COMMISSIONERS COURT

March Term Adjourned Yesterday After Short Session.

The business of the commissioners court for the March term was completed yesterday afternoon and the court adjourned until April 13th.

Contrary to the expectations and wishes of many citizens of the county the court failed to raise the salary of the sheriff's office. A committee appointed by the local commercial club appeared before the court Tuesday morning to ask that the sheriff's salary be increased. The committee was composed of Judge F. M. Newman, president of the club, Secretary T. P. Grant and W. D. Crothers.

No action was taken in regard to improving the Camp San Saba road, a matter also being urged by the commercial club. It is likely that the court will take some action at the next term.

G. C. Parker was allowed the sum of \$50 for house rent for county paupers, and the clerk was authorized to pay Mr. Parker \$2.50 per month so long as his house was used.

The oath of office of H. F. Winslow of Voca as a deputy tax assessor was received by the court.

The annual statement of W. D. Crothers as treasurer of the

county school funds was examined, found correct and duly approved.

Quarterly tabular statement of County Clerk W. J. Yantis for the term ending February 28th was examined and approved.

Report of County Treasurer John Rainbolt for the quarter ending February 28th was examined, found correct and approved.

The report of Tax Collector S. H. Mayo for the months of January and February were examined and approved.

T. H. Alexander was allowed the sum of \$28.15 for a 20-foot right-of-way for a public road through his property.

E. B. Baldrige, Thos. Mitchell, J. M. Smart, Oscar Marshall and Will Bradley were appointed as a jury of view for a new road petitioned by W. S. Fullager and others.

The sum of \$250 was ordered set aside for the construction of a concrete crossing on Elm creek and Thos. Mitchell was appointed to supervise the construction of the improvements.

Juries of view were appointed on three petitions for new roads in the Waldrip, Lohn and Rochelle communities.

SAN SABA ELECTION.

County Remains in Dry Column as Result of Election.

The pros made a clean sweep in the election held in San Saba county last Saturday, carrying nineteen out of the twenty-four voting precincts. The majority for prohibition is the largest in the history of the county. In the last election held about ten years ago the pro majority was 273. That was the largest majority ever recorded in the county before. The general opinion was that the rigid enforcement of the Allison liquor law would make many so-called "whisky drinking" pros vote the anti ticket. The results, however, did not bear out this claim.

Richland Springs gave the largest majority for prohibition, with the town of San Saba a close second. At Richland the majority was 64 out of a total vote of 214, while San Saba polled 449 votes and gave a pro majority of 61. Anti majorities are shown in the vote at Pleasant and Northwest. There were 1888 polls paid in the county last year and the total vote cast in Saturday's election would indicate considerable interest in the result.

The total vote in the county was: For prohibition, 1011; against prohibition, 684; majority, 321. These figures are

shown by returns received over the telephone and may be changed slightly as a result of the official count by the commissioners court which will convene on the 19th for the purpose of canvassing the returns.
