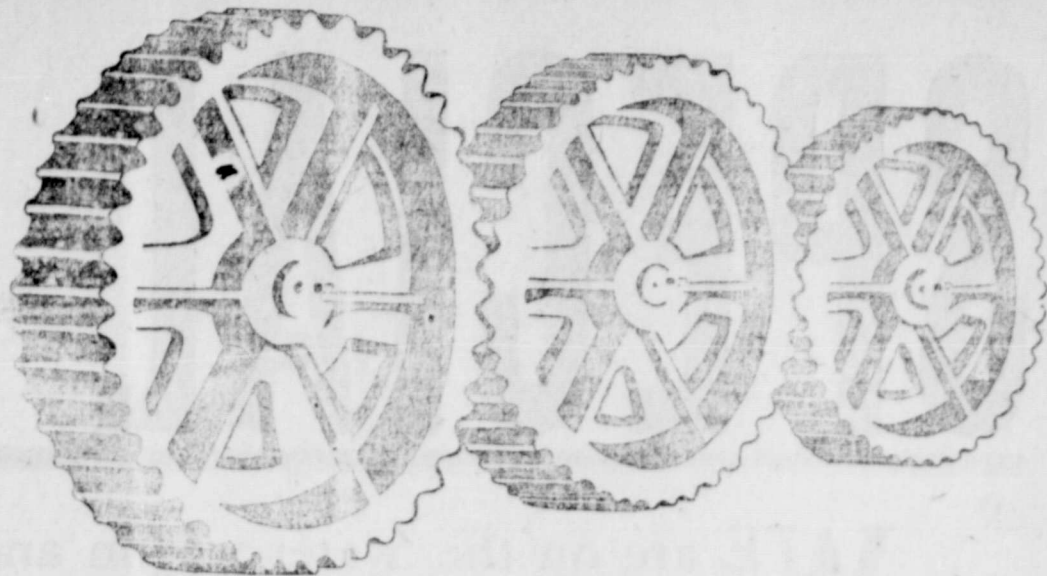

The "Trey O' Hearts" is in its last closing scenes. But two

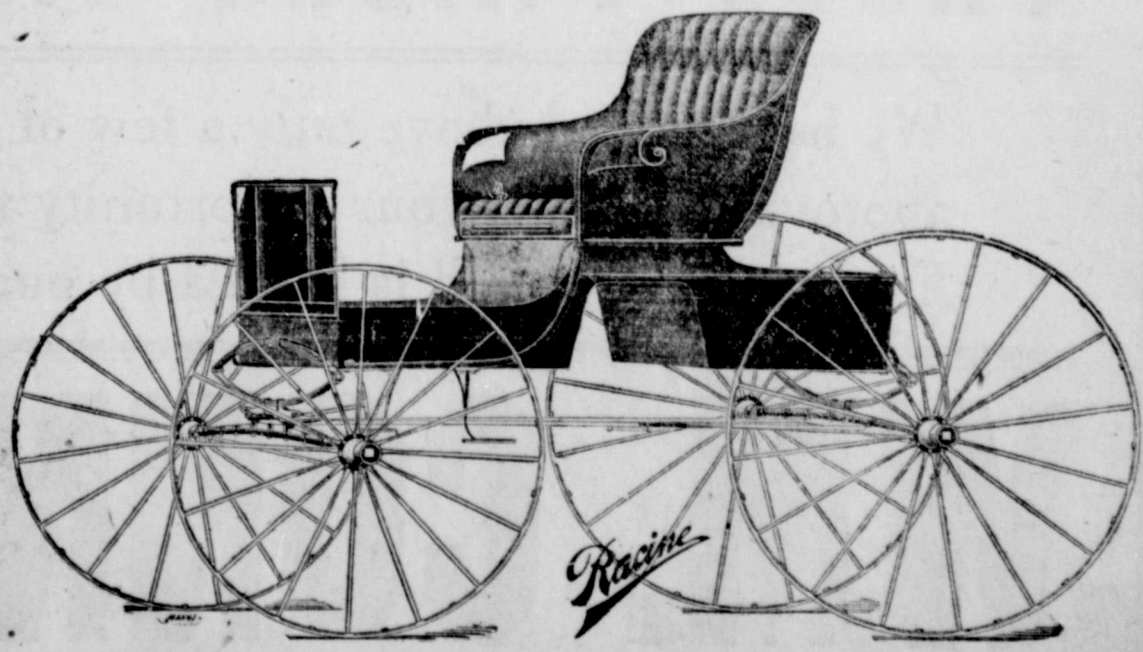
