#### TEXAS WEATHER.

##### Unusual Spell Experienced in Brady Yesterday.

Even the oldest settlers "sat up and took notice" of the weather dished out to the citizens of Brady yesterday, and probably none of them ever experienced such a variety before.

Wednesday was a balmy spring day and it seemed that the time to "take 'em off" had arrived at last. A heavy bank of clouds was to be seen in the north late in the evening, however, and about 2:30 a brisk norther arrived, causing the mercury to tumble precipitately, reaching a mark of 33 degrees yesterday morning.

At about 7:30 yesterday morning rain began falling in thin mist which continued for a period of about two hours, when a mixture of sleet, snow and rain began. This lasted for something like an hour and a half, when the precipitation changed to snow entirely. It fell thick and fast until about 1:00 o'clock, when the sun shone out brightly for a short time and by 6:00 o'clock yesterday afternoon the sky was practically devoid of clouds and the mercury had risen about six degrees. This freak dished out by the weather clerk has probably never been experienced before in any climate and the most fastidious person

could have his choice of weather yesterday.

The West Texas Telephone Co. reports rain, sleet and snow at Rochelle, Mercury, Brownwood, Coleman, Santa Anna, Richland Springs, San Saba, Mason, Voca, Katemcy, Hext and Menard, the precipitation at the various points being about the same as at Brady. An estimate of the total amount of rain, sleet and snow combined is conservatively placed at three-quarters of an inch.

Coming on the heels of the rain of a week ago it will be of untold benefit to crops of all kinds in this section, and it is said that no damage will result to the fruit, from the fact that the freeze was a "wet" one, which rarely, if ever, does any damage.
