BOLD ROBBERY.

Scott & Co. Victim of Daring Daylight Theft.

One of the boldest robberies in the history of Brady was perpetrated Wednesday morning shortly before 9:00 o'clock when \$130 in cash was stolen from the safe at Scott & Co.'s grocery store, next door to the postoffice. Although two arrests have been made, officers stated yesterday that the evidence against the prisoners was insufficient to hold them, and they will probably be released from custody today.

Manager C. W. Scott, just before the robbery was discovered, had made up a deposit preparatory to going to the bank. Before starting to the bank, however, other business called him from the store, and he unlocked a drawer in the safe and placed his pass book containing \$115 in currency and a large number of checks in it, with \$15 in silver on top. He locked the drawer again, but neglect-

ed to remove the key. Upon returning to the store a few minutes later he discovered the robbery and immediately notified the sheriff's office.

Shortly before noon Sheriff J. C. Wall and Tax Collector S. H. Mayo arrested two Mexicans just south of the city and lodged them in jail on a charge of robbery.

When taken into custody one of the men was armed with a Savage automatic of large calibre concealed in his shirt front. The other was unarmed, but a search of a grip found in their possession brought to light a varied automatic, along with a varied collection of jewelry.

\$40 in cash was also found, but the money could not be identified as that taken from the safe.

LEASES CREAMERY.

Plant Will Be Open for Business Shortly.

A deal was closed Monday by the terms of which Messrs. W. R. Henderson and Henry Tipton become the lessees of the Brady Creamery plant located just west of the city.

The plant is owned by Henry Miller of this city and was operated by him up to last fall, but has been closed down for several months.

The plant was installed by a local company about five years ago and operated by them for about two years, and since that time has only been operated through the summer months. Mr. Miller became the owner of the plant two years ago, but on account of other business demanding his attention has been unable to look after the business himself. The creamery is fully equipped with up-to-date machinery and appliances, and is said to be one of the best small plants in this section of the state.

Messrs. Henderson and Tipton are well-known Brady boys, both being students in the public schools the past term. Mr. Henderson is an experienced creamery man, having had several years' connection with some of the largest concerns of Oklahoma, and the business, under the management of these energetic and capable young men will doubtless meet with deserved success.

The plant will likely be opened for business about the first of the coming month.

BUSINESS FIRST, PLEASURE AFTER.

In view of the proposed "Booster Excursion" into South Texas by the merchants and citizens of McCulloch county. The Standard would like to call attention to the necessity of having good advertising literature. In fact, the real value of a trip of this kind depends upon getting information of value concerning the McCulloch Country before the prospective home-seeker.

Of course, it is well enough to make the trip merely from the standpoint of pleasure—have a good time; jolly the natives who come to the depot to see the train pass; take a dip in the gulf, and come back full of pep. But our understanding of the objective of the trip is primarily to boost McCulloch county; to induce more settlers to come here; to acquaint folks with what we have and what we need. In order to do so, the right kind of advertising literature must be prepared, and as the time is short, it must be prepared at once.

As we require about 16 hours for sleep, two hours for dressing, four hours for eating, and one hour for the ordinary run of business, it will readily be seen that we have but little time to spare on special work. Consequently for the good of the cause, we would suggest to any and everyone who contemplates taking part in the Booster Excursion, to supply himself with advertising literature concerning his business and his home town and McCulloch county in particular at the earliest possible moment.

Last issue we took up the matter of discrimination against the dealer in the South. We told how it handicapped the merchant, and in turn the customer.
