Ginners Make a New Record in Brady.

McCulloch county is bringing to a close one of the most successful cotton years in its history—so far as the production is concerned.

Receipts at the Brady compress up to the first of this week totaled 49,357 bales.

At the local yards a total of 32,174 bales have been weighed so far, as follows:

JOHN R. DAY DEAD.

Was Well Known in Brady as Cotton Buyer.

Brady citizens will be interested in the following account of the death of John R. Day at San Angelo, on Thursday of last week, he being well known here as well as throughout the county. Mr. Day was located in Brady for a number of years, buying cotton, but for the past two years had been in San Angelo, where he followed the same profession. Mr. Day was a quiet, genial and whole-souled man and his death will be learned of with regret by his many friends. The Ballinger Ledger gives the following account of his demise:

"News was received at Ballinger Thursday evening announcing the death of John R. Day, which occurred at 8 o'clock of the same evening, at San Angelo. He died suddenly while sitting in a rocking chair in his room.

"The remains were shipped to Ballinger Friday afternoon and met at the train by many of the friends and acquaintances of nearly thirty years, and accompanied to the city cemetery, where they were interred. Rev. W. H. Doss conducted the funeral. Not a relative was present to mourn the loss of this man, but his friends did everything possible in laying away the remains. The whereabouts of his relatives are unknown, but efforts will be made to locate them.

"Deceased was 61 years old, and for thirty years had been making his home at Brady, Brownwood, Coleman, Ballinger and San Angelo, buying cotton in all the above cities. At the time of his death he was residing at San Angelo. He had no family, having never married, and his friends took charge of his remains and arranged to bury him at Ballinger. WANT IMPROVED SERVICE.

Passenger Service on Santa Fe Asked For.

A petition addressed to Gov. James E. Ferguson requesting that he present the matter of improved service over the Santa Fe's Lometa branch before the Railroad Commission, has been circulated among the traveling men the past week, and liberally signed.

The Santa Fe at present gives only one service a day in either direction, and at that a mixed train. As a consequence nearly five hours are required in making the trip from Brady to Lometa and vice versa.

STARTING RIGHT.

The Standard takes occasion to commend the work of the street committee of the city council, and also to place the committee right before the citizens. Much comment has been heard lately regarding the work done and being done by the superintendent of street work, out on the hills. Practically every street in the resident districts, on both sides of town, have been thoroughly graded, the gutters being opened up and the middle of the street crowned in order to give the proper drainage. All this work has been commendable—and yet a number of citizens have voiced the opinion that the labor would have been expended to greater advantage upon Blackburn street, Bridge street or the square.

In this they are incorrect. The primary object of the grading that has been done was to convey the storm waters to a natural outlet, and at the same time divert the said waters from Blackburn street, the square and other important and much traveled thoroughfares. In this the street committee has been successful, as the heavy rains the past few weeks have demonstrated. The volume of water that coursed down Blackburn street was lessened to a remarkable degree, and, as a consequence, the street was very little damaged by the flood waters.

With the main cause of damage thus remedied, it will now become practicable to improve the streets and square. However, in this, the city must have the aid of the county, and citizens as well. The city is not able to alone stand the burden of the improvements necessary to place the streets and square in condition which these thoroughfares warrant. Let the citizens unite and give their aid and support, financially and otherwise, toward this work.

In the center of this restful spot with streets from all directions of the wind leading directly to it, stands the court house, an imposing structure of native stone. There is nothing more beautiful than this picture, and yet—

The picture is not complete. The border-town effect is still there in the hitch-racks about the court yards. The square is a loblolly of mud and stagnating water after every rain. It is time for the citizens to unite in a move to abolish the hitch-rack and to grade and pave the square. There are many places that are ample and even better located for a hitching place—and there can be no excuse for allowing the square to continue in its present unsanitary and unsightly condition.

The street committee of the Brady Council has signified its willingness to do its full share in the improvement, and the matter now rests with the County Commissioners in doing their part.

There is no reason why this improvement should not be brought about in the near future.

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Spiller have returned home, from visiting relatives and friends in Texas, near Voca. We are sorry to say Mrs. Spiller has been on the sick list ever since she returned, but thinks she will soon be well again. The people from everywhere are trying to die with la grippe.
Mr. Hunter and Mr. Brown have returned from Mogogolon, New Mexico.
We are sorry to say that our

school will be out the 21st of May. I have missed 7 days out of 9 months school. At the close of school there will be prizes given to each and every scholar and a picnic. Everybody come from Texas and be with us.
Will mention the fine lumber we have here: Pine trees are from 100 feet to 250 feet high, juniper, cedar, willow, sycamore, cottonwood and the largest bois d'arc I ever saw.
This is a fine country to raise horses, cattle, and also a good country to raise hogs. Calves are worth from \$30 to \$32 and good cows from \$75 to \$100.
Miss Gertrude Hayes has returned to her home at Fairview, where she had been visiting her sister, Mrs. Williams quite a while.
Two of Mrs. Williams' little children are visiting their grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Hayes.

No Texas Blue-Bonnets in Oregon.
Wonder, Ore., April 25, Editor Brady Standard:
Now, just listen to that! Did you notice the headlines of my last article? It said: "Oregon wild flowers, but no Texas Blue-Bonnets." I didn't say that at all, some one else put it in. Of course we have no Texas Blue-Bonnets; but we have Oregon Blue-Bonnets, which are the same kind of flowers, only they do not grow so large here as they do there; nor so thick on the ground. People are planting potatoes here now. They haven't planted corn and beans yet. We had frost three mornings last week and ice one morning as thick as a pane of glass. I don't know whether it killed all of the fruit or not; but I don't think it did.
When I get around to it I am going to tell you about some of the funny laws we have in this state.

where he will check up the season's business and turn over his books; from there he will go to Ft. Worth and Dallas to spend the summer.

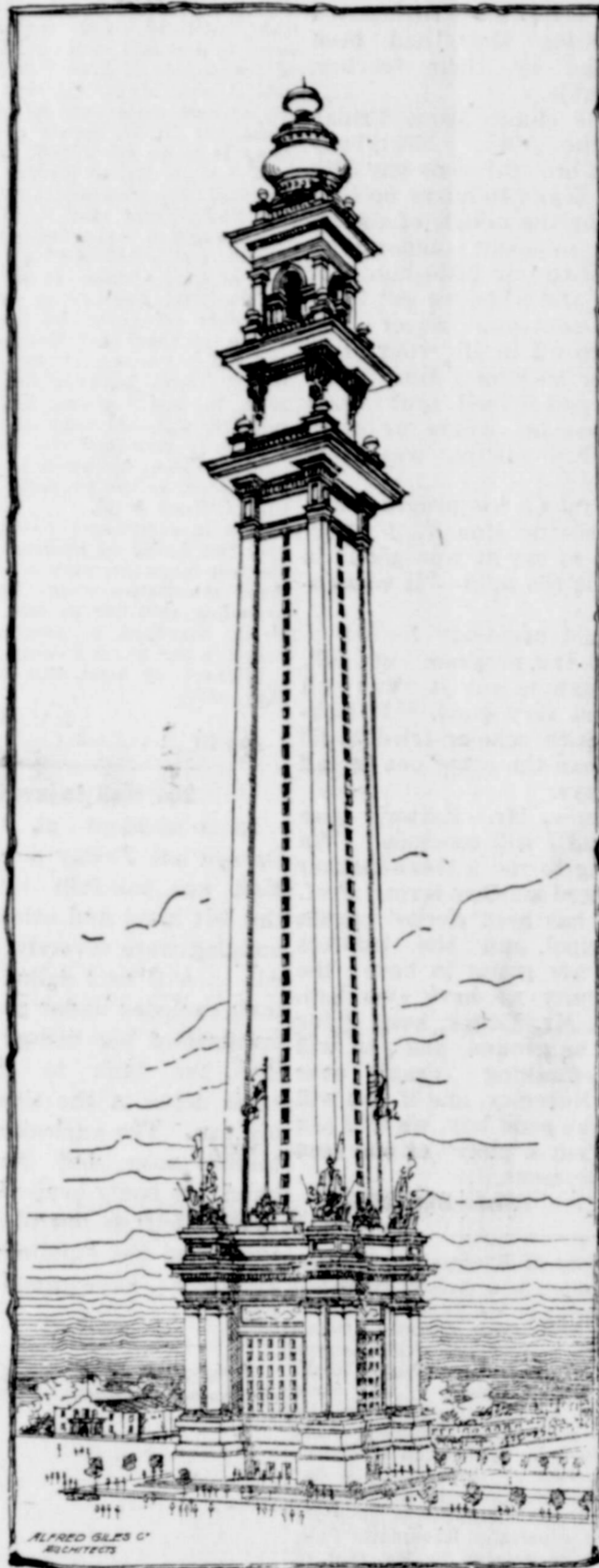

PROPOSED ALAMO HEROES MONUMENT



The above is an architect's drawing of the proposed Alamo Heroes' monument, to be erected to the Texas heroes who lost their lives in the defense of the Alamo. The monument, as planned, will be the highest in the world, reaching skyward to a height of 802 feet. It will contain auditoriums, a museum, an art gallery and statuary hall, and a separate room for every county in Texas, to be devoted by each to the encouragement of art and history by the maintenance of exhibits along these lines associated with that county.

In order to raise funds for its erection councils have been organized in each county to raise money by the sale of tickets, such tickets to entitle the holder to visit the art galleries, museum and other attractions contained within the monument at any time, and also the purchas-

er will have his or her name inscribed in the building so that for all time to come it will be possible to see to whom the people are indebted for this magnificent monument. The funds so raised will be placed in trust until the actual construction is commenced.

Mrs. F. W. Henderson has been named as vice-president of the State Council, and as such will be chairman of the McCulloch County council, while Mrs. T. J. King will be secretary, and to them will be entrusted the work of organizing the local council and the raising of the funds. Mrs. R. A. King has been delegated to call on the citizens to explain the purpose and intentions of the local council, and to solicit membership. It is hoped that every citizen will give her liberal encouragement, and make it possible for McCulloch county to be represented in the building in a fitting manner.
