Well, the wraps were put on another Little League baseball season here Saturday night, And a highly successful one it was, we feel.

It was the best of the three we've had here which have been played under the lights and those three far surpassed any program which was conducted in the pre-lighted baseball days in Bo-

Never before have we known a league to have such a large percentage of teams battling for first place as the Little League did here this year. Going into the last three days of play there were still five of the six teams with a shot, and a reasonably good one, at the title.

Not many leagues, including the professionals, can make that statement truthfully. Needless to say, this adds greatly to the interest of spectators and no doubt brings out some extra effort on the part of the players.

It's just a little easier to make that big play or get that crucial hit if you're playing for the top slot instead of just running out the schedule.

Perhaps the equalness of the teams was coincidental. And perhaps it was good planning on the part of the league officials and managers of the ballclubs. No matter which, it made for an almost ideal situation.

Another fine feature of the league for boys 10, 11 and 12 years old this year was the fact that any team, no matter where it was standing in the won-lost department, was capable of knocking off the league leader.

That was proven time and time again. That, too, aids greatly in creating interest on the part of players and spectators alike.

In spite of the tremendous success of the program here this summer, we aren't going to be completely satisfied until there is a full-fledged, surnuf league for Babe Ruth-age boys. That's 13, 14, and 15 year olds.

This year this division was operated with only two teams, two from Bovina and one from Texico Farwell, Four teams are necessary for a decent league.

We think the time will soon come, maybe next year, when a league will be possible for this age group. At least we hope we're right.

Something that most Bovina fans don't realize is that Babe Ruth baseball is quite a bit better brand than Little League. The rules, for one thing, are more nearly the same as regular baseball.

Another thing in favor of Babe Ruth ball is that the boys in that age are just naturally more mature and play a better brand of ball in general. That's true, of course, only if everything else is equal.

Still another advantage to it is that by the time boys reach that age, they have just about culled

themselves. In other words, boys who are really interested in the game and who have some natural ability are about the only ones who will participate in it. They aren't as apt to play Babe Ruth ball just because their mother or father wants them to just for entertainment during

the first two months of summer. Understand we're not criticizing Little League because that area. We think Little says. League is about the greatest thing that ever happened. Too, during Little League age is the time for a boy to decide how interested he is in the game

and how much ability he has. Without Little League, a boy would have little opportunity to find just how much talent he

does have. A disadvantage to Babe Ruth ball is that by the time boys reach that age, some nonsports-minded parents decide that a kid must work so much that he doesn't have time to attend all his games or practice sessions.

There's no doubt in our mind but that interest would increase greatly in Babe Ruth ball if we could have one good league here. However, it might be necessary to have the interest before

"Virtually all" of Parmer | 70 mph limits. County highways will come under the new 70-miles-per hour daytime speed limit for passenger cars which will become effective August 23, ac- of 60 mile per hour daytime cording to Rhea Bradley, resident engineer with the Texas Highway Department.

The new speed limits will cover practically all highways which are not already zones for lower speeds, and of course the speed zones which are in effect in city limits will remain the same.

Under the speed control law passed by the legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Texas Highway Commission will automatically gram. go to the new 70-mph speed on August 23.

Meanwhile, highway's fourlane section has extended southeast of Littlefield, and is almost completed to Shallowater. Bradley said that the contractor for constructing the threemile by-pass of Littlefield should be let in the not-toodistant future, and that construction would probably be done next year.

Also, he said a contract was due to be let in December on the re-paving of two lanes of the four-lane portion from Muleshoe east to the Lamb County line. An additional two lanes were constructed for this section several years ago, but the original two lanes were left, until funds for their repaying could be made available.

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

Europe's "Chicken War" **Hurts Texas Producers**

Western Europe's Common Market has given a "thumbs down' sign to U. S. poultry and the repercussions are being felt in the broiler producing areas of Texas.

The "chicken war" began inaugurated high tariffs against imported broilers as a protection to its own fledgling broiler industry in West Germany and other countries. When the market outlet in Europe dried up from the excessive tariff, the U. S. broiler industry lost some \$50 million worth of trade a year. The big production areas of East and South Texas were immediately caught in the backwash of the tariff decision.

The first effect was a near "glut" of the domestic poultry market since growers were not able to quickly cut back production. But the long range prospect is even more ominous -- not only in poultry but in many other fields of agricul-

Originally, the Common Market was conceived and regarded as a giant stride in European recovery after the ravages of war. Its ultimate goal was to lower tariffs and promote freer trade. In many cases, this has been one of the best achievements of the sixcountry organization. But is feared that the new "chicken war" may be only the first of other "protective" acts which will react against U. S. agri-

This nation normally exports some \$1.2 billion worth of farm commodities to the European member nations. A gradual increase in tariffs could choke off market outlets for other goods the same as has been done when the Common Market against chickens. Although poultry is the first Texas commodity to be affected, our cotton market could also lose in an all-out tariff war. Much of the Texas cotton production leaves the ports of Galveston and Houston each year for Europe. Rice and feed grain also depend on

> Common Market outlets. It is hoped that the poultry war is an isolated incident. But agricultural officials are keeping a close watch on the EEC to anticipate any regressive trade measures. The Common Market has been, and still is, one of Texas' major farm goods outlets. It can continue to be a great boon for Texas provided it does not become a "protective society" prohibiting imports from the United States.



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

Overhauling a tractor's governor may save farmers as much as \$48 a year, says Henry O'Neal, extension agricultural engineer, Texas A&M College. In a study of 50 farm tract-

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ors at Kansas State University. it was found that 40 of these tractors had faulty governors and did not maintain proper engine speeds. Of the 40, only 10 could be corrected by governor adjustment while the other 30 required a complete overhaul of the governor. The 10 tractors with governors that could be corrected showed an overall maximum horsepower increase of 9.1 per cent and a fuel consumption decrease of 4.8 per cent after the adjust-

Thus, O'Neal says, farmers who spend \$1,000 annually for tractor fuel can reduce their fuel expense \$48 a year on this one service item alone if their power unit is operated with a faulty governor.

Proper engine speeds are essential if maximum tractor efficiency is to be obtained. Speeds higher than those recommended by the manufacturer can lead to overheating and tractor breakdown. Speeds less than recommended cause loss of horsepower and poor perform-

A check of the engine's speed while it is not under a load is not enough, O'Neal states. Engines must be checked when under a full load as well as without a load to determine the governor response. He recommends having a qualified mechanic check the tractor under load with a dynamometer.

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

A spokesman for the Water District says, "The best way that we know to conserve ground water is to use lake water as a substitute. In fact, if a fellow has a lake filled with water on his farm and does not put it to work, he is missing a real bet. That's the cheapest water that he can use, and probably the best. You know, it is considerably warmer than ground water and when used should result in less shock to the growing plants." Tom McFarland, Manager of

the High Plains Water District. stated that he had even heard one farmer say that the lake water furnished an amount of "frog-a-lizer" to his crop that is beneficial. The "frog-alizer" that he referred to was the tad-poles and other organisms that live in the lake

McFarland continued by saying that he was not sure about the value of the "frog-a-lizer" to a man's crop, but that by pumping lake water in lieu of ground water, everyone would benefit. 
