CLEVER WORK.

Sheriff Wall Recovers Quantity of Stolen Property.

A clever bit of detective work was done last Friday by Sheriff J. C. Wall in the recovery of three revolvers which had been stolen from O. D. Mann & Sons store about six weeks ago.

One of the pistols was found in possession of the two Mexicans, Francisco Chavez and Jose Gonzales, who were arrested last Wednesday morning by Mr. Wall and Tax Collector S. H. Mayo on a charge of robbing Scott & Co.'s grocery store that morning, an account of which appeared in last Friday's issue of The Standard. A few days later, while making a search of a Mexican house the officers located a grip which belonged to one of the men, and in it found a pistol and scabbard belonging to W. E. Campbell, with his name stamped on the scabbard. A further search brought to light a pawn ticket issued by Callan & Westbrook of Menard for another revolver, which, when compared with the number of the one stolen from Mann & Son's store tallied exactly. Sheriff Wall went to Menard Saturday and took possession of the stolen gun.

A quantity of jewelry believed to have been stolen was also taken charge of by Sheriff Wall, the collection consisting of rings, watches, brooches, stickpins, etc.

Being unable to secure sufficient evidence to convict the two men of the Scott & Co. robbery Gonzales was released from custody late Thursday afternoon, while Chavez was held on a charge of carrying concealed weapons. On locating the stolen pistols, however, Friday morning, Sheriff Wall again arrested Gonzales and lodged him in the county jail.

The officers are still working on the theory that Chavez and Gonzales committed the Scott robbery, and believe that they will yet be able to fasten the crime on them. A warrant has been issued for the arrest of another Mexican in connection with the case.

Bankers to Finance Crop.

Waco, Tex., May 22.—At the annual meeting of the Texas Bankers' association in this city this week resolutions were unanimously adopted condemning the past methods of marketing cotton in Texas and pledging the financial and moral support of the membership of the organization in perfecting a system of successfully marketing future cotton crops of Texas.

The resolution advocates the organization of bankers, farmers and other business men in every county in the State for the purpose of carrying on educational work in order to bring about an intelligent plan of selling the staple.

The meeting was attended by bankers from practically every county in the state and the membership went on record as favoring the present warehouse law and pronounced the warehouse receipt, issued under this law a bonded, negotiable and a safe instrument. The resolution as adopted states that the selling price of cotton should at all times be based on the price of production and upon the law of supply and demand.

Definite plans for handling the 1915 crop are now under way and will be made public in the near future.

OPERA HOUSE CLOSED.

Changes to be Made—Watch for Opening Date.

Last week it looked exceedingly as though the Brady Opera house would be converted into an exclusively motion picture theatre; that its stage would be torn out, its floor ripped up and the slant reversed, etc. All this meant there would be no stage, scenery or building for opera, comedy, stock or local talent productions. This was in compliance with the state law. Those who enjoy comedy and stock plays will be pleased to learn that though Manager Levy will be put to both loss and expense, permission has been given to retain the stage, scenery, etc., by making certain changes in seating arrangements, exits, and machine booth in compliance with the State Fire Marshal's orders. When the subject presented its worst aspect for him last week Mr. Levy stood ready cheerfully, as he said, "for the public's safety" to obey to the letter every requirement, although his house is not yet 18 months old, has cost him every dollar he has earned, his land-lease has but a year to run, and the changes would have plunged him in debt. It is uncertain when the opera house will re-open, but it will remain closed all during the revival meeting.

Such determination and tenacity, to go to loss for public good certainly is deserving of a public interest that will give him a good patronage.

During the past two weeks we have turned out one complete telephone directory, the composition on two other telephone directories; one 50-page brief, the composition on a 35-page brief, and in addition a large run of smaller job printing, besides the issuing of the regular Standard twice-a-week, and the compiling, composing, making up and printing of the Special Edition.

The average person cannot realize what a vast amount of labor the getting out of a special edition entails. First, there is the gathering, compilation, rejection, assorting and simmering down of a thousand and one facts. Then the re-writing of the result of this process, and the composing of the same, or putting it into type. Then the type must be read for errors, changes, revisions and corrections—and the corrections made, after which the matter must be arranged in suitable style in the pages for which it is intended.

Then comes the press-work. The cuts (pictures) must be worked over and made to print to the best advantage. Sometimes they are too high and must be planed down; sometimes too low, and must be built up; sometimes they are warped, in which case we have the same kind of war that Sherman had.

The presswork: Take an edition of 5,000 copies like The Standard's Special—5,000 copies of a 24-page paper. That means 30,000 impressions on the press alone; it means 15,000 sheets fed through the folder; it means 15,000 sheets handled in the gathering; it means 5,000 papers handled in the mailing. It means an almost endless task. And we are glad it's done!

SHOULD RAISE SNAKES

Every farmer and every poultry raiser should keep a few snakes as a protection to his crops and poultry, says Allen S. Williams, secretary of the International Herpetological Society, in a statement just issued. Williams is a traveler and a lecturer and snakes are his hobby. He has collected reptiles in every part of the western hemisphere. "The idea is simple," Williams says, "Rats, weasels and other rodents destroy crops and are the natural enemies of domestic fowls. Snakes are the natural enemies of rodents. Keep a few snakes to kill off the young rodents and in time your crops and chickens will be safe. To the cereal crops alone in the United States rodents cause an annual loss of \$100,000,000. If snakes had even half a chance the loss to farmers and poultry raisers would be reduced to practically nothing. There are a dozen varieties which could accomplish the work and are non-poisonous."

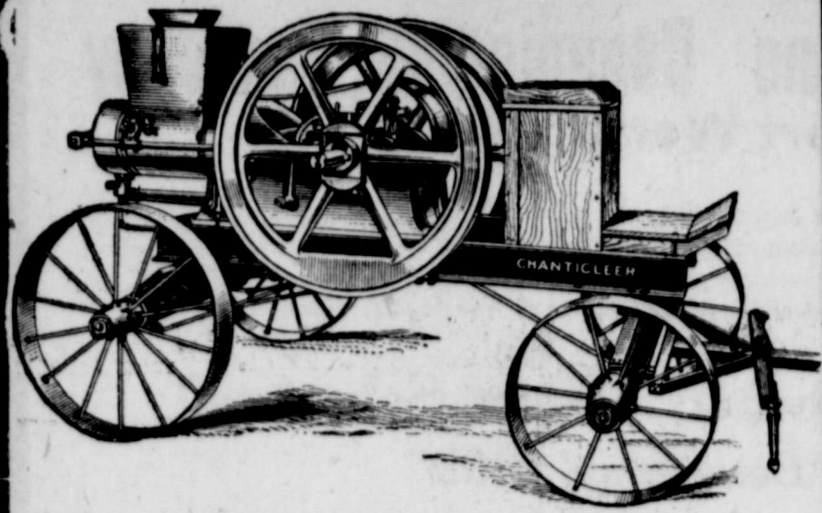

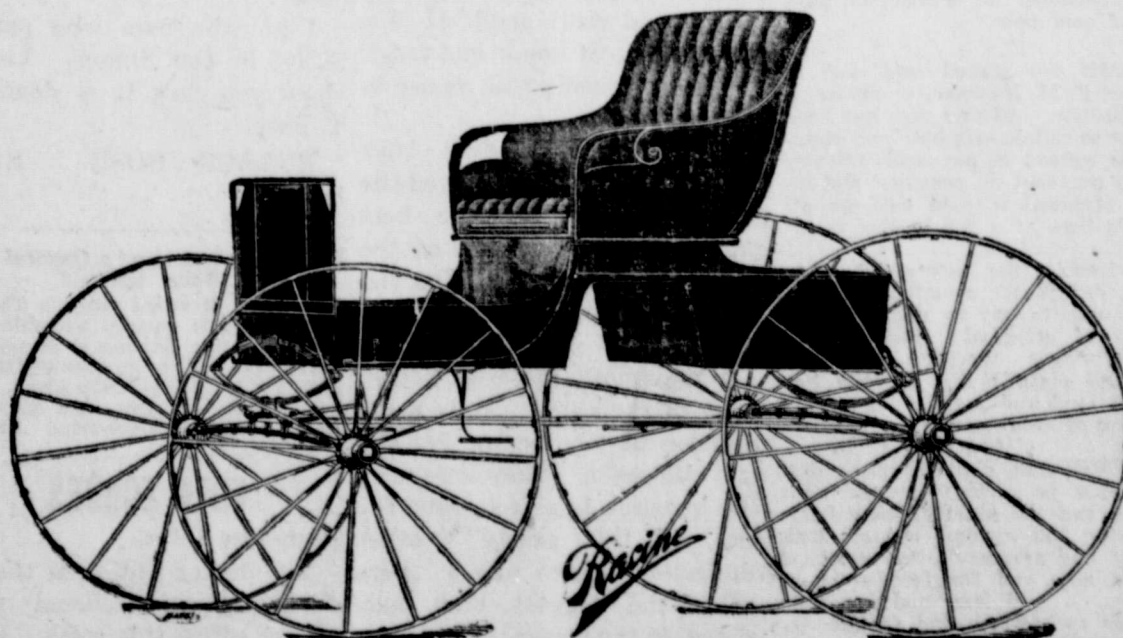


