BOOSTERS HERE STONG.

Waco Y. M. B. L. Takes Brady By Storm.

For a short space of twenty minutes last Thursday afternoon the city of Brady was in the hands of a commercial army from the city of Waco, and the victory of the invaders was overwhelming.

The Wacoites were scheduled to arrive here at 4:10, but were just an hour and a half late, arriving at 5:40 over the Santa Fe. The special train consisted of four chair cars and a baggage coach, and was loaded from tender to rear platform with the liveliest, boostiest bunch of boosters that ever visited this city. The train had hardly come to a standstill at the union station before the excursionists were piling off and forming into a line of march. They made quite an inspiring sight as they moved off down North Bridge street in their cream colored Palm Beach suits and red felt hats, keeping step to the martial music of Allesandro's band, which headed the procession. The line of march was down North Bridge street to the square, thence around the west, south and east sides, and to the Queen hotel corner, where the big "get acquainted" meeting was pulled off, and where the big band rendered a short concert.

On account of the short time allotted by the visitors to Brady, it was impossible to arrange any sort of program of entertainment by Brady citizens, but members of the Waco delegation expressed satisfaction at the reception accorded them here, stating that the brand of West Texas hospitality dished out here was the equal of any accorded them on the entire trip.

The special train was transferred to the Frisco tracks here, and the party left at 6:00 o'clock for Brownwood, stopping five minutes at Rochelle, Mercury, Winchell and Brooksmith. At Brownwood an hour was spent and a big supper served by the ladies of the city.

Two former Bradyites—H. F. Schwenker and Paul Calvert—were members of the party. Both seemed to enjoy every minute of their stay here, and with many others of the Wacoites, expressed regret that they were unable to remain longer.

This was the first visit of the Waco business men to this section, and will result in more firmly establishing the commercial interests of that progressive city in the good graces of local business men.

The only marks found on the body was a large bruise on the side of his head, and the boy has been in such a condition since being found that he is unable to give any account of the manner in which he was injured.

It is thought, however, that the horse which he was riding must have stepped into a hole and threw him to the ground with such force as to render him unconscious.

It seems to us that it would

SOMETHING FOR NOTHING.

The Eden Echo editor last
week threw a few fits because
of the fact that he had been called
upon to publish matter free
in furtherance of the interests
of certain candidates for public
office, and, at some length, gave
reasons why people should not
expect publishers to run their
dope free.

And they were good, valid rea-
sons, too. We heartily agree
with him on the subject, al-
though we don't like to do so
since he called us a "22 calibre
proxy" a few weeks ago. But
the Echo editor does not go far
enough in his policy on this sub-
ject.

has been appearing in the col-
umns of his paper—as well as

"best cash price" for same. As
the firm sending out this busi-
ness had no rating in any of the
mercantile agencies, we wrote
them that we must have cash
with their order. To this they
replied that they were thor-
oughly reliable, and requested
that we call on Dun or Brad-
street for a special report. We
did so, and the report we re-
ceived was not calculated to
cause us to want to accept even
a dollar's worth of their busi-
ness.

Most newspaper publishers
nowadays are not so eager to ac-
cept business of this character
without first investigating the
responsibility of the advertiser
as was the custom a few years

ago, but there are still a few
who are not careful enough in
this direction, and occasionally
"get stung."

Personally, we would prefer
running the "political dope" free
than to run matter of the class
sent out by the Dayton concern
for a valuable consideration and
then not get the consideration.

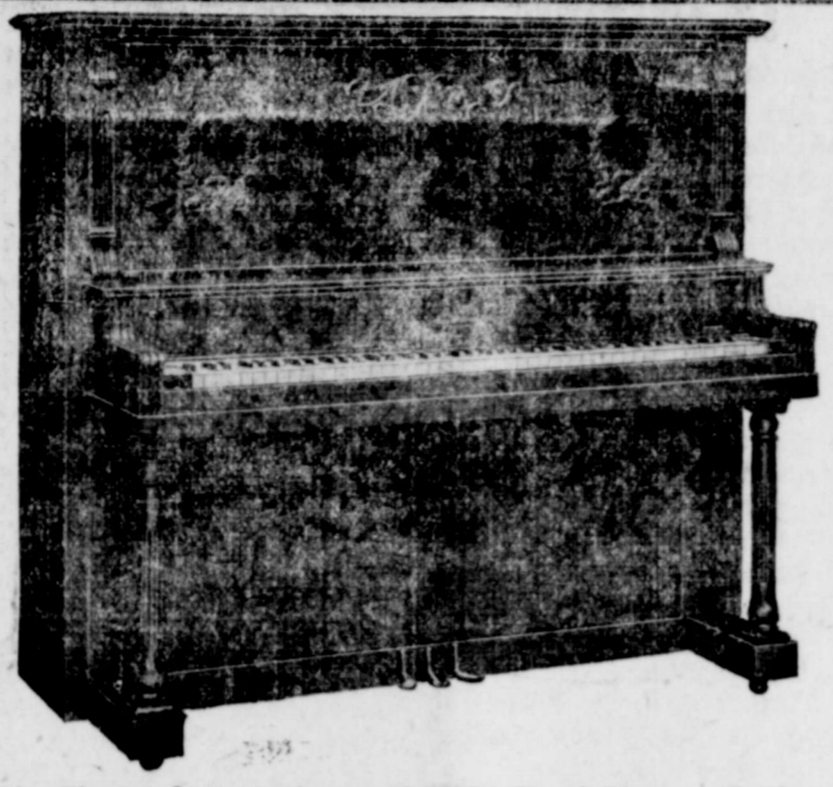

Denison, Tex. June 24—In the election held here yesterday to determine the issuance of bonds in the sum of \$55,000, the measure was adopted by a majority of 98 votes.

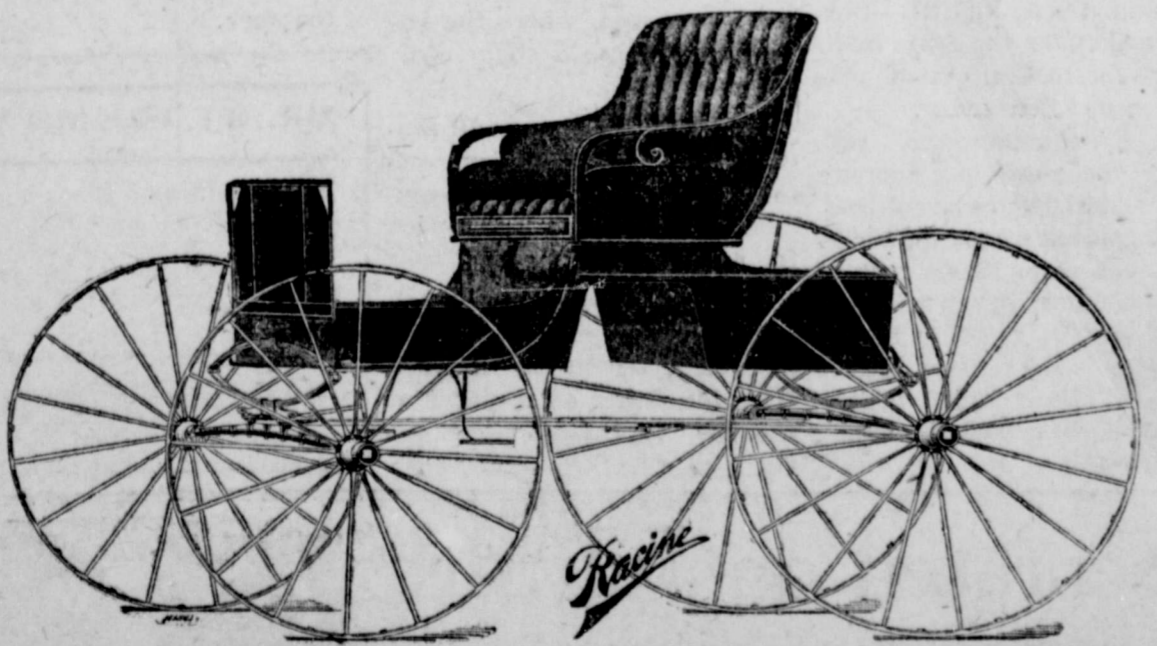
