Receives Machinery.

The road building machinery ordered several weeks ago by the city and county was received here Friday and will be put into commission at once by the city in improving the streets. The machinery consists of a 6-ton road roller, a gyratory rock crusher with a capacity of 10 tons per hour and two steel dump wagons. The large oil-pull engine owned by the county will be used to operate the machinery and the work of improving the thoroughfares of the city will be started at an early date.

OSCAR SAMUELSON DIES.

Died at Marlin Sunday Afternoon of Heart Failure.

News was received here yesterday of the death of Oscar Samuelson, which occurred at Marlin at 2:00 o'clock Sunday afternoon, death being due to heart failure, from which he had suffered for some time.

Deceased had made his home in Fort Worth for the past four years, prior to which time he had been a resident of McCulloch county practically all his life, living in the East Sweden community. Several weeks ago he came to Brady in the hopes of benefitting his health, and after spending some time here decided to go to Marlin, and left about a week ago for that place. He grew worse, however, after reaching Marlin, and death came Sunday afternoon as a relief to his sufferings.

Surviving relatives are his father, John Samuelson, and two brothers, Amel and Chas., all living near this city, and one daughter, a little girl 7 or 8 years of age, who has made her home with relatives in Jones county since the death of her mother about six years ago.

The remains were shipped from Marlin yesterday and will arrive on the Santa Fe at 2:55 this afternoon. Funeral services and interment will follow at the East Sweden cemetery.

COTTON GINNINGS.

Show Healthy Increase Over Those of Past Year.

JOINS FEDERAL RESERVE.

Brady National Bank Votes to Enter Regional Bank System.

At a recent meeting of the directors of the Brady National bank of this city it was decided to enter the federal reserve system under the new currency reform bill which became a law on December 23rd. Under this new legislation every national bank must vote on the question as to whether or not they will enter the system and those voting adversely are required to become state or private banks within a year from the time the law became operative.

One of the greatest advantages of the new system is that new currency may be issued by the government on commercial paper, whereas, under the old law it could only be issued when secured by government bonds, thus almost eliminating the possibility of panics. It also takes away much of the power of Wall street to produce these panics at will, as has been the case in the past, and is considered by bankers as the most feasible solution of the currency problem.

The Brady National is to be congratulated on this step in keeping in the forefront of progress and development.

T. W. Mooring was here from Rochelle Saturday to assure receiving The Standard regularly during the year. Mr. Mooring has just about completed the breaking of 400 acres, most of which will be put in cotton. He says he has 125 acres of oat pasture and about 25 of wheat, on which he is pasturing 20 head of horses. He says the horses prefer the wheat, grazing it down to the roots, while scarcely touching the oats.

CHILD DIES.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Amel Samuelson Succumbs to Snakebite.

After a week of intense suffering William, the 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Amel Samuelson, died Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock. The child was bitten a week ago last Sunday by a large rattlesnake, and his life has been despaired of since that time.

The funeral services were held at the home three miles east of the city Sunday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, conducted by Rev. I. T. Morris, pastor of the Methodist church, followed by interment at the East Sweden cemetery.

DIED AT MASON.

Pioneer Citizen of Mason Passed Away Saturday Morning.

R. H. Garner, one of the oldest and most highly respected citizens of Mason county, passed away at his home in Mason at 1:00 o'clock Saturday morning, after an illness covering a period of two years or more, aged 66 years, 3 months and two days.

Mr. Garner was a native of the state of Georgia. He came to Texas about forty years ago, settling in Grayson county, where he lived for a short time. He came to Mason thirty-four years ago and engaged in the hotel business, continuing in that line up to the time of his death.

He was a member of the I. O. O. F. fraternity and took a lively interest in the work of the lodge, very rarely missing a meeting, and was loved for his big-hearted generosity. He never refused an accommodation to anyone when in his power to grant it, and he was one of the most popular citizens of the county.

Surviving Mr. Garner are his widow, one son and three daughters, as follows: Ovy Garner, San Antonio; Mesdames R. C. Doell and Oscar Seaquist of Mason and Joe M. Lyle, of this city, all of whom were in attendance at the bedside when the end came.

The funeral services were held at the home Sunday morning at 10:00 o'clock, Rev. C. H. Garrett, pastor of the Baptist church conducting the services, after which the remains were

turned over to the I. O. O. F. lodge and were interred in Gooch cemetery after the full commitment service of the order.

LET FACTS BE KNOWN.

Probably everyone has heard the story of the teacher who was taking up the study of physiology with her class. One day the teacher received a letter from the mother of one of her pupils stating: "Dear teacher, please don't teach my daughter nothin about this phisology, as it is hard to say. The company about her innards." This is the view some people take upon the white slave traffic problem. It is not a nice subject, and they care to know nothing about it or the conditions which lead to the flourishing of the traffic. Yet there is but one way to overcome this world-wide and world-old problem, and that is by presenting the facts as they really are to an intelligent and thinking people.

"The Traffic" was prohibited production in two Texas cities—Waco and Houston. Just why it is hard to say. The compton having its presentation has the rights for production in seven states, and the play has been shown all the way from California to Texas, everywhere receiving the highest of endorsements from ministers, prominent citizens and clubs. Houston has the reputation of being one of the wickedest, if not the wickedest city in Texas—and Waco does not number among the best. Possibly it was feared "The Traffic" might arouse the better class of citizens of these cities against the regime of vice and result in a "clean-up" that would have marked the beginning of a new era.

At any rate those who are opposed to the play are so hopelessly in the minority, and the effect of the play is so positively for the good that it is sure to triumph in the long run, and those folks who do not care to know anything in regard to the "innards" of modern economic conditions will live to learn that the basis of good government and the remedy for social problems lies in acquainting the people with the conditions as they actually exist, and thereby arousing the interest and the co-operation of those who are in position to help overcome the conditions contributing to this horrible state of affairs.

TAX PAYMENTS GOOD

BEST COLLECTIONS IN MANY YEARS.

Delinquent Tax List Will Be Small—1612 Polls Paid. Up to Feb. 1st.

The county tax collector's office is a quiet place this week, a fact duly appreciated by Collector Silas Mayo and his force, after a rush lasting for the past two months or more. Saturday was the last day for the payment of taxes before the added penalty of 10% becomes effective, and the payments that day were unusually heavy. Mr. Mayo states that collections this year have been better than any in the history of his connection with the office and that the work has been handled with more ease and dispatch than ever before. He states that much of this is due to the cooperation of the citizens, and for which he is duly appreciative.

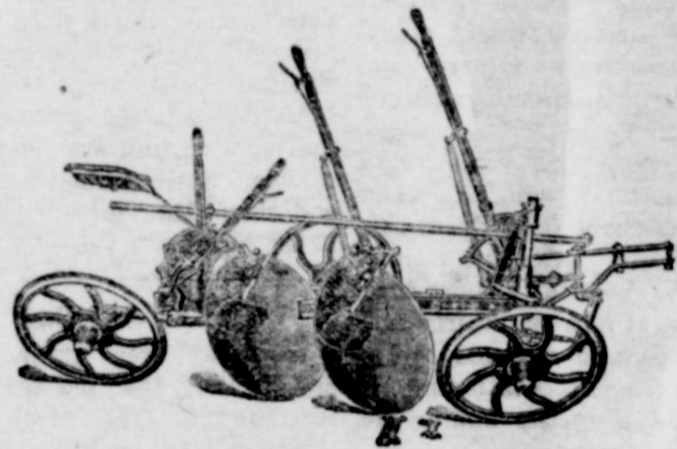

F. Gensberg has returned from Brady, where he had been visiting and on business. He was accompanied home by E. Berman of Miles, Texas.

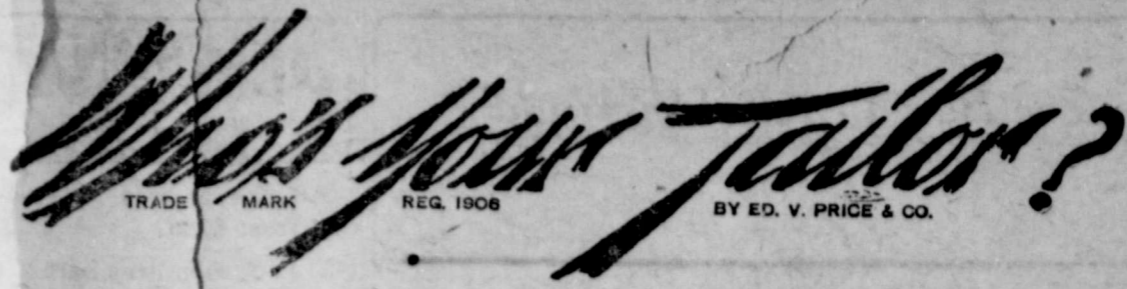

"THE TRAFFIC"

**Pronounced Best Performance
Witnessed in Brady.**

The citizens of Brady and vicinity had the opportunity last Saturday night of witnessing one of the best performances ever presented in Brady—"The Traffic," at the Lyric Opera House. Had the entire United States been searched from end to end, no better company could have been gotten together for the presentation of this remarkable play. Every player fitted his part to perfection; in fact, the play seemed written especially for the players, so well did each one adapt himself to his respective part. As an emotional actress, Miss Ruth Vernon is unsurpassed. She fairly lives the part she plays, and many an eye was wet with tears at the trying ordeals through which she was made to pass. Ethelyndal McMullin as Mrs. Mollie McGuire, with her rich melodious voice and her quaint and aptly spoken truths, was a general favorite, as was also Frank Kelly, as the true-hearted and somewhat backward doctor. Grace George as Rosalinda was as airy a butterfly as ever fluttered about the Great White Lights, and Grant Raymond Nye was a villain if ever there was one. Ella Houghton played the part of the invalid sister with perfect fidelity, and in each of their roles the remaining members of the company acquitted themselves with highest credit.

"I ask you for help; I ask you for sympathy; I ask you for interest. Through me speak all the many thousands who have gone down by the short cut to destruction, because we did not know the things we should have

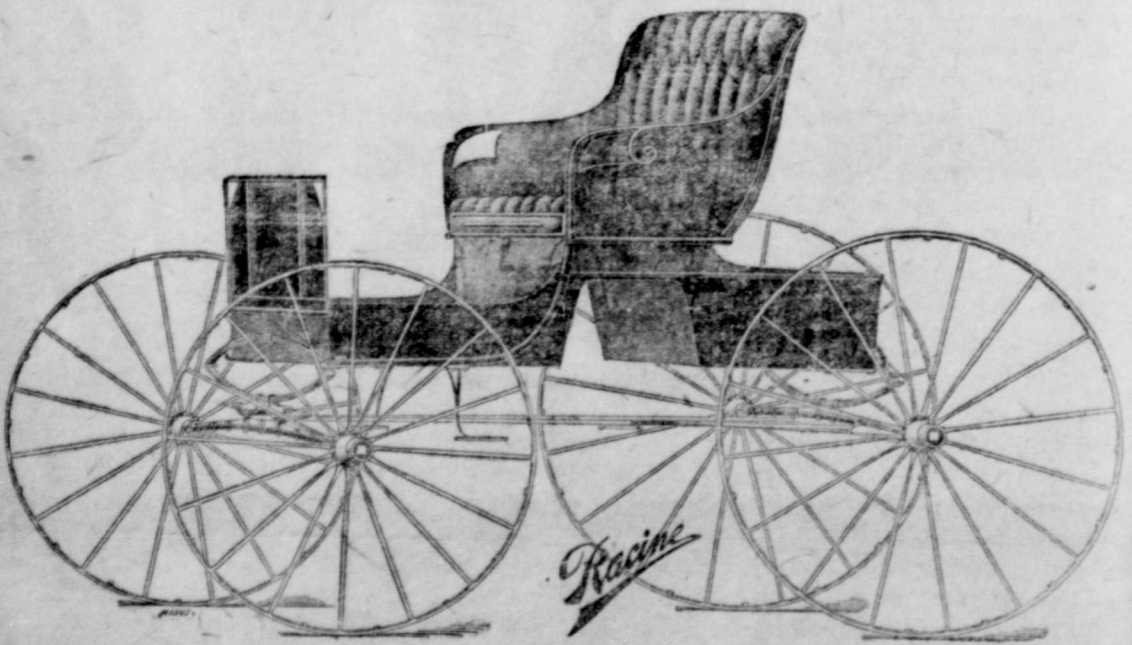
