of Calcutta gave one of the conferences, as did Pope John Paul II.

Having been to Rome several times before, Fr. Dran said it was nice to return, especially to the famous fountain of Trevi, which was made famous by the Frank Sinatra movie, "Three Coins in the Fountain." It was during this movie that the custom was started of throwing three coins over your left shoulder into the fountain to assure yourself of a return visit to Rome, which Father Tim did.

He and his priest companion, Fr. Paul Haefner from Anson, Texas, rented a small Fiat and drove to Oberammergau, Germany to attend the world famous Passion Play, which is produced every ten years.

On the way back to Rome, a visit to everyone's saint, Francis of Assisi, was in order since Fr. Dran and Fr. Haefner are both Franciscan Missionary Priests belonging to the Franciscan Order founded by St. Francis in the year 1209.

Driving in Italy and Germany is a harrowing experience to say the
