Orders made by the court up to yesterday were as follows: Acting upon a numerously signed petition from the qualified voters of Precinct No. 8. the court appointed Frank Peiper constable of that precinct. G. R. Burton was allowed the sum of \$10 per month for the support of R. N. Jones, a pau-

per, and the clerk of the court instructed to draw a warrant on the general fund the first of each month in favor of Mr. Burton for this amount until otherwise instructed by the court.

Quarterly report of Sheriff J. C. Wall for the period ending May 1st showing fines and judgments collected amounting to \$168.85, was examined. found correct and approved.

Supplemental tax roll for the year 1914 was presented by Tax Collector S. H. 
