It was at first thought that a splinter had penetrated the eye ball, but an examination by the Brownwood specialist Tuesday morning showed that the ball had been burst by the force of the blow. He states that there is a possibility of saving the sight, but that this is not probable.

At last reports the patient was doing nicely, having suffered very little pain as a result of the accident.

### MRS. J. W. EMBRY DEAD.

End Came Suddenly at 11:05  
o'Clock Last Night.

As a severe shock to the entire community came the announcement last night of the death of Mrs. J. W. Embry at the home of the family in the southwestern portion of the city at 11:05 o'clock, death resulting from an attack of heart failure.

Mrs. Embry had been enjoying her usual health, and had not complained of illness, being in her usual jolly mood last evening before retiring for the night. About 10:15 she was stricken with an attack of heart failure, and despite all efforts of attending physicians, death ensued about forty minutes later.

Mrs. Embry was 64 years of age, and had resided in Brady for the past ten years, coming here with her husband and family from Decatur, where they had lived for a number of years. She was born and reared in Ellis county, and was a member of one of the pioneer families of that section of the state.

Mrs. Embry was the mother of fourteen children, nine of whom are dead. Surviving mem-

bers of her family are her husband, J. W. Embry, three sons, Otis, of Sherman, Nollie B. and Britton, and one daughter, Miss Fannie, of this city. Edgy Fields of Fort Worth and Miss Willie Fields of Nashville, Tenn., brother and sister of Mrs. Embry, also survive her. She also has a half brother and sister, Wash Fields and Mrs. G. G. Tankersley, the former residing at Childress and the latter at Fort Worth.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3:00 o'clock at the home, followed by interment at the city cemetery.

### House Struck by Lightning.

The residence of Mr. and Mrs. S. L. Hurd in East Sweden community was slightly damaged Wednesday when a bolt of lightning struck the building.

The bolt struck the roof of the kitchen on the north side of the building, tearing a big hole and ripping off a number of shingles. Members of the family were severely shocked, but no one was injured.

## COUNTY CORRESPONDENCE

### LOST CREEK ECHOES.

Voca, Tex., June 16th.  
Editor Brady Standard:  
We had one of the biggest rains of the season last night. The precipitation of last night was about three and three-fourth inches and it has continued raining all the morning, although it is only a slow steady rain.  
Lost Creek is higher than the writer has ever seen by about four feet, in the nine years that I have lived on it. About a thirteen foot rise this morning. The river above the mouth of the

creek was reported as having on a rise of about eight feet and rising fast.  
For a few days last week, we felt uneasy about the corn crop as it looked like we might be going to have some hot, dry weather but we are now assured of a good crop of corn. With a good crop of oats already harvested and a good corn crop in sight along with a good crop of sorghum cane and maize, already made except the maturing, is saying a good deal for McCulloch county farmers.  
The cotton crops are fairly well, but we can not make any guess as yet as to the amount

of cotton that will be made, we can only hope for a good one. As to garden vegetables of all kinds, we can only say that they are having an abundance.

One day last week, the writer was at Camp San Saba, I have not been there for years, though I had heard of the many artesian wells in the Camp San Saba Valley. It was a pleasure to me to visit many of those wells and see the fine crops of vegetables and grapes growing in that rich valley and irrigated from those flowing wells. We visited Mr. Curklen's home and enjoyed his hospitality during the noon-day hour. At his home we saw the water from his well flowing in several directions into his garden and through his vineyard and through his lots and into his large tank. And at Mr. Appleton's lovely home, the water from his well was moving about the place, through the grapevines and garden. Mr. Appleton was the one that showed the people of the Camp San Saba Valley that artesian water underlay the beautiful valley. Mr. Curklen and Mr. Appleton has demonstrated the fact that it is the home of the grapes. They have as fine grapes as can be found anywhere and almost all varieties, with as large clusters as I ever saw.

At the home of the jolly Monroe Fleming, we found him in his big truck garden, irrigating his truck from his flowing well. He showed us his large storage tank which is a beauty and as clear as a crystal and in that tank we could see the big catfish swimming about, which made our mouths water.  
At the quiet peaceable home of Willie Freeman, we found the water from his flowing well running through his garden. We found Willie in the harvest field shocking a fine crop of oats he had just harvested.

We did not see Mr. Brooks' well, but we saw some of the vegetables and field crops that are watered from them when they need it.  
Everything I saw there was fine. I saw Mr. Colson who is tending the farm of Mr. Brooks and he was putting up a huge

stack of oats in a few steps of the bank of the San Saba River. He came down from the stack and I went with him to the river, thinking all the time as we went that he was going to drink from the river, but behold, when we arrived there he showed me two springs gushing out of the bank of the river, not over ten feet apart and as clear as a crystal and almost as cold as ice. The Camp San Saba Valley is a beautiful place. A CITIZEN.

Mrs. Geo. Moore, son and daughter of Brady visited Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Cottrell Sunday evening.

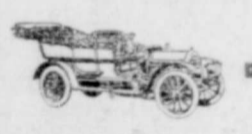

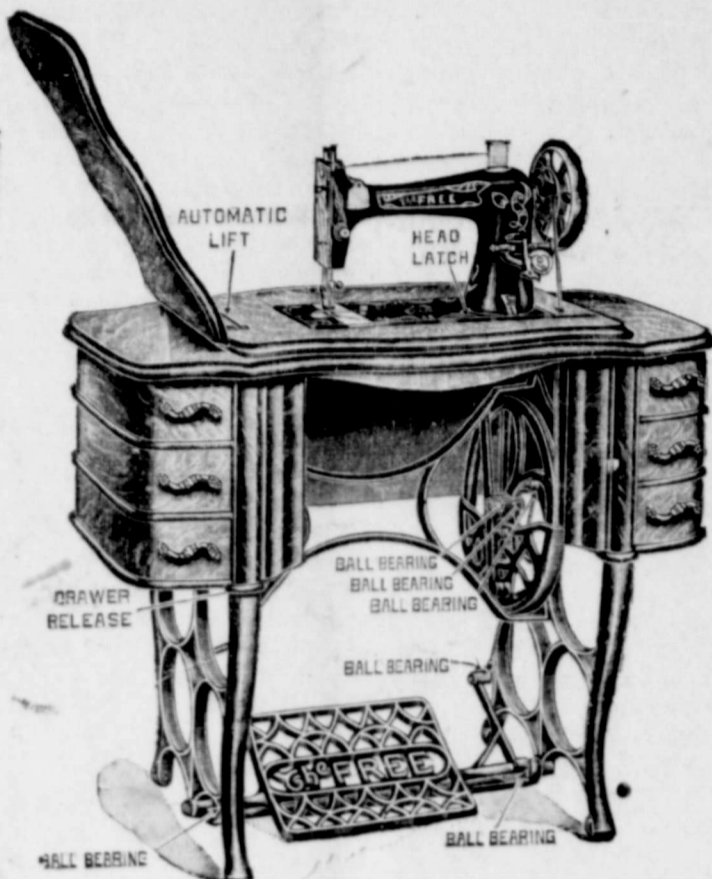

### CLASSIFIES PLANT.

#### Smithsonian Institution Names Peculiar Weed.

A peculiar weed which has caused a great deal of curiosity on the part of local citizens this spring, a sample of which was sent to the Smithsonian Institution at Washington a few weeks ago, has been classified by P. C. Standley, assistant curator of plants, as the "sleepy catchfly."

The plant is something entirely new to the oldest settlers of this section, and where it came from is a mystery. None of it has ever been found here until this spring, but it seems to have been well scattered over the town at least, several citizens reporting having discovered it in patches on their premises.

The weed is not an uncommon one in appearance, grows rather rank and wiry. The peculiar feature of the plant, however, is that it emits a gum or waxy substance which firmly holds every small object which comes in contact with it. One citizen of Brady reports that he has to go out each afternoon and hunt up his small chickens, frequently finding several of them in the toils of the weed.

About the first of the present months Judge Harvey Walker found an English sparrow which had been caught in the weed, and so firm was the hold that practically all the feathers on the little bird's back were pulled off in extricating it from the shrub. Judge F. M. Newman took the weed and sent it to the Smithsonian Institution, together with a request for a classification, and under date of

June 11th, R. Rathbun, assistant secretary in charge of the National Museum at Washington, replied as follows:

"The specimen which you transmitted on June 2 has been examined by Mr. P. C. Standley, assistant curator of plants, who reports as follows:

"The plant is *Silene antirrhina* L., sleepy catchfly. It is found in almost all sections of North America, except the colder parts, and in Europe and Asia. So far as I know, no attempt has been made to utilize the gum. The plant does not occur in sufficient quantity to make any utilization probable. Many other plants secrete a gum in much the same fashion, but very few are utilized commercially."

Messrs. Will Harlow and J. J. Everett were appointed by the council to take up stock and dogs which are running at large within the city limits unlawfully.

### BRADY GETS HIGHWAY

ROUTE SELECTED SAN ANTONIO TO SAN ANGELO.

Local Committee Secures Adoption of Route Through Brady Over Strong Opposition.

Messrs. T. P. Grant and D. F. Savage of the local Commercial club and E. J. Lemburg of Mason, who accompanied Col. A. L. Westgard and D. E. Colp to Plainview last Tuesday, returned Monday afternoon, after having attended the annual meeting of the Colorado-to-Gulf Highway association, at which that portion of the route of the proposed highway from San Antonio to San Angelo was selected. The route as finally selected passes through Fredericksburg, Mason, Brady, Paint Rock and thence to San Angelo, from which point north the line has already been established.

The members of the committee report that a hard fight was put up by the representatives of San Angelo, Menard, Junction and Kerrville to have the line go through the three last named places, and that the route was selected through Brady only after the hardest kind of work on the part of Brady, Mason, Paint Rock and Fredericksburg delegates to the convention. Messrs. Grant and Savage are especially complimentary in speaking of the assistance rendered them by Messrs. E. J. Lemburg of Mason and O. L. Sims of Paint Rock, but local citizens are unwilling to give all the credit for the success of the undertaking to representatives of the other towns, and all are loud in praise of the efficient manner in which Messrs. Grant and Savage handled the matter.

At the Plainview meeting the Colorado-to-Gulf highway was made a portion of the complete Puget Sound-to-Gulf highway. The Puget Sound-to-Gulf highway extends at present from Seattle to Raton, N. M. The new connection gives it egress to the sea at both Galveston and Corpus Christi.

The route from Raton will follow the line of the Colorado-to-Gulf highway, with the exception that Kerrville, Junction and Menard are eliminated. From San Antonio northwest, the stations are Fredericksburg, Mason, Brady, Paint Rock, San Angelo, Sterling City, Big Springs, Lamesa, Tahoka, Lubbock, Tulsa, Plainview, Canyon and Amarillo. From the latter city the line will run west to Raton.

Officers of the Colorado-to-Gulf highway elected at the Plainview meeting are: President, S. A. Penick, Big Springs; vice president, U. M. Unger, Plainview; secretary-treasurer, Thomas B. Owens, San Angelo.

Puget Sound-to-Gulf highway officers will be elected at a meeting of delegates of all divisions, to be called within six months.

Enroute to Plainview, good roads clubs were organized in sixteen counties, and pic-

tures of highway scenes taken along the line will be shown throughout the country. Col. Westgard now is mapping and logging the highway between Amarillo and Raton.

In answer to numerous inquiries by local citizens as to the plan under which it is proposed to establish and maintain this highway, Mr. Grant has furnished The Standard with the following outline:

The National Highway Association is a body of men who organized themselves for the purpose of securing National Highways for interstate travel in the United States. As the Government controls the water ways through the States, builds dams, fix harbor facilities, and in fact takes full charge of these great arteries of travel, so these men believe that the Government should also own, control and improve highways extending from one State to the other. As it would be impossible to get the Government to build just one road connecting two States because the other States, not benefited by such a road, would oppose such an appropriation.

This Highway Association has employed Colonel Westgard to map out and log fifty thousand miles of highway where it will do the most people the most good, and where it will touch as many States as possible, so that when they ask for an appropriation from the Government it will not be just one locality being benefited, but it will be for the fifty thousand miles of highway benefiting at least ninety per cent of the population of the United States. The longest route to be mapped out is the Puget Sound to the Gulf Highway, of which Brady, Mason, Paint Rock, San Angelo are a part. Col. Westgard has already logged this route and in less than thirty days the Blue Book for the Automobile Association will contain a complete log of the road, and uniform mile posts will be placed along this way from Seattle, Washington to Corpus Christi, Texas. This Highway will be, if not the first, at least one of the first to be recommended to the United States as a National Highway will no doubt be greatly influenced by the amount of travel over such Highway, it is the part of the Texas Division of the National Highway, of which we are a part, to make the roads so that they can be traveled any day any year. Also to advertise the points of interest along this Highway and to make this travel as heavy as possible. While this Highway is not intended for an automobile road but will be for the benefit of all, yet the main appeal made by the Texas Division of this Highway will have to be made to automobile owners, as we need the travel from out of the State, and it would take a long time for the Seattle man to reach Corpus Christi if he came in a buggy.

After the National Highway Association recommends this Highway and gets the other Highways mapped-out to assist us in getting the United States to take hold of this, then the

Government will send an engineer to estimate what this Highway is worth. They will buy it from the different counties and take full possession of it and make it a first class Highway in name and in fact.

We have much hard work before us in road fixing and advertising, but we have behind us not only the Texas Division reaching from Corpus Christi to Amarillo, but we also have behind us the National Highway Association which Association will send us an engineer to advise us how best we can fix our roads and cross our rivers, and this engineer will not cost us a cent. His entire expenses being borne by the National Highway Association. Every county along this route is getting busy to fix their roads so that that county will have the best road along this Highway, and we want to do everything we can so that ours will be a vision and not a sight.
