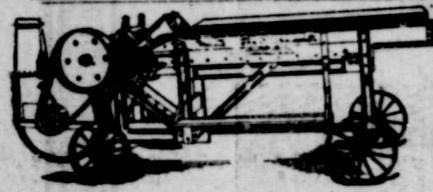

FOR A CITY PARK.

Effort to Be Made to Raise Fund for Purchase of Site.

In conversation with ex-Mayor F. M. Richards a few days ago a Standard representative was informed that an effort would again be made to raise the necessary funds for the purchase of a tract of land to be used as a city park. One of the most desirable sites in or near the city, according to Mr. Richards, can now be purchased at a very nominal figure, and he feels that the time for acquiring this property for the use and benefit of the citizens of Brady is at hand.

The tract of land which Mr. Richards has in mind is located in the T. J. Wood's property, west of the city, and includes the large pecan grove at the city waterworks dam, where the barbecue is to be held tomorrow. The body of land which it is proposed to acquire for park purposes consists of 42 acres and includes land on both sides of the dam. The site is one that possesses more advantages for park purposes than any other to be had, having an abundance of pecan and live oak trees, in addition to the large body of water which is afforded by the dam. The water course is more than three miles in length and would furnish excellent opportunities for motor and row boating, while the beautiful grounds surrounding may be used for various other sports and innocent amusements.

Shortly before retiring from the mayor's office, more than two years ago, Mr. Richards brought this matter to the attention of the city council, and at that time agreed to subscribe \$500 to a fund to be raised for the purchase of this tract of land for park purposes. Nothing was done, however, and the matter went by default.

In talking of the matter with friends a few days ago he again renewed his offer, and stated that he understood that the land could now be purchased for \$4,000, and that he considered it well worth the price.

It is to be hoped that some one will feel sufficiently interested in this matter to take it up and if possible raise the amount necessary for the purchase, and thus afford the citizens of Brady a place of rest and recreation.

ALL IS IN READINESS

BRADY WILL BE HOST TO BIG CROWD TOMORROW.

Barbecue Dinner, Speaking, and Other Forms of Entertainment for Visitors.

Brady is ready to receive her guests at the Big Barbecue tomorrow.

Preparations have been made for the entertainment of one of the largest crowds in history of the city.

The entire citizenship is a unit in welcoming the guests, and each will vie with the other in their efforts to make the day one never to be forgotten.

All the committees in charge of arrangements for the big celebration have discharged their duties in a most thorough manner, and the crowd which attends is assured the time of their lives. A big force of workmen has been engaged the past week or more in clearing up the grounds at the waterworks dam, where the barbecue is to take place, and the result of their work makes it one of the most inviting scenes imaginable. All the underbrush has been cleared away over a large area, leaving the beautiful pecan groves to supply an abundance of shade for the big crowd which will be here.

The entertainment committee has secured a number of well known orators, who will address the visitors on subjects of interest. Prominent among the number is Hon. Clarence Ousley, director of the Department of Extension of A. & M. college, who will deliver a lecture of special interest to the farmers at 10:00 o'clock. Mr. Ousley is one of the best known authorities on agricultural and marketing questions in the entire South and his message to the farmers will be of more than passing interest.

A feature of the afternoon's entertainment will be an address by Hon. Jas. Callan. Mr. Callan is well known to the citizenship of this section, having for many years been identified with the Texas Cattle Raisers' association, of which organization he was formerly president, and is an orator of unusual merit.

The main attraction for the day, however, will be the big barbecue dinner, which will be served at noon. The committee has arranged for fifteen big beeves, in addition to a dozen sheep and goats. The butchering is being done today, and fires will be started in the pits this afternoon and when dinner is announced tomorrow there will be an abundance of juicy, well cooked barbecue for everyone, as well as pickles, bread and coffee.

The East Sweden band will discourse sweet music throughout the day, and this feature will add to the enjoyment of the occasion.

Drop your business cares for the day and come out and enjoy yourself. A hearty welcome is extended you by the citizens of Brady, and assurance is given that everything will be done to make the day one of the most memorable and enjoyable of your life.

BOOSTERS COMING.

San Saba Citizens to Make Two Day Trip Advertising Fair.

To advertise their annual fair and encampment, the citizens of San Saba are planning to send out a booster train for a two-day trip over Central and Central West Texas.

At least 150 of San Saba's live wires will go on the trip, which will be the most extensive yet attempted by the citizens of this progressive little city, and a number of ladies will be included in the party. The San Saba band will also accompany the boosters and will render short concerts in each of the cities to be visited.

Leaving San Saba at 6:30 o'clock on the morning of July the 15th, stops of twenty to forty minutes will be made at the following towns: Lometa, Lampasas, Copperas Cove, Killeen, Belton. At Temple the party will spend two hours, where dinner will be served them. In the afternoon Moody and McGregor will be the only two towns visited, twenty minutes being spent in the former and fifty minutes in the latter place. The next stop is at Waco, where the night will be spent. After leaving Waco stops will be made at Gatesville and Hamilton, reaching Comanche for dinner.

At Comanche the train will be transferred from the Cotton Belt to the Frisco, the next stop being at Brownwood where an hour will be spent. Ten minute stops will be made at Winchell, Mercury and Rochelle, the special arriving here at 7:01 and remaining until 7:31.

San Saba rightfully boasts the best county fair in the state, and the citizens of both town and county are enthusiastic boosters for it, never overlooking an opportunity to advance its best interests.

They should, and doubtless will, receive a hearty welcome in every city visited on this trip next week.

Former Brady Boy Has Thrilling Experience.

Forrest Adams, well known in McCulloch county, and a former Brady boy, had an exciting experience in Old Mexico recently, having been arrested by Villa soldiers on the charge of having counterfeit postage stamps. The stamps were genuine enough, having been purchased on the American side, but being an issue of the Carranza government, they were not recognized by the Villa forces. Nevertheless they were finally admitted to the mails, several having been received by friends in Brady.

The following account is reprinted from the Brownwood Bulletin:

"The unpleasant experience of being a prisoner of the Villista forces at Ciudad Juarez, Mexico, has caused Forrest Adams, formerly of Brownwood, but now a traveling salesman out of Ft. Worth, to make a solemn vow never again to set foot on Mexican soil. Mr. Adams is in Brownwood today looking after business matters and telling a few friends of his most recent visit to the land of continuous rebellion.

of many years' standing, crossed the Rio Grande river into Jaurez for the purpose of mailing postcards which showed typical Mexican scenes, he bought a supply of Mexican stamps from an American stationer of Juarez and proceeded down the street looking for a mail box. Just before he dropped the cards into the box Mr. Adams was seized by a Villista soldier, who examined the post cards and invited Mr. Adams to 'come along'. The pair then started down the street toward the dirty, musty, evil-smelling dungeon used as a jail in Juarez.

"With the jail in sight, Adams began an argument with his captor. He protested that he had bought the cards and the stamps in good faith, and believed the stamps were genuine. Fortunately he was taken directly to the store from which he purchased the stamps, and called the American store-keeper into the game as a witness. The storekeeper insisted that the stamps were good ones, whereupon Adams was released, and the vender of the counterfeit stamps was arrested instead. 'Never again,' says Mr. Adams, 'will I cross the line.'

"Returning from El Paso Mr. Adams had an interesting conversation with two young generals of the Villista army, who were enroute to Washington to see President Wilson in the interest of peace. The men were a general and a lieutenant colonel, respectively, under General Villa.
