RURAL MARKET SYSTEM

MARKETING AND RURAL CREDITS DISCUSSED.

McCulloch County Citizens Hear Dr. G. S. Wehrwein and J. D. **Tinsley on Live Questions.**

Supt. E. L. White, County Demonstrator J. B. Zachary, Mr. J. D. Tinsley of the Santa Fe Railroad, and Dr. G. S. Wehrwein of the University of Texas, have just completed a week's automobile trip throughout Mc-Culloch county, speaking at fifteen places. The trip was begun at Mercury on Monday, January 19th. From there they went to Placid and Rochelle the same day. The next day's meetings were held at Fife and Waldrip with an evening meeting at Lohn. On Wednesday they visited Pear Valley, Doole, and Stacy; Thursday, Melvin, Nine and Calf Creek, coming to Brady for the night. On Friday Camp San Saba, Lost Creek and Voca were covered, and the final Saturday afternoon. The itinerary covered a distance of about meeting was held at Brady on 200 miles and the total attendance at the meetings was about

The usual program consisted of introductory remarks by Supt. White, talks by Mr. Wehrwein and Mr. Tinsley, while Mr. Zachary closed with a few words explaining his work and inviting the farmers to co-operate with him, and the boys and girls to organize corn, maize, cotton and baby beef clubs. He further said that arrangements had been made to bring one of the lady agents to McCulloch county for a period of three months to do work with the girls in home economics.

Mr. Wehrwein, representing the Extension Department of the University of Texas, had for his theme the subject of Marketing and Rural Credits. He introduced his remarks by explaining the purpose of the Extension Department: He said in part:

"Since only one person out of every hundred has the opportunity of attending a higher institution of learning, the state universities of the United States feel that they ought to serve in some way the other ninety-nine who are not so fortunate as to be able to attend in person. Realizing that it is supported by the taxes of all the people the University of Texas has organized an extension department to extend its service to the people. It does this through correspondence instruction, through group study courses, and through lectures and demonstration work. The Division of Public Welfare is studing problems that confront the people of the state, especially the rural problems, such as Marketing, Cooperation and Rural Credits.
