### ENLARGING GARAGE.

#### Brady Auto Co. Making Substantial Addition to Building.

A large force of workmen has been engaged this week in clearing off the lot east of the Brady Auto Co. garage, preparatory to the erection of a 45x100 foot addition to the present quarters of the company.

The new addition will be constructed of sheet iron, fronting 45 feet on the south and extending the full length of the old building north—a distance of 100 feet. A portion will be used in enlarging the present machine shop, 40x45 feet off the north end being cut off for this purpose, while the 60 feet on the south will be used for storage of new cars and for the accommodation of cars of their customers.

Contract for the foundation has been awarded C. R. Horn, and work will be started as soon as the material, which has been ordered, arrives here. Contract for the erection of the building has not been let, but will be awarded before the foundation is completed in order that the work may be rushed to completion as early as possible.

The new building when completed will give the company one of the largest garages in this section of the state, having a total floor space of 14,500 square

feet.

The addition is made necessary by the almost phenomenal growth of the business of the company the past few years, their floor space now being more than double that of two years ago, and still they are somewhat hampered by a lack of room. Just a year ago today the company's garage was totally destroyed by fire, in which a total loss of something like \$15,000 was sustained, with only \$1000 insurance. Work was begun on the erection of a new and more commodious building at the earliest possible moment, and the present quarters of the company stand as a monument to the energy and business ability of Manager B. A. Hallum.

#### Incipient Blaze.

A still alarm of fire at 10:30 Tuesday night took the fire department to the rear of the Syndicate building, where a large pile of trash was on fire.

The fire is supposed to have been started from a furnace used by the contractor who is engaged in putting a new roof on the building, and was discovered by S. J. Durnett, who promptly notified the firemen.

No damage was done and the blaze was easily extinguished with one of the small hand chemical extinguishers carried on the auto fire truck.

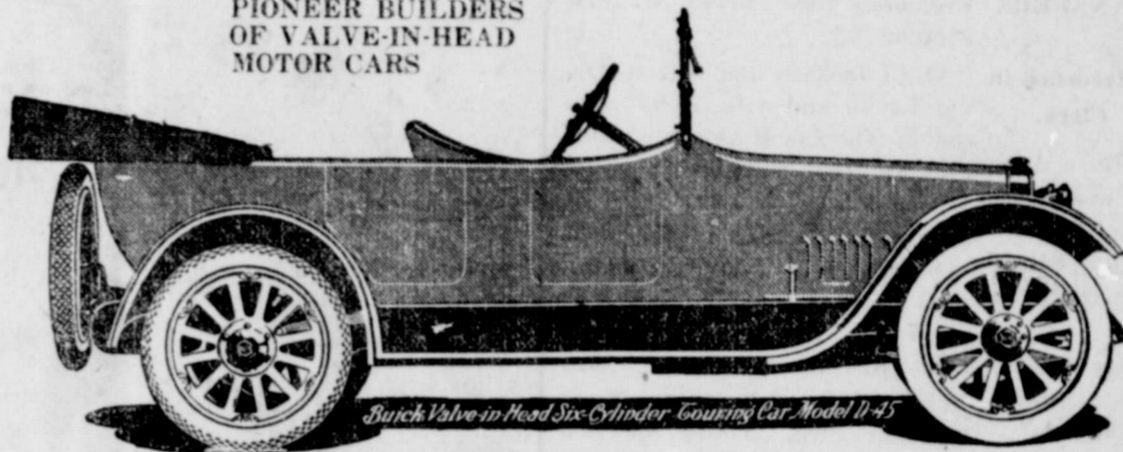

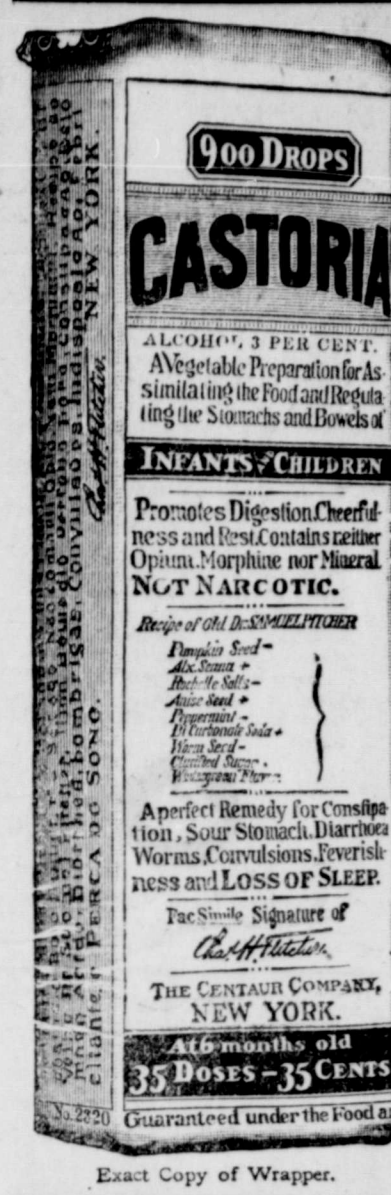

## STRAW.

Many wheat and oat growers are burning their straw stacks. We are told that they do this because the stacks furnish breeding places for flies, and all must admit that the flies are very numerous already and that the pests worry people and beasts no little. Nevertheless, we were taught that straw has a value and should not be burned. Back in the old states, where the soil used to be poor, no portion of the straw stack was destroyed. Some of it went into summer mattresses, the residue was scattered over the farm, most of it going on the poor spots. We recall here the words of the lamented Col. Henry Exall, a student of soils and one of the grandest men our country has produced. He said "a burning straw stack is a monument to the waste and prodigality of the people, a wanton destruction of many dollars in intrinsic value that should go back to the soil." A writer in the Dallas News says straw is easily worth from \$5 to \$6 per ton as a fertilizer. If scattered, straw does not become a breeding place for flies, it does prevent washing of the land by heavy rains and it does enrich the soil. These suggestions are offered for what they may be worth.—Honey Grove Signal.

Students Explain Amendments. To the Vets of Brady and McCulloch County:

Attention is called to the fact that tomorrow, Saturday, July 24th, the voters of Texas are called upon to say whether or not certain parts of the State Constitution will or will not be changed. Among these proposed changes there is one that will greatly affect the state educational institutions. The Sackett Resolution, probably better known as "Resolution No. 34", provides for the complete separation of the State University, the A. and M. college and the College of Industrial Arts. It also gives the legislature the authority to make appropriations for new buildings for these institutions.

Since the State University and the A. & M. College have grown to be two large institutions, it is necessary that each of them be allowed to operate separate and apart from each other. If the Sackett resolution should carry it will not mean more taxation and more expense to the State, but it will mean that the university will be a university to itself, and the A. & M. college will be a college to itself, and the ill feeling existing between these two institutions will be eliminated.

It has been rumored that, should this resolution carry, the Department of Engineering will be taken away from the State University. This rumor is a mistake. It is not the purpose of the directors of the A. & M. college to take anything away from the university. It is merely a case of live or die with the A. & M. college. If "Resolution No. 34" is defeated the two schools will very likely be placed under one board of directors which will surely mean death to the A. & M. college.

When you cast your vote be sure that you vote for the "Sackett Resolution", or "Resolution

No. 34." Some of the amendments may involve political schemes, but in this one there is none.

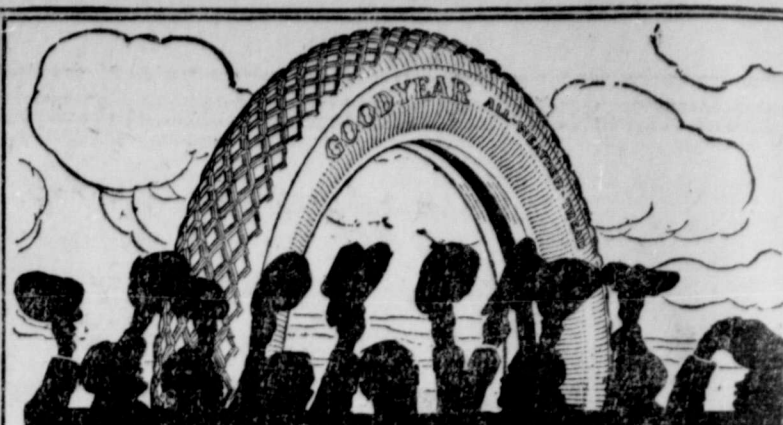
