## PROBABLE 50,000 MAJORITY

**Bell County Candidate For Governor Sweeps State By Large Majority--Submission Defeated.**

Totals from 223 counties complete and incomplete: For submission, 111,805; against submission, 131,637. For Governor—Ball, 166,654; Ferguson, 203,159; Morris, 4,905. For Lieutenant Governor—Sturgeon, 135,395; Hobby, 148,305. For Commissioner of Agriculture—Davis, 133,289; Halbert 112,804. For Congressmen at Large—McLemore, 71,502; Kone, 57,707; Harris, 26,367; Garrett, 57,793; Lowry, 35,296; Lane, 57,874; Davis, 64,379.

At 9 o'clock Monday night, 374,918 votes in the gubernatorial contest, coming from 223 counties, had been accounted for. The lead of James E. Ferguson had increased to 36,705. W. P. Hobby held a lead of practically 10,000 over B. B. Sturgeon for lieutenant governor. The vote against submission was 19,000 greater than the vote for submission.

Jeff McLemore remained in first place for congressman-at large, with J. H. (Cyclone) Davis continuing in second. W. P. Lane continued in third, with D. E. Garrett in fourth and Ed R. Kone holding a good fifth.

Returns show the absolute nomination of J. M. Edwards for state treasurer, W. L. Davidson for the court of criminal appeals, Earle Mayfield for railroad commissioner, W. F. Doughty for state superintendent of education, J. T. Robison for land commissioner and H. B. Terrell for comptroller.

One of the most hotly contested campaigns in the history of McCulloch county came to a close Saturday night. The contests for the various offices have been marked by much activity on the part of the candidates and their friends, and while much interest has been taken, yet the campaign just closed

**CONVENTION HELD.**

**Elect Delegates to County Convention.**

Convention of Democrats of Precinct No. 1 was held at the court house last Saturday afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, with an attendance of perhaps fifty or sixty.

The meeting was most harmonious, and lasted for only a few minutes.

Mayor A. C. Baze was named as chairman and S. M. Richardson, secretary.

A motion was offered by Judge F. M. Newman and unanimously carried calling on the chairman to appoint a committee of three to name two sets of delegates to the county convention—one each favorable to Ball and Ferguson, the delegates representing the candidate who carries the state to be seated in the convention. Judge Joe A. Atkins and Judge F. M. Newman and O. E. Perry were named to select the delegates.

While the committee was formulating their report Judge J. E. Shropshire addressed the convention on the propriety of just such action as had been taken in the agreement to seat delegates in the county convention, all of whom see a matter in the same light. He instanced the Baltimore convention, when delegates were pledged to the support of free tolls in the Panama Canal bill, and this plank was written into the platform without serious consideration on the part of the delegates.

After its enactment into law, the mistake was seen and hastily corrected, but not without a hard fight and heavy cost to the government. This, he thought, was sufficient reason for not sending delegates all of one mind to any convention. The point was well taken, however, no move to reconsider the former motion was made.

At this juncture the committee announced ready to report their selection of delegates, and the following list was submitted and chosen by the convention.

Judge Joe A. Adkins introduced the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted: "Resolved that the Democrats of Precinct 1 of McCulloch County, Texas, in convention assembled most heartily endorse the administration of President Woodrow Wilson as being most wise and just, and that we pledge our further earnest support during his administration; that we endorse the official acts of William Jennings Bryan in the discharge of his duties as Secretary of State; that we further endorse the wise and able administration of our efficient Post Master General, Albert Sidney Bursleson in perfecting and giving to our people one of the most efficient parcel post systems in the world. Be it further resolved that our delegates to the State Convention at El Paso be instructed to work for the passage of resolutions in harmony with the above."

**County Judge's Proclamation.**

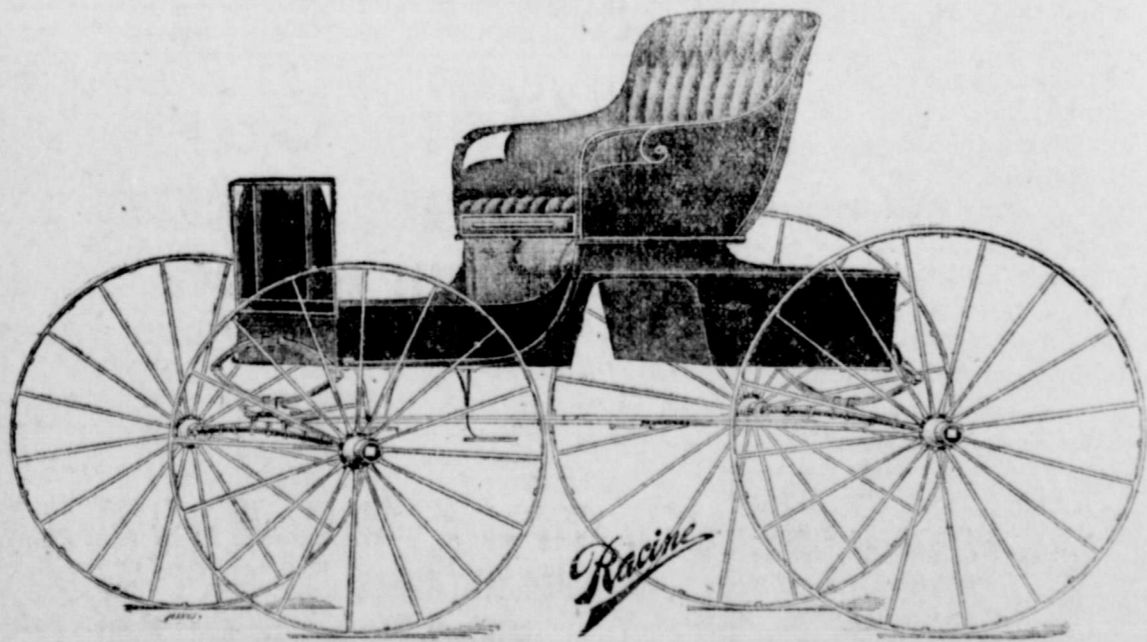
