MARKETING AND RURAL CREDITS DISCUSSED.

McCulloch County Citizens Hear Dr. G. S. Wehrwein and J. D. Tinsley on Live Questions.

Supt. E, L. White, County Demonstrator J. B. Zachary, Mr J. D. Tinsley of the Santa Fe Railroad, and Dr. G. S. Wehrwein of the University of Texas, have just completed a week's automobile trip throughout McCulloch county, speaking at fifteen places. The trip was begun at Mercury on Monday,

loch county is admirably adapt-
ed to the production of cream.
By clubbing together, an asso-
ciation may be formed in any
part of the county, no matter
how far from the railroad,
whereby the members can take
turns in going to town with the
cream. This plan is actually in
operation in eastern New Mex-
ico at a place 35 miles from the
railroad. This plan will over-
come the chief difficulty in mar-
keting cream, for the creamer-
ies of Brownwood, Ft. Worth,
and Belton will be glad to get it,
and will pay full market price
for it. Of course before the
