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Dallas, Tex., April 11.—This city has been officially named as one of the twelve points in which a Federal Reserve National Bank will be located. This decision was arrived at last week in Washington by the Reserve Bank Organization Committee, after a lengthy consideration and marks the culmination of a three month's fight, which was waged so successfully by the local Chamber of Commerce and the various banking institutions of Dallas. Twelve of these systems will be established in the United States under the new currency law which was recently enacted. The twelve banks will have a combined capitalization of \$109,898,417. The Federal Bank to be located here will be established in District No. 11 and will have a capital of \$5,634,091. The territory covered by this district includes all of Texas and part of New Mexico, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arizona.

To My Friends In McCulloch County.

Do not be alarmed at the reports of opposition to me in San Saba county. We had a representative of the liquor interests in San Saba county, one Mr. Cohn, who some weeks ago, some time in January, spent some time in San Saba inquiring into the prohibition situation and the probability of my defeat for re-election and how a certain prospective candidate against me would run. He talked with me as well as five or six others who reported his conversation to me. Afterwards he went to Brady and made some investigation there. Since he was here there has been a continuous effort on the part of the liquorites to get out a candidate against me but their efforts have failed. 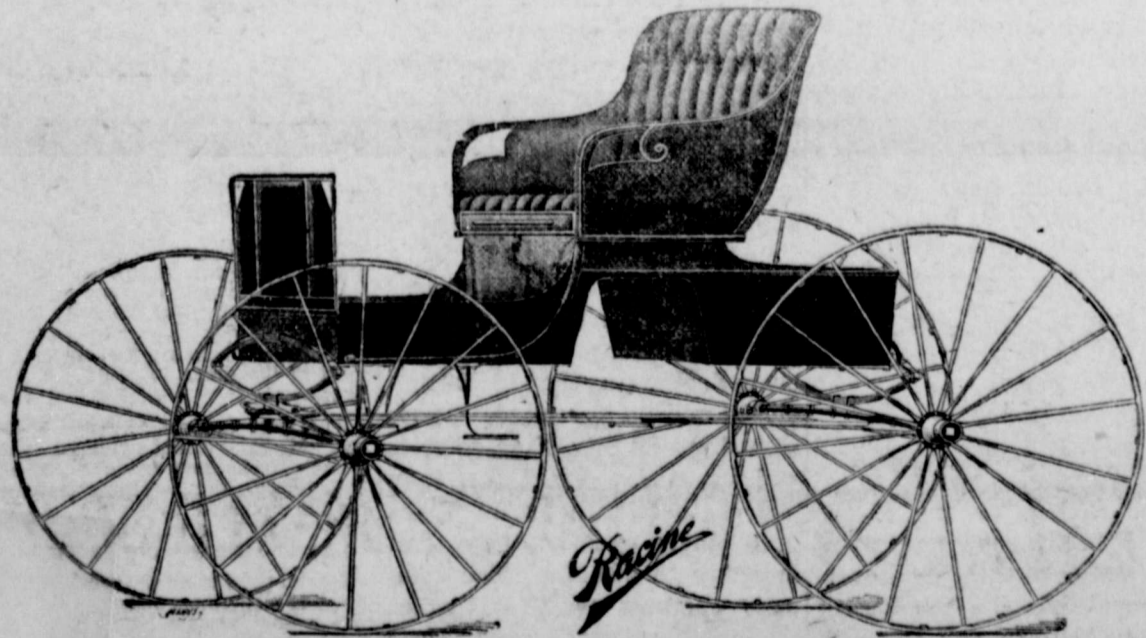
