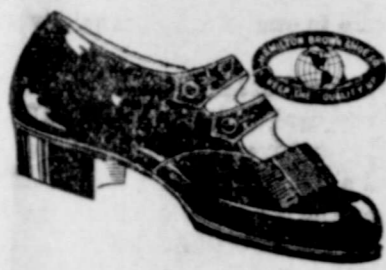

#### SCHOOLS CONSOLIDATE.

Will Erect Modern School Building Near Voca.

The progressive citizens of the Voca and Liberty school districts this week voted to consolidate the two, and will shortly begin the erection of a commodious and modern building which will be completed in time for the opening of the fall term in September. The new building will cost approximately \$7,000, and will be located about a mile south of the town of Voca.

At a meeting of the county board of education held yesterday morning the two districts were formally consolidated, and will be known as Montgomery No. 44—a name selected by patrons of the two schools, honoring Jeff F. Montgomery of this city, who has served as president of the county board since the creation of that body some two years ago, and to whose persistent work the combining of the schools is largely attributed.

The faculty of the new school will consist of four teachers, and the curriculum will include courses in manual training and agriculture. Some work will also be done in home economics. The board has secured a tract of about ten acres of ground adjoining the lot on which the new building will be located to

be used by classes in agriculture, and a capable instructor will be employed for this important subject.

The action of the patrons of these two schools is most commendable, and is the result of much work done by Pres. Montgomery of the county board and County Superintendent E. L. White, both of whom have worked diligently in the matter, ably aided by a number of the most prominent citizens of the district affected by the consolidation, notable among whom are Dr. O. C. Jackson, F. M. Hopkins, John Deans, J. J. Armor and others.

#### Long Motorcycle Trip.

John Champion, Willard Morgan and Joe Clingman of Brownwood passed through the city Wednesday afternoon en route to the Llano crossing on the San Saba river, where they will spend several days on a fishing trip. The trip was made on motorcycles, two of the boys riding one machine, while the other carried a large quantity of fishing tackle and camp equipment. They reported the road between Brownwood and Mercury very rough, one of the boys having been thrown off the machine several times, but escaped injury each time.

Pioneer Citizen of McCulloch Passed Away Sunday.

Following an illness of four weeks, J. F. Lemons, one of the pioneer citizens of McCulloch county passed away Sunday morning at his home four miles east of Voca at 5:55 o'clock at the mature age of 75 years, 3 months and 18 days, senile debility being the direct cause of death. Mr. Lemons maintained throughout his last illness that he experienced no pain whatever.

Deceased came to this county 31 years ago from Cook county, Texas, settling in the southern portion of the county, where he has made his home and where he has successfully reared a large family of children, all of whom, together with his wife, survive. 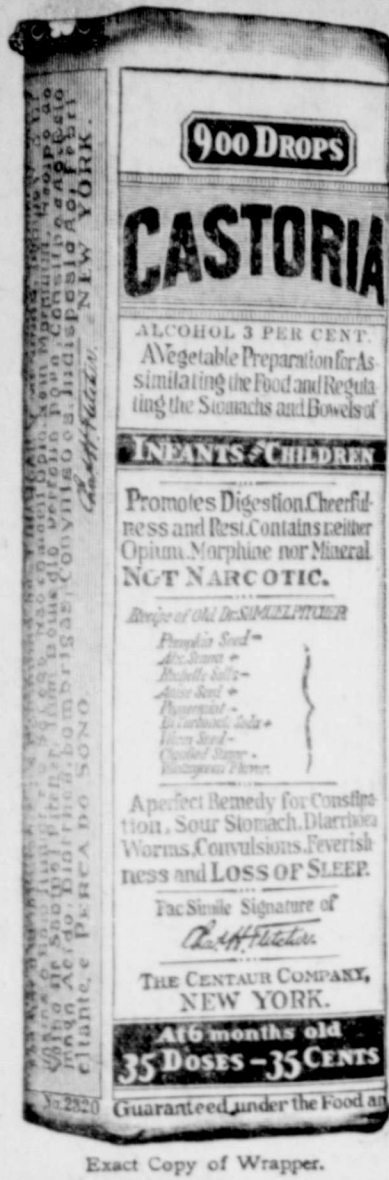

## BOOSTERS.

We have always had a great deal of admiration for a booster. We like the man who is in love with the community in which he lives and who never overlooks an opportunity to give it a boost. We have them in Brady; other small towns have them, but we believe that the city of Waco can boast the largest aggregation of real live wires of any city of its size in the United States. In the Young Men's Business League that city has an organization of 1750 of the most energetic town builders to be found anywhere.

Opportunity never knocks at the doors of that progressive city—the Young Men's Business League goes out and invites her in—in fact the doors are never closed to her. Waco has made rapid strides in the direction of becoming a city in the past few years, and whatever progress she has made in this direction is attributed in a large measure to the activity of this body of young men. One commendable feature of their activities is that they are not merely boosters for Waco, but for Texas as well, and one of the latest undertakings of the club is the raising of sufficient funds to provide for the purchase of a silver service to be presented to the new battleship Texas.

The club has voluntarily assumed the task after the failure of a commission appointed for the purpose, and our prediction is that they will succeed. As an organization they have no selfish interests to further in this matter; they simply feel that it would be a disgraceful reflection upon the patriotism of Texas and her people should the citizenship of this great state fail to do what every other state which has been fortunate enough to have a battleship named for it has done.

The plan is to raise these funds by private subscriptions through the commercial bodies of the towns of the state and the local club has been asked to assist, but has, as yet, taken no action in the matter, but will likely receive consideration at the meeting of the directors Monday afternoon.

Texas is too big and her citizenship too loyal to allow the efforts of the Waco boosters to go for naught in this behalf.

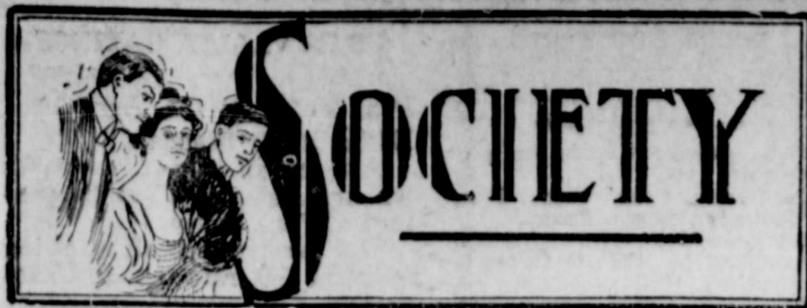

### Education By Moonlight.

A young school teacher in the mountain regions of Kentucky has reduced the illiterates in one county from 1,100 to 23 within three years. Touched by the sad conditions of the uneducated people, many of whom were not only willing but anxious to learn, she originated the idea of having school at night for parents who could neither read nor write. On account of the treacherous roads of the mountain district, these schools were only held on nights when the moon was shining, hence their name "The Moonlight Schools of Kentucky."

Many men and women who, three years ago, were unable to write their own names, are now teaching in the schools, and the farmers who barely existed are becoming well to do because of scientific methods they have adopted since they learned to read literature sent them by the government.

While the per cent of illiterates in Texas is indeed small compared with that of the older states, yet the example of the Kentucky teacher might be well followed in isolated sections of the state where education is difficult to obtain.

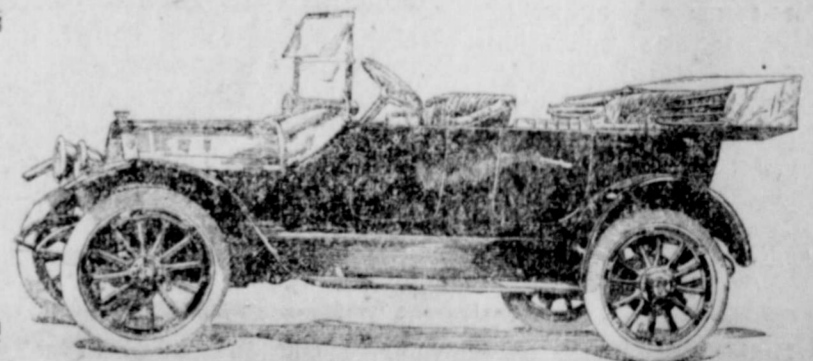

**For Full Rendition.**  
The State Tax Board has sent to the tax assessors of the state copies of the following resolution, showing the attitude of the Board with reference to rendition of property for taxation:

Whereas, in a great many counties in this state the assessed value of property for taxation for 1913 was grossly under the reasonable cash market value thereof and so far below its true value as to indicate a flagrant violation of the law governing the assessment of property for taxation, and

Whereas, it is the duty of the State Tax Board to investigate into and aid in the enforcement of the revenue laws concerning the assessment and rendition of property for taxation; and

Whereas, the systematic and gross undervaluation of property for assessment for taxation in any county works an injustice and hardship upon the counties where property is fairly assessed in accordance with law:

Therefore, Be it resolved, by the State Tax Board, that said board will do all it legitimately can to enforce the law governing the rendition and assessment of property for taxation and will report to the Attorney General of the State of Texas any case of flagrant violation of said law which may come to the knowledge of said board during the year 1914, in order that suit may be brought by the Attorney General against such officer or officers so offending, as provided by Article 7574 of the Revised Statutes of Texas, 1911.

Resolved, Further, that the State Tax Commissioner be and is hereby directed to mail to each county tax assessor and county judge in the state a copy of these resolutions.

I hereby certify that the above and foregoing instrument is a true and correct copy of the preamble and resolutions adopted by the State Tax Board on January 3, 1914, as set out and shown in the Minutes of said board on pages 242-3 of the Minute Record of said board. # The United States is Now Divided Into Twelve Banking Districts

The first decisive step toward the establishment of the Federal Reserve Banks under the new banking law was taken last week when the reserve bank organization committee in Washington, D. C., announced the twelve banking districts and the twelve cities where Federal Reserve Banks are to be located.

The Brady National Bank of Brady, will be a member bank of the eleventh district under the new banking law. The eleventh district is composed of the following states: All of Texas, Western Louisiana, Southern New Mexico, Southern Oklahoma and five counties in Southern Arizona.

The Regional Bank for the eleventh district will be established in the city of Dallas, Texas.

The bank will have a capital of \$5,634,091.00. There will be 726 member banks in this district.

As a member bank of the eleventh district, the Brady National Bank will give to the people of this community and the territory we serve, every advantage and benefit of the new financial and currency system now in process of organization.
