More Profits From Fowls.

This is a very favorable time to extend the poultry operations of our farm homes. With meats of all kinds high and the supply decreasing rapidly, it would seem that poultry and eggs will be more in-demand as foods for the family table.

Pork, beef, mutton and cured meats are not always convenient for the farm home—some distance from the market. Nor is it desirable to slaughter a pig, a calf or a lamb upon short notice when the weather is unfavorable for keeping the meat. With fowls it is always in order to have one for the family meal when unexpected company arrives or for extra hands for emergency in farm work. Eggs are cheap sources of protein when compared to meats and they are easily and quickly prepared for serving.

City people are apt to use more poultry products on their tables since the parcel post and cheaper express rates make it possible to secure these products directly from the farm. This will mean increased opportunities in raising fowls on our farms.

With an abundance of grain, plenty of grazing crops, open space and sanitary houses, poultry make a profitable side line on the farm.—Farm and Ranch.

Arrested on Old Charge.

GRAND JURY ADJOURNS.

Finishes Work for the Term in Period of Six Days.

The grand jury for the February term of district court adjourned Saturday afternoon, their labors covering a period of six days. Seven true bills were returned—one felony and six misdemeanors.

In discharging the jury Judge Goodwin paid a high tribute to Sheriff J. C. Wall and his efficient corps of deputies. He stated that the conditions existing in this county were due to the vigilance of the sheriff's department in suppressing crime of all kinds, and that McCulloch county could boast of one of the best—if not the very best—sheriffs in the entire state of Texas. Because of the absence of lawlessness the fees of the office have dwindled until there is a bare living for the sheriff, and Judge Goodwin recommended that the commissioners court provide a salary commensurate with the services rendered.

The following report was made by the grand jury:

To the Honorable John W. Goodwin, District Judge, 35th Judicial District of Texas.

Sir: We your Grand Jury empaneled for this the District Court of McCulloch County, make this as our report to you.

We have spent six days in our work, investigating every matter that has been called to our attention in the way of violations of the law. After diligent inquiry and investigations we have returned into your court only one indictment for a felony and six for misdemeanors. The most of us have served on the grand jury heretofore in this county and are glad to say that we find conditions better than ever before as to observance of the law, and diligence of officers. We are glad to say that crime is rapidly disappearing from our county, and hope that conditions may continue to improve.

We are especially glad to report to you that no complaint has been made to us and no case reported as to cattle theft. We feel that cattle theft is a violation that has almost disappeared from our county.

Some complaint has been made to us as to violations of the local option law, but after careful investigations, we find the suspicion unfounded. We are glad to say that this law is vigorously enforced in our county, and feel that the bootlegger is a thing of the past.

We wish to mention specially the good condition of our court house, and the faithful and efficient way in which our janitor attends to his duty. We find the court house in a cleaner condition than we have ever seen a court house kept.

We have visited the jail and find only one prisoner incarcerated therein; he being on the charge of petty theft. We find the jail in fair condition with the exception of some little repairs needed on the stairway. We recommend that new bedding be furnished to the jail.

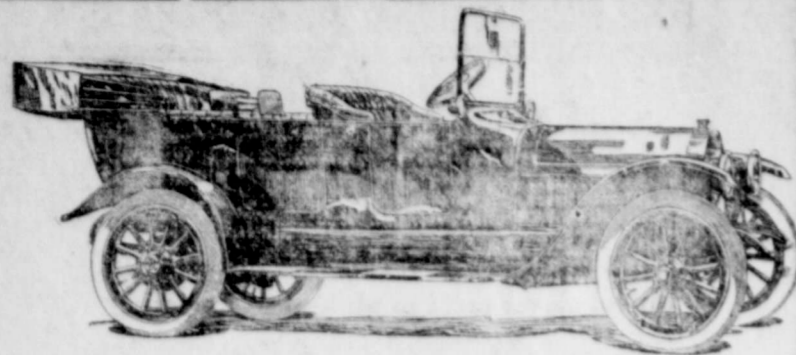

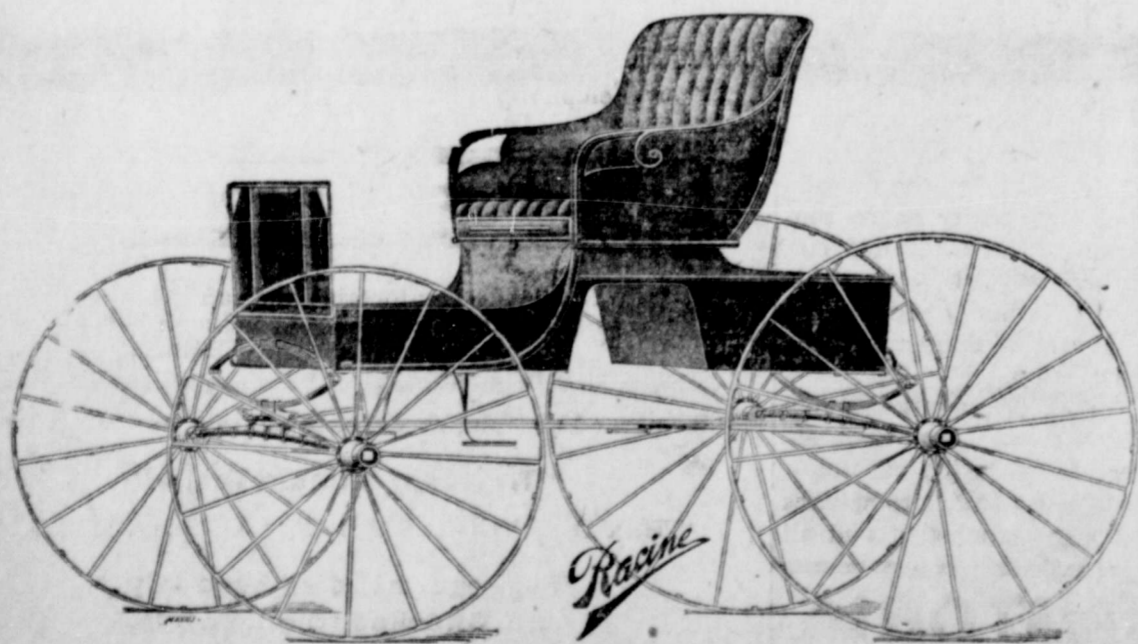

SCHOOLS CONSOLIDATE.

One Three-Teacher School in Place of One-Teacher Schools.

Supt. E. L. White spoke to a mass meeting of the citizens of Ward, Prairie View and Dutton communities at Ward on Saturday night. The advantages of a consolidated school over a one-teacher school were discussed, as was also the manner of effecting a consolidation.

At the close of the meeting, the trustees of the three districts signed a petition for consolidation to the County Board of Education. The citizens present endorsed the plan by also signing the petition. The details of the consolidation will speedily be worked out, and the new school, which will be centrally located, will be ready for the next school year. The new district will be known as Dutton No. 42. There will be three teachers employed.

This is considered a great stride toward bettering school conditions in this county. While there are a number of isolated districts for which consolidation will be impracticable for some time to come, it is thought that several more consolidations will take place within the next few months. There is a movement on foot for the consolidation of the Stacy, Doole and Williams districts in the northwestern part of the county. Voca, Liberty and Lost Creek have been considering consolidation since last summer, and it is thought that it will be effected there before a great while. The consolidated school offers the best opportunity for the boy and girl who live in the country to obtain an education at home.
