BOB DAVIS PARDONED

zen Granted Liberty Xmas

Sheriff J. C. Wall received a telegram Monday from Bob Davis, who, about fifteen years ago was sentenced to a term of ninety-nine years in the state penitentiary from this county for wife murder, stating that he had been pardoned by Governor Colquitt and given his liberty at noon Christmas day.

Davis and his family were living in a tent on the old Cude ranch, about four miles south of this city when he is alleged to have committed the crime of which he was convicted, when in a fit of jealous rage he shot and killed his wife. He then got on his horse to come to town to give up to Sheriff Wall. Mr. Wall, however, had heard of the crime and started out after Davis and met him a few miles out of town and placed him under arrest.

The telegram from Davis stated that he was now at Navasota, but gave none of his plans for the future, and it is not known whether he intends returning to this county or not.

Former McCulloch County Citi- 10,000 Bale Mark Passed This Week by Three Local Gins

The 10,000-bale estimate for the three local gins for the present season was passed this week. the report for the week up to last night showing a total of 10,217 bales.

The bad weather of the past few weeks has practically stopped the movement of cotton in this county, but with the few days of pretty sunshine beginning the first of the week, the staple is again coming in at a lively rate.

The market this week has also shown decided improvement, the price taking a 25-point jump Tuesday. No. 1 cotton was quoted yesterday at \$7.50, and resulted in the sale of several large lists.





War risks have boosted these figures tremendously, of course, but this is an abnormal condition. The main fact is that in three years normal and peaceful times grain and cotton rates have trebled without apparent cause. This is the tribute paid out of the profits of farmers, and should interest them. The fact is, our export trade is largely carried in foreign owned vessels. and we have to pay any rate demanded. But 8 per cent of our foreign trade is carried in American owned vessels, and these are at the great disadvantage of having to compete with government aided, railroad rebated and trade privileged owners of foreign shipping. Hon. Chas. H. Sherrill, late U. S. Minister to Argentina, says that American study of the railroad rebate evil and its correction have hampered our export trade and placed us at the mercy of the foreign shipping combine which not only bleeds us financially but also leaves the foreigners in possession of the ships. He declares that laws should be enacted, one modifying the Interstate Commerce act so as to permit railroads to grant preferential rates on goods to the seaboard intended for export, and the other amending the Sherman act making it lawful to make combinations for trade outside our borders. In 1789 our ships carried but 23 per cent of our exports; in 1800 this leaped to 89 per cent, and in 1810 to 91 per cent. In 1828 the reciprocity act was passed and the then 89 per cent has since shrunken to the shameful 8 per cent. 
