TEACHERS' INSTITUTE

Instructors from Menard and McCulloch Here Next Week

County Superintendent E. L. White has been busily engaged the past few days in sending out the programs for the joint meeting of the Menard and McCulloch County Teachers' Institute, which will be held in this city next week, beginning Monday and closing Friday afternoon.

The joint institute idea originated with Supt. White some months ago, and he at once began the work of interesting school authorities of adjoining counties in the plan. Judge Scruggs of Menard county at once agreed to join Mr. White, and the meeting next week will bring all teachers in that county here for the week.

Mr. White was also instrumental in getting the institutes of San Saba, Mills and Brown counties set for the same dates, thus making a circuit of teachers' meetings. By this plan it was possible to secure some of the most talented school men in the state and nation for lecturers. The list of those secured for appearance here includes the following:

Vaccine Won't Cure Glanders.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 23.—After months of careful investigation the bureau of animal industry has come to the conclusion that vaccine is not effective in rendering horses immune from glanders. The bureau recommends a discontinuance of the serum and advises that all attention be concentrated on the detection and destruction of the diseased horses. A thorough disinfection of water troughs, buildings, mangers, etc., which the diseased animals have come in contact with should be made in order to successfully check the spread of the malady.

Handling of Mail in Early Days

Ft. Worth, Tex., Nov. 23.—Local postal authorities have unearthed some interesting history of Texas postoffices, and from records on file it has been learned that the first important mail route in Texas was established July 1st, 1857, between San Antonio and San Diego, California, via El Paso. The schedule required that the contractor leave each terminus on the first day of each month and arrive at the other terminus on the last day of the month. The mail was carried by stage, overland and the annual compensation was \$149,800. Service was inaugurated between El Paso and Ft. Fillmore, Texas, on July 2, 1857, but St. Louis, Mo., and Ft. Yuma, California, were made the terminals of this route. In September, 1858, Texas secured another important postal route; the one from St. Louis to San Francisco. Sherman and El Paso were the principal Texas points on this line; its total length was 3,203 miles each way and was made twice each week in four-horse coaches. The schedule was 25 days and the contractor's annual compensation was \$600,000.

150 Hens Pay More Than Cotton

An instance where one hundred and fifty hens equal six bales of cotton has been discovered in Brazos county, according to an announcement by the extension service of the A. & M. College. Geo. Echols, a farmer living near the college, has a flock of 150 hens. He has sold this year to date \$200 worth of eggs. Reckoning sales at the same rate for the next two months, adding the sales of poultry and making due allowances for eggs and chickens eaten by the family during the year, he will have received the gross amount of at least \$300 by January first from his flock.

One of his tenant's total money crop this year consists of six bales of cotton now not exceeding \$180, or but \$40 in advance of the money rent contracted with Mr. Echols. Reckoning the bale at ten cents per pound, the three tons of seed at \$20 per ton, which is the price probably received but for the war, the tenant cotton farmer would have been \$360. The cotton required the greater part of the tenant's time from April to November and a considerable part of the time of his wife and children. The chickens required the attention of Mrs. Echols perhaps an hour a day and the time of Mr. Echols in taking the eggs to market two or three times a week. It is safe to say that the net profit on the chickens, after making due allowance for the time of Mr. and Mrs. Echols was \$150; thus equaling the profit on the six bales of cotton. Mr. Echols also sold butter and vegetables, etc., to the amount of \$600. He is holding his cotton for higher prices and yet has money in the bank.

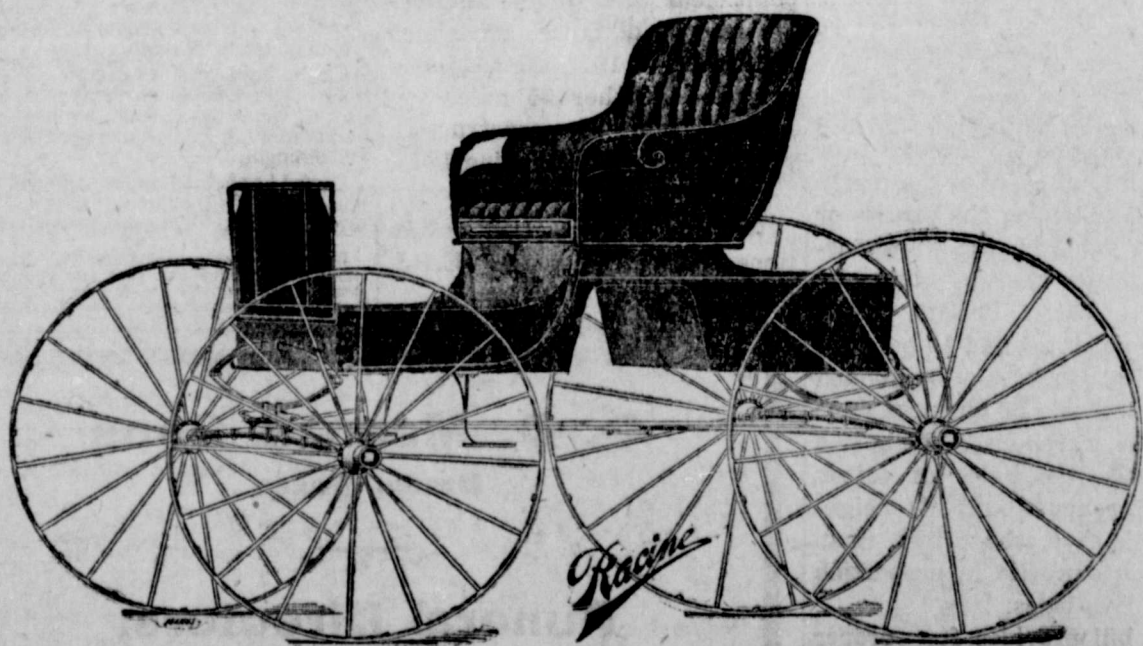

Mysterious Death of Angelo Man

San Angelo, Tex., Nov. 19.—W. A. Guthrie, vice-president and manager of the San Angelo Water, Power and Light company, was found drowned in the Concho river, a short distance from the city yesterday afternoon at about 4 o'clock. His feet and his left hand were tied together with a rope, his right hand and arm being left free. He was discovered by a boy who had been out hunting on the river and the condition of the body indicated that it had been in the water but a comparatively short time when Sheriff Hawley Allen and others arrived at the place of the tragedy.

Mr. Guthrie had been seen by friends that morning walking toward the power plant, which is on the river some distance from where his death occurred. His death is a mystery. There were no signs of a struggle about the banks of the river where the corpse was found and no marks of violence upon the body. An inquest was held by J. A. Branch, justice of the peace, but his verdict had not yet been rendered.

Mr. Guthrie had lived in San Angelo for thirty years and was one of the most prominent men of the city.

He had been manager of the Water, Light and Power company for several years and prior to his connection with that company was associated with J. G. Murphy in the publication of the San Angelo Standard. He is survived by his wife, who before marriage was Miss Alexander, a member of one of the oldest and most prominent families of San Angelo.

Cheaper Than Rabbits

There are few people who are prepared to believe the statement that human life, in at least one jurisdiction in Texas, is cheaper than the life of a rabbit.

In Dallas county a policeman charged with murdering a boy was convicted of manslaughter and sentenced to jail for a term of one day, and was actually compelled to serve seven hours of this severe sentence before the law felt that it had been satisfied. In New Jersey a boy who killed a rabbit which was eating his mother's vegetables, was convicted and sentenced to jail for 120 days. This is a calm, deliberate judicial ascertainment of the relative value of a human life as compared to that of an insignificant "cotton-tail" rabbit. As has been sagely observed, "law is the perfection of human reason," and its principal beauty "is the certainty thereof." Therefore, does it lie in the mouth of any man to deny that the life of a boy is precisely 119 per cent cheaper than that of a rabbit?—Austin American.

A SPLENDID OPPORTUNITY

Texas Cotton and Farm Products Warehouses Offer It

The Emergency Warehouse bill is intended to give relief in one particular only. It makes possible the storing and holding of cotton. On the other hand the Permanent Warehouse bill provides for the storage of farm products, loans to farmers, and a comprehensive system of marketing.

Under the Permanent Warehouse bill the farmer may store his cotton in a warehouse at actual cost of storage. In this way country damage may be avoided. In case the market is not such as to justify immediate selling, the warehouse authorities are empowered to lend the farmer 85 per cent of the market value of his cotton; 75 per cent may be lent on other farm products.

This is only the beginning of what the warehouse may do in the way of loans. It may advance the farmer money with which to grow a crop. This loan must be secured by a chattel mortgage or a crop mortgage. This will take off the market a certain amount of distressed cotton which farmers each year are forced to sell to those who have furnished them credit, and which the merchant desires to sell immediately so as to restock his store. By means of the loans from the warehouse the farmer will be in a position to deliver his cotton to the warehouse as he now delivers it to the merchant.

The warehouse in addition to lending money and storing cotton may act as salesagent. The law provides that the ginner shall sample each bale. To protect the samples the ginner is required to give bond and is subject to a severe penalty for falsifying a sample. This provision takes effect at the beginning of next season. So, beginning with next year's crop, cotton will be sold by legally protected samples and the "city crop" will be an annual failure.

The law makes it possible for the warehouses over the state to form central selling organizations. For this purpose it provides that any warehouse may invest 25 per cent of its capital and surplus in the stock of other co-operative organizations. Undoubtedly local warehouse companies will take advantage of this clause, organize central selling companies and sell cotton direct to importers.

Not only may the cotton growers organize under the bill, but truck growers and ranch owners as well. Warehouse companies may build, buy or lease elevators, cold storage plants, refrigerator cars, and do whatever else is necessary to provide an adequate system of marketing.

It will be seen that farmers may profit greatly through this. The point arises as to the method of distributing the profits or savings made by the warehouses. Storage charges must be made at cost. Profits, after paying not to exceed 10 per cent on capital stock, may be divided upon the basis of business done with the warehouse. Thus if a man sells ten bales of cotton to a warehouse and his neighbor sells five, the first man will share profits in proportion to the five bales.

The bill provides for proper management along all lines. The manager must be a competent man, who can grade cotton and other farm products, and his competency must be passed on by the state warehouse commission. The warehouse is protected against dishonest man-
