BADER CONVICTED.

Slayer of Lometa Constable Given a Quick Trial.

F. W. Bader, who went to trial Monday on a charge of murder following the killing of Constable John J. Connell at Lometa, on April 8th, while the constable was trying to arrest him, has been convicted and sentenced to 50 years in penitentiary. The case was tried in the district court at Lampasas.

The case has attracted a wide interest in this section of the state, and throughout the trial the court room was crowded with people who were anxious to hear the testimony and the counsel of the able attorneys employed on both sides of the case. The rapidity which Bader's case was disposed of is one of the interesting points connected with the trial.

Following the killing of Constable Connell, Bader led the officers a merry chase for three or four days, and was finally captured at Ballinger, his home town. It was feared by the officers that there would be mob violence as they passed through Lometa with their prisoner enroute to the jail at Lampasas, but there was no demonstration of any kind and the case went to trial without delay.

The New Scalp Law.

The new scalp law passed by the 34th legislature goes into effect June 19th, 1915. The provisions of the law are that if any person shall kill in this state any wolf, wild cat or jack-rabbit he shall be paid the sum of \$2 for each wolf, and \$1 for each wild cat and 5 cents for each jack rabbit. Friday's Brownwood Bulletin contained the following account of the death:

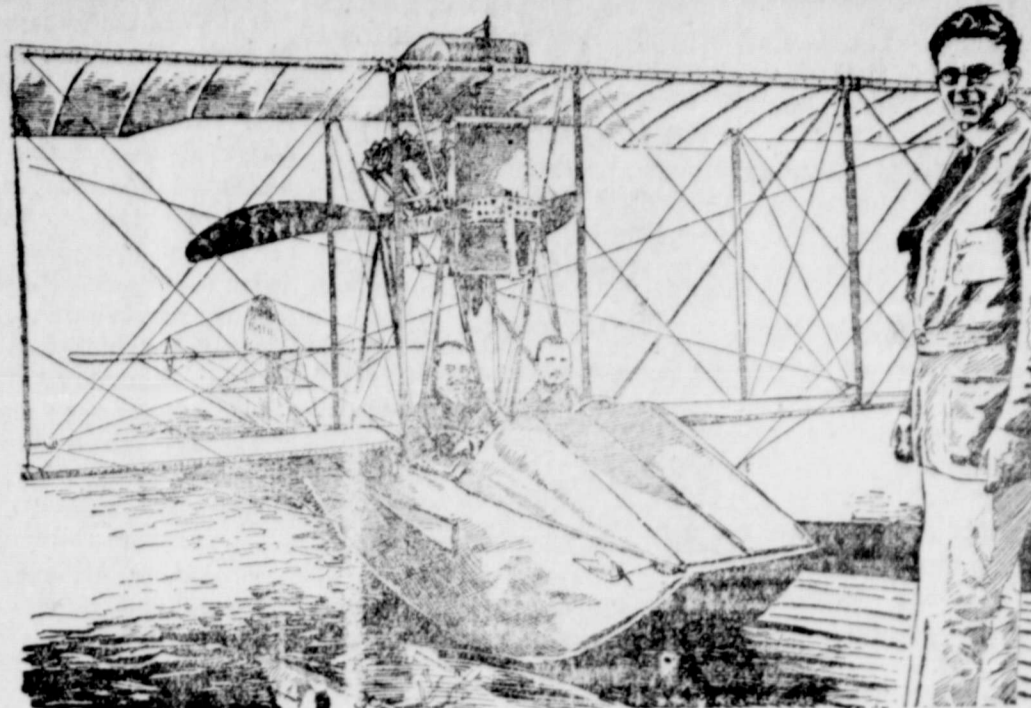

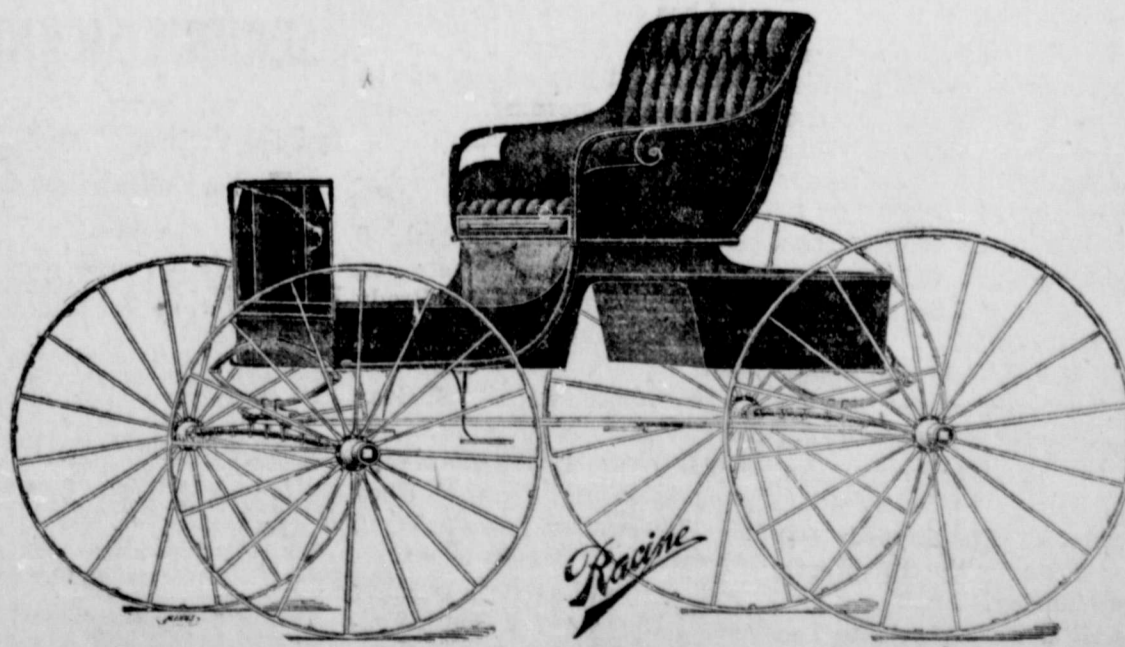
