New Fire Alarm Whistle

A new fire alarm whistle to be installed at the city's pumping station arrived Friday afternoon by express from the factory, and was installed and tested out later in the day by Supt. J. M. Lyle of the water and light department.

The new whistle is of the Luckenheimer type, and is what is popularly termed the "wild-cat," the sound produced being not unlike that of the animal for which it is named, and can be heard for a distance of five or six miles.

Parties living four or five miles in the country heard the whistle Friday afternoon and telephoned in to learn the cause of the disturbance.

C. W. Clark of Bartlett Will Operate Laundry Here

C. W. Clark of Bartlett spent Sunday and Monday in the city on business and before leaving for his home announced his decision to locate a laundry plant here.

Mr. Clark is an experienced laundry man, having been engaged in this line of business all his life. At present he has plants at Bartlett and Coleman, but the machinery in the Bartlett plant will be shipped here next week to be used in the installation of the local system.

While in the city Mr. Clark made tentative arrangements for one of two locations for his business. His first choice was to secure a lease from the city on enough ground at the city's power station on which to locate his buildings. This site was preferred by Mr. Clark on account of the fact that all of his machinery is driven by electric motors, and the further fact that a large quantity of steam is required for the drying rooms, and a location near a steam plant is imperative.

Another location which impressed Mr. Clark favorably was the property owned by Messrs. W. D. Crothers and D. F. Savage—the block on which the old Brady Auto Co.'s garage was located. On account of Mr. Savage being out of the city, no definite arrangements for this location could be made.

Mr. Clark left yesterday afternoon for Bartlett and will at once begin the work of crating his machinery for shipment. He will return here either Saturday or Monday to select his location, and stated that he would have his plant in operation by December 1st.

Hunting Season Opens

With the beginning of the open game season Sunday, a large number of local hunters have gone forth the past few days in quest of quail, turkey, deer, etc.

A number of parties were made up last week and left the city in time to reach their favorite hunting grounds by the first day of the open season, not a few going as far as a hundred miles in search of plentiful game. Others who could get away only for a day were afield early, and the crack of the gun was to be heard in all directions.

Game of all kinds is unusually plentiful in this section this year. More especially is this true of quail, which in many instances may be seen along the public highways in large coveys, and a few hunters state that they are able to bag the limit without the use of a dog. Turkeys are also to be found in great numbers within a very short distance from the city, and a few deer are said to range within five or six miles south of town.

Negro Killed.

In a row at the Rezzle farm southwest of town some twenty or more negroes were camped, and on account of the rain, were thrown into a small house altogether for protection from the weather. Friday night about 10 o'clock two negroes began a quarrel over a quilt when a third, a friend and partner of one of the negroes, came to his defense with a

butcher knife, stabbing the other negro to death. The negro who did the cutting then fled in the darkness dressed in overalls and jumper, but minus shoes and cap. Sheriff Puett and Constable Carter were called but owing to the heavy rains in the latter part of the night were unable to track the negro who had fled and had to return home and use the telephone in tracing him.

The negro who did the killing was apprehended a few miles from the negro camp where he escaped the night before, the next day and was lodged in jail at Paint Rock. Monday there was an examining trial and he was bound over to await the action of the grand jury.

Cotton Yield More Than in 1913

Waxahachie, Tex., Oct. 31.—That the cotton crop of Texas this year will exceed that of 1913 is indicated in a report issued today by the United States department of agriculture, which shows the estimated yield per acre of the 1914 crop to be 175 pounds, or 25 pounds more per acre than last year. The acreage this year is estimated at 12,052,000 acres, or 5 per cent less than last year. On this basis of calculation the total yield for 1914 will exceed that of 1913 by 55,000 bales and will be around 4,000,000 bales.

Report on Texas Crops

Washington, D. C., Oct. 31.—The crop reporting board of the United States department of agriculture has just completed its estimate of the acre yield of the principal farm crops of Texas for this year. The estimates are based on crop conditions during the early part of October. The final figures will be given out within a short time, but it is reported that they will not differ to any great extent with the preliminary estimates. According to the figures the yield per acre of the principal crops of this state in 1914 will be as follows: Corn, 28.5 bushels; Irish potatoes, 92 bushels; sweet potatoes, 110 bushels; tobacco 820 pounds; rice 89.5 bushels, and cotton 255 pounds.

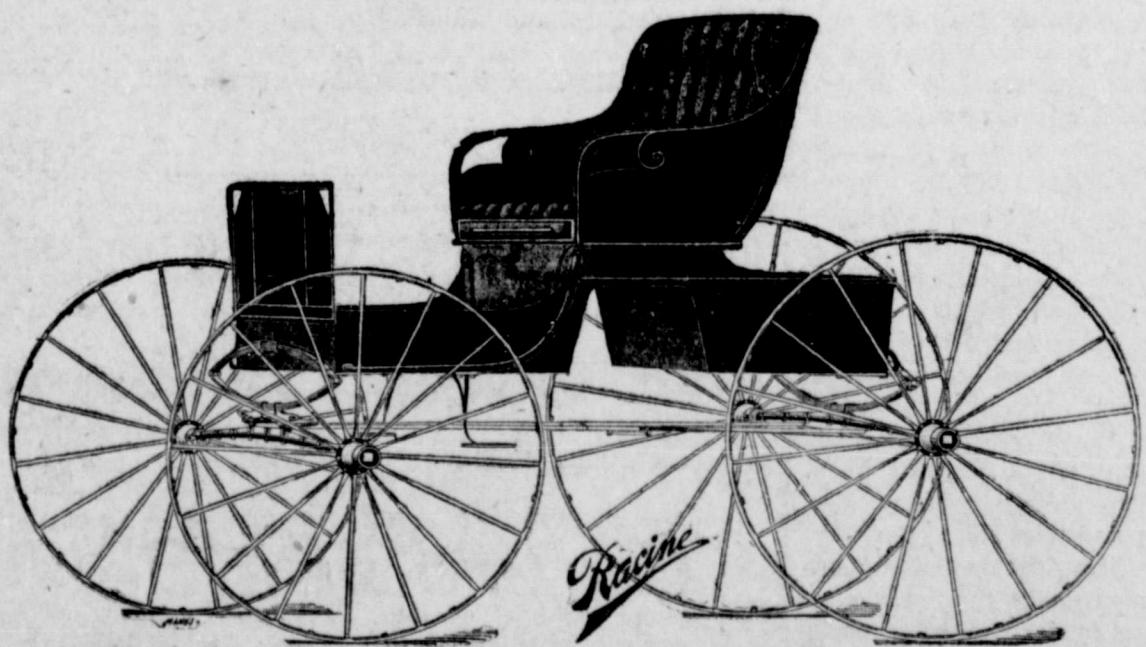

ON GOOD ROADS

Benefit Thereof Accruing to Abutting Property.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 30.—The road building specialists of the department of agriculture, in bulletin No. 136, entitled "Highway Bonds," have the following to say about the benefit of a well constructed highway to property owners whose property is not directly on the road to be improved:

"In planning the highway system or the main market roads, it will be found necessary to omit many roads, the improvement of which is greatly desired by abutting landowners. The fact that such property holders must pay a tax for the bond issue is only an apparent injustice, for if the highway system is well planned the entire county will feel the benefits of the improvement. As a rule, main market roads reach the majority of producing areas, and when they are improved all land values tend to increase.

"The fact that cities and larger towns are frequently taxed for bond issues to build highways outside of their own limits is sometimes made a point of debate in bond elections. It is argued that because a large part of the county wealth is within the corporate limits of such cities and towns, highway bond money should also be used to construct their streets. It is even urged that the expenditure should be made proportionate to the assessed valuation within the city limits. If the proceeds of highway bond issues were distributed in this way their purpose in many cases would be defeated. The primary object of the county highway bond issue is to build county market roads and not to improve city streets, although a high percentage of the assessed valuation may be city property. It is now known that the expenditure of city taxes on country roads is a sound principle and that it is one of the best features of state aid to highways. In Massachusetts the city of Boston pays possibly 40 per cent of the total state highway fund, but not a mile of state aid highway has been built within its limits. New York city also pays about 60 per cent of the cost of the state highway bonds. Some state laws prohibit the expenditure of proceeds of state highway bonds within corporate limits of cities or towns.

"The improvement of market roads results in improved marketing conditions which benefit the city. Most cities are essentially dependent upon the surrounding country for their prosperity and development. The development of suburban property for residence purposes is also dependent upon highway conditions and it is becoming evident yearly that whatever makes for an increase in rural population must be encouraged. Since the introduction of motor traffic, county highways are used to an increasing extent by city residents. In fact, the cost of main-

taining many county highways has been greatly increased by the presence of city owned motor vehicles. The general advance in facilities for doing country business from town headquarters when roads are improved is no inconsiderable factor in the commercial life of the community."
