TRADE TRIP ASSURED

HIGHLY GRATIFYING REPLY FROM SANTA FE.

Meeting Monday Night; Other Communities to Be Represented on the Trip.

Since the matter of a trade excursion was first brought to the attention of Brady and McCulloch county citizens, the project has met with the greatest interest and enthusiasm on all hands. In fact, it may be stated that the trip is an assured fact, especially in view of the highly gratifying letter received from W. S. Keenan, general passenger agent of the Santa Fe.

Rochelle has entered heartily into the move, and has guaranteed to send at least fifteen live wires on the trip; Mercury and Lohn will send about ten representatives, and other communities will follow suit.

In view of this lively interest

upon the part of our neighbors, it is a foregone conclusion that the required 100 excursionists will be obtained without the least difficulty.

The following is the letter from Mr. Keenan at Galveston, addressed to E. L. White, acting secretary of the Brady Commercial Club.

"Your favor of May 8th addressed to Mr. Hull, our Superintendent at Temple, regarding prospective Trade League excursion of the Brady Chamber of Commerce, has been referred to me.

"We will be very glad to operate a special train to accommodate your party, handling from Brady to Galveston via Houston, Galveston to Milano and from Milano to Austin via the I. & G. N., Austin to Lampasas via the H. & T. C., thence to Brady via Lometa, on a suitable schedule, allowing stops at points desired, upon a guarantee of 100 adult fares for the round trip. The rate will be constructed one and one-half cents per mile per capita, and

CAPTURED IN TEMPLE.

Negro Wanted Here on Forgery Charge Arrested Last Week.

Willie Washington (alias Willie Harris) also known as "The Baby Doll", wanted here on a charge of forgery, was arrested last week in Temple and brought here Sunday morning by Deputy Sheriff John Martin and lodged in the county jail.

An examining trial was held Wednesday morning before Justice of the Peace T. J. King and the negro was held to the grand jury under \$500 bond, in default of which he was remanded to the custody of the sheriff.

Washington is alleged to have presented a check for \$15.00 to Wm. Connolly & Co. about three weeks ago, bearing the signature of R. W. Lee, superintendent of the Brady Compress Co., after making purchases amounting to \$6.00. The forgery was easily detected by W. B. McKenzie, office man for Connolly & Co., who requested the negro to wait until he could call Mr. Lee over the telephone and find out about the check. Seeing that he was in a fair way to get into trouble, the negro concluded that it was his move and hastily made his get-away.

A diligent search of the town was made by Sheriff Wall, Mr. Lee and Odum Martin immediately, but the negro succeeded in making his escape, and eluded the officers until he was picked up last week by Temple police.

RATE MAY BE LOWERED.

Inspection of Brady Made Yesterday by Engineer Godley

Chief Engineer R. B. Godley, Jr., of the State Fire Insurance Commission, was in the city yesterday from Austin for the purpose of making an inspection of the town, looking to a reduction and readjustment of the fire insurance key rate for Brady.

Mr. Godley's visit is a result of considerable correspondence between Mayor A. C. Baze and the commission relative to lowering of the insurance key rate of the town since the installation of the new automobile fire truck early in March, and Mr. Godley gave assurance that the rate would be materially decreased just as soon as the matter could be officially passed upon by the commission.

After a thorough inspection of the fire department equipment and the city's pumping station and electric light plant, Mr. Godley stated that the rate could be very easily lower-

ed from 60c to 38c, and the expense of making the necessary improvements to entitle the city to the lower rate was negligible when compared to the benefits accruing to the policy holders. He stated that as soon as possible he would send Mayor Baze a schedule of the inexpensive changes which could be made by the city, showing the amount of credits which would accrue if complied with.

Mr. Godley was especially complimentary regarding the city's new motor fire truck, and stated that Brady was far ahead of the average town of its size in the matter of fire protection. He also stated that the addition of a night watchman to the regular police force of

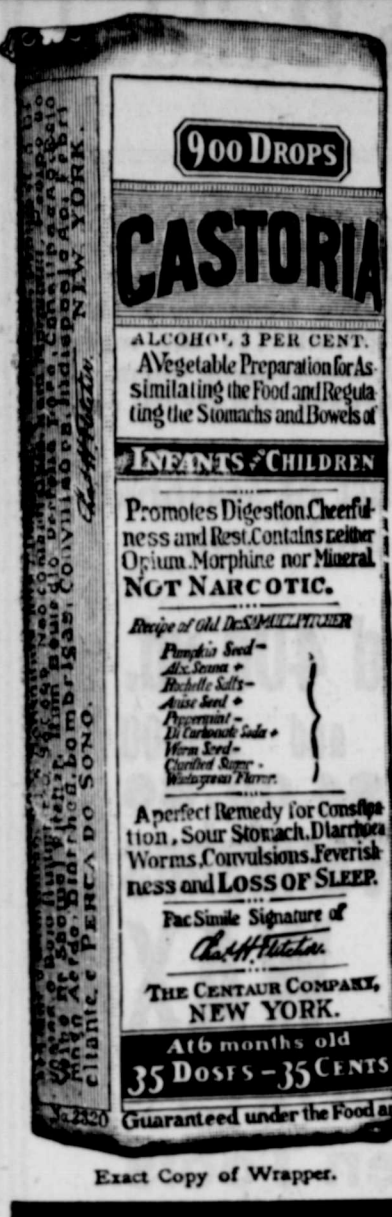

ANOTHER CHOICE MORSEL

In the last issue of The Standard we gave you some "Food For Reflection". In this issue, we are going to give you "Another Choice Morsel."

Let it be understood at the outset that we are after no one's scalp; we are not making these articles personal; we are not finding fault—we are striving in our limited way to present facts that will be helpful to our citizens, our towns and our communities—that will add to their prosperity.

Last issue we told you briefly about bad accounts—a dead loss—that must be borne by the man who pays. Do not think for an instant that we hold the credit merchant to blame. He, like the man who seeks credit, has little choice in the matter. When a man has been a good customer; let us say a good cash customer—and then comes to his merchant in times of stress and asks for credit, it would, indeed, be a cold-blooded man who, if he were in position, would refuse to lend aid. But, as we stated in our last article, right then is when that man, and every other customer, is penalized to the extent of paying for the book-keeping, the collecting, the additional expense, and last, but not least, the bad accounts.

Not long ago a business man (and, by-the-way, he is a BUSINESS man and not a store-keeper) asked: "I have here an article that I sell on credit for \$25.00. For cash I can sell it for \$20.00. Now, should I call the attention of the prospective customer to the difference in the cash and credit prices?" Most assuredly he should. A man will get to thinking when he realizes the penalty imposed by the credit system—and he will, if he possibly can, pay the cash! A good many are married to the credit business—they expect credit when they have the cash in their pocket. But drive this fact home, that they pay 25 per cent additional when they ask credit, and the chances are they will pay the cash.

That is a terrible penalty to pay. Twenty-five per cent. One-fourth of the value of an article paid to cover the expense of a system that has, and is, dragging at the neck of the South like a millstone!

That is all for this week—next week we will tell how the merchant is penalized because he lives in a part of the U. S. that has that rotten plank, the

credit basis, in her industrial system.

we require a guarantee of \$1.50 per train mile or one hundred round trip adult fares, all over 100 passengers to pay regular per capita fare.

"Upon receipt of advice that the trade tour is decided upon, we will be very glad to submit a detailed schedule to cover the proposed route."

As will be noted from the above letter the fare will be \$1.50 per train mile, and as the proposed trade excursion will cover between 800 and 900 miles the fare will approximate \$15.00 per capita. In view of the extensive trip planned, and the stop-overs to be had at Galveston, Austin and other points, this is highly gratifying to the members of the Brady Commercial Club who conceived the idea inasmuch as their lowest calculation did not exceed this figure.

The following is the tentative schedule: Leaving Brady to arrive in Temple at 6:30 a. m. (breakfast); Rogers, Cameron, Caldwell, Somerville, (dinner); Brenham, Sealy, Rosenberg. Spend night at Houston, leaving at 8:00 a. m., Alvin, Galveston (spend twelve hours here, arriving at 11:00 a. m.). Arrive Milano 6:00 a. m., Rockdale, Thorndale, Thrall, Taylor, Round Rock, Austin (arrive 4:30 p. m., spend night). Arrive Liberty Hill 7:20 a. m., Burnet, Lampasas, Lometa, Brady at 6:00 p. m.

As will be noted the schedule permits an all-night stop-over in Houston; twelve hours in Galveston, and fourteen hours in Austin.

In common with all other Brady citizens, Messrs. E. L. White and R. W. Lee, who have interested themselves in planning the trip and in securing the necessary information, are delighted with the prospects for a successful trade excursion.

A mass meeting will be called at the court house on Monday night at 8:00 o'clock at which time the matter will be laid before the citizens, for their consideration and official sanction. Every citizen is earnestly requested to attend.

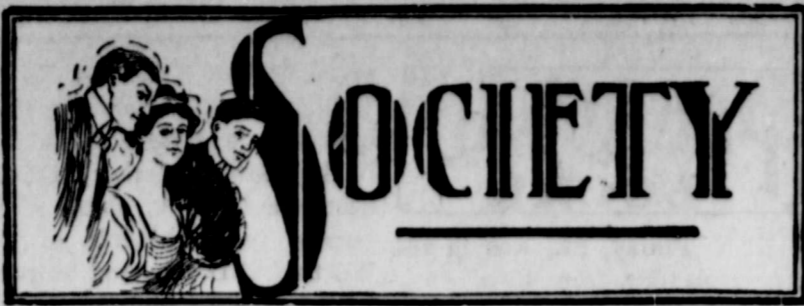

COMMISSIONERS' COURT.

Busy Session of Court Being Held This Week.

The regular May term of commissioners' court convened Monday, with all members present, and the session promises to be one of the most lengthy of the year.

Orders made by the court up to yesterday were as follows:

Acting upon a numerously signed petition from the qualified voters of Precinct No. 8, the court appointed Frank Peeper constable of that precinct.

G. R. Burton was allowed the sum of \$10 per month for the support of R. N. Jones, a pauper, and the clerk of the court instructed to draw a warrant on the general fund the first of each month in favor of Mr. Burton for this amount until otherwise instructed by the court.

Quarterly report of Sheriff J. C. Wall for the period ending May 1st showing fines and judgments collected amounting to \$168.85, was examined, found correct and approved.

Supplemental tax roll for the year 1914 was presented by Tax Collector S. H. Mayo, and the amounts shown to the credit of the various funds were ordered charged to the account of Mr. Mayo as follows: Advalorem, \$204.40; special county, \$240.18; road district No. 1, \$112.54; county poll, \$110.20; district school, \$47.25.

The following amounts shown on the delinquent rolls for 1914 were ordered credited to the account of Tax Collector Mayo: Advalorem, \$165.69; special county, \$194.59; road district No. 1, \$52.69; county poll, \$3.00; district school, \$229.44.

The account of Tax Collector Mayo was ordered credited with the sum of \$847.53 due to erroneous assessments.

The account of S. H. Mayo was ordered credited with the sum of \$610.11 on delinquent taxes for years previous to 1914, and also with the sum of \$512.51 for delinquent taxes for 1914.
