## WHITE MAN CHAMPION

JESS WILLARD KNOCKS OUT JOHNSON IN 26 ROUNDS.

Johnson Had Best of Fight Up to 20th Round, but Was Unable to Land Knockout.

The World's Heavyweight Championship, after a lapse of nearly five years again rests with a white man, Jess Willard having scored a knockout on Jack Johnson, at Havana, Cuba, yesterday. An immense crowd witnessed the fighting, and the weather was ideal.

Johnson entered the ring at 1:15 p. m., and Willard at 1:20 p. m. At 1:25 p. m. the pugilists shook hands and the ring was cleared. Time was called at 1:53 p. m. New York Time.

All through the early part of the fight Johnson had the better of it, apparently smashing the white man at will and frequently sending him to the ropes. The black, however, seemed to lack his old-time punch, and failed to land a knock-out. As the rounds progressed, Willard gained confidence, and the battle gradually turned in his favor. His ability to accept the terrific punishment handed him practically won his battle for him.

At the close of the fight there was a demonstration against Johnson, police having to come to his rescue and clear the ring.

Johnson was guaranteed \$30,000, win or lose, in the fight; the balance going to Willard.

Through the efforts of Willbur Lee a purse was made up in Brady and the returns by rounds were received here over the phone from Brownwood. A large crowd of local enthusiasts attended the reports at the Central Drug store, and every report in Willard's favor was received with enthusiastic applause.

Following are the returns by rounds:

Round 1.—Johnson feinted and landed left on Willard's jaw; repeated upper cuts to Willard's jaw. Latter very nervous. Willard drove two lefts to negro's body. Johnson's right to Willard's body.

Round 2.—Johnson easily blocks Willard's leads and swings right and left to jaw. Johnson replied with smashing right to Willard's body. Johnson hooked left to Willard's stomach, and landed three lefts to body. Willard laughed. Johnson drove Willard to ropes with tattoo of lefts to face.

Round 3.—After much feinting. Willard missed right swing. Both laughed. Johnson rushed and scored left on body and right to jaw. Johnson landed a left on body. Willard asked "Is that the way you do it?"

Round 4.—Willard lunged energetically. Johnson laughed at counter efforts. Much feinting. Johnson landed left to ribs and right and left to body; left to Willard's face. Willard's lips were bleeding. Willard scored left to Johnson's nose.

Round 5.—Johnson poked right and left to Willard's face. Referee orders fighters to break from clinch. Negro smashed

 lead to Willard's lips and drove three blows to cowboy's stomach. Champion rushed Willard to ropes, scoring punches to head and body. Willard was badly distressed; challenger rattled and fought like an amateur.  
 Round 6.—Negro was calm and forced Willard to ropes with bunch of lefts. On break landed left to giant's jaw. Negro rushed Willard's cut lips at every opportunity, and landed three slashing blows to Willard's upper body. At bell Johnson was hammering hard at Willard's body. Cowboy's left cheek was cut.  
 Round 7.—Johnson, using every act to force fighting, rushed Willard to ropes, slugging with both hands repeatedly. Willard's long left temporarily blinded negro's left eye. Johnson came back with series of swings to Willard's body. Clean fighting so far.  
 Round 8.—Willard gaining confidence, and tried to force the pace. Johnson accepted the challenge and pugilists battered each other across ring. Negro having the better of fighting. Willard landed on Johnson's mouth, then Johnson uppercut Willard over the heart. Willard bounced off ropes and landed left to jaw. Round ended with negro swinging blows to Willard's head.  
 Round 9.—Willard assumes aggressive. Johnson started one of cowboy's ears to bleed. Champion landed frequently and Willard appeared to lack his old-time power. Amidst feinting the crowd shouted "Kill the black bear." Johnson immediately started rally by driving three hard hooks to Willard's stomach. Left by Willard started Johnson's mouth bleeding. Latter slugged white man to ropes.  
 Round 10.—Johnson slow in coming from corner. Willard scored two lefts to face. Jess bluffing better as nervousness wears off. Johnson swung left to Willard's ribs and sent half dozen blows to Willard's body and jaw. Negro knocked Willard to ropes with right and left swings to stomach. Hard right chop staggered Willard.  
 Round 11.—Crowd derided Johnson, who was fighting and answering them at the same time. Willard drove left to Johnson's mouth and took a left hook to body; in return Johnson smashed cowboy with left to jaw. Jess blocks several swings. Johnson then tried to rattle, by talking to Willard. Latter angrily replied in kind. Johnson tapped giant's shoulder at the end of round. Slow round.  
 Round 12.—Negro opened with left to body and right to jaw. In clinch he smashed Willard three times with left. Johnson drove right to body and left to head. This apparently had no effect on Willard. Willard's ear and cheek bleeding. Walks spryly to corner.  
 Round 13.—Willard's body is now red from the effects of the punishment of negro. Negro ducking under Willard's lead and continuously plays for stomach. Willard drove Johnson into corner and landed straight left to face. Negro jarred Willard with left hook to jaw in return. He next hooked left to cowboy's body, repeating blow one minute later. Champion landed a right and left as the bell rang.  
 Round 14.—Opened with Willard rushing and missing right upper cut. Challenger was aggressive and tried to force the fighting. Johnson slams Willard on the mouth with left. Jess only laughed. Negro beginning to miss leads. Willard drove a hard right to Johnson's ear. The negro smashed hard left to body as bell rang.  
 Round 15.—Crowd kidded

Johnson to rush Willard to ropes. Johnson scored five hard swings, remarking "What a grand old man." Willard grinned at the remark and bell found both pugilists fighting in center of the ring.  
 Round 16.—Johnson missed a left to head and chuckled. Challenged and did much fighting. Jack said and did much fighting. Black said "Willard is a good kid," and then rushed Jess to ropes, scoring two hard punches to body. Negro drove terrific swings to Willard's sides. Challenger a trifle unsteady going to his corner.  
 Round 17.—Johnson hooked a left to opponent's jaw and right upper to same place. Willard landed right to Johnson's body and left to head. Willard again scored right to body and blocked negro's return. Jack drove Willard to corner and landed two swings to head. Johnson again hooked right to body and followed with two punches to head.  
 Round 18.—After playing tattoo on Willard's chest and stomach the negro drove Willard to corner when Johnson smashed him twice on jaw. Willard's leads were easily pushed off by the champion. After several trials Willard landed straight left to Johnson's face and right swings to jaw. At the bell Johnson landed punch to body and another to jaw.  
 Round 19.—Both pugilists had slowed up. Willard now the aggressor. Johnson stood in the middle of ring and blocked Willard's blows. During the first minute not a single punch landed. Willard then started to rally landing two lefts to body and right to jaw.  
 Round 20.—Willard opened the round with two light blows to face. Negro laughed and said, "Lead again, kid." Willard did and smiled also. Crowd yelled, "Hurry up, we want to see the races." Willard stabbed and pawed the air until he landed on negro's jaw. Black immediately cut loose and they battled across the ring. Crowd went frantic when Willard drove a hard right and left to the negro's body with the ringing bell.  
 Round 21.—Johnson whips Willard's body and sent right swing to head. Willard landed left to negro's face. Jack rushed, but protected himself. They clinched. Johnson walked around the ring. Willard missed right swing and both laughed. Both fighting at bell.  
 Round 22.—Fight degenerated into slow sparring and clinching battle, neither appeared particularly tired or injured. Willard tried to set the pace. In a clinch he battered Johnson's body with right and left. Johnson only grinned. Willard continued working for the negro's stomach. Johnson grinned at the shrieking crowd. Nevertheless Johnson showed the effect of the pace.  
 Round 23.—Willard rushes in to clinch. Johnson held on until ordered to break. Challenger shot two lefts to negro's face. They clinched again and wrestled. Jess added two more lefts to Johnson's face and clinched.  
 Round 24.—They clinch. Willard laid weight on Johnson at every opportunity. Johnson pushed him backward the same way he did Jeffries. Johnson missed two weak swings. Crowd howled disapproval. Then Willard smashed the negro with left to face.  
 Round 25.—Johnson's actions might have indicated that he thought he could not knock Willard out and was trying to get a decision on points. Willard shook the negro with a right to heart; then clipped Johnson's jaw with fast left and started forcing the pace. Johnson was conserving every bit of energy. Willard again landed left to mouth; then repeated it. At the bell Johnson dropped heavily into his seat.  
 Round 26.—Willard opened with smash to Johnson's body. Referee forced them to break from clinch. Willard rushed and hammered right and left to the body of Johnson. Willard smashed Johnson and wins on a knockout. Great crowd rushed into ring and menaced Johnson. Squads of soldiers hurried on the platform and cleared them away.

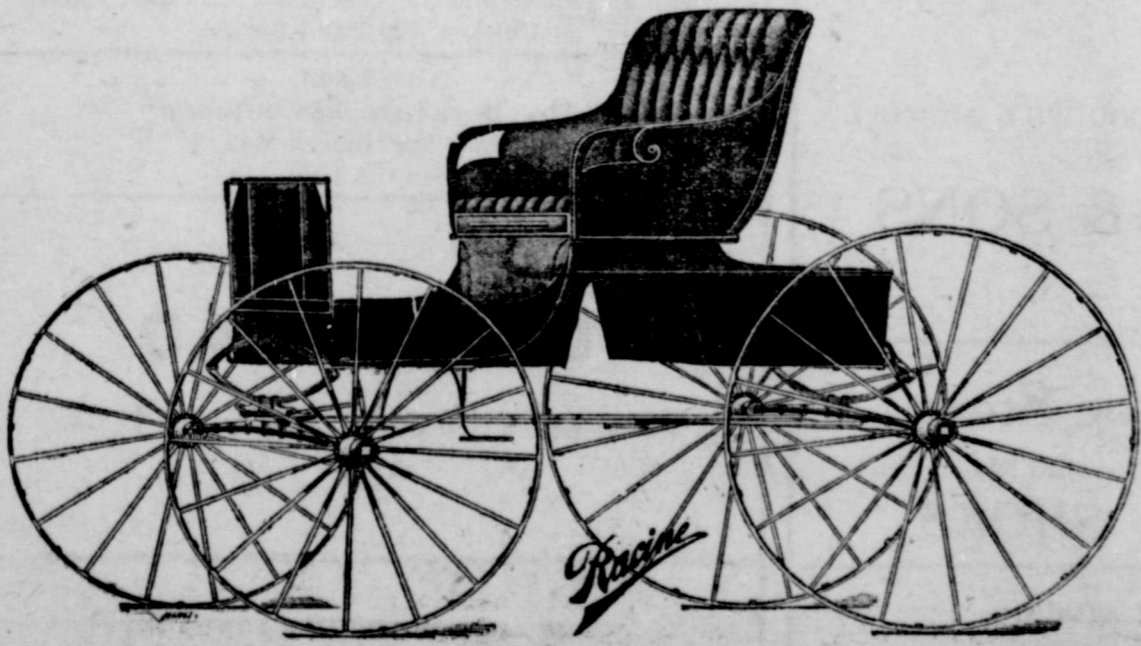
