interest has to be filled, and the boys who are caught are paying the prices."

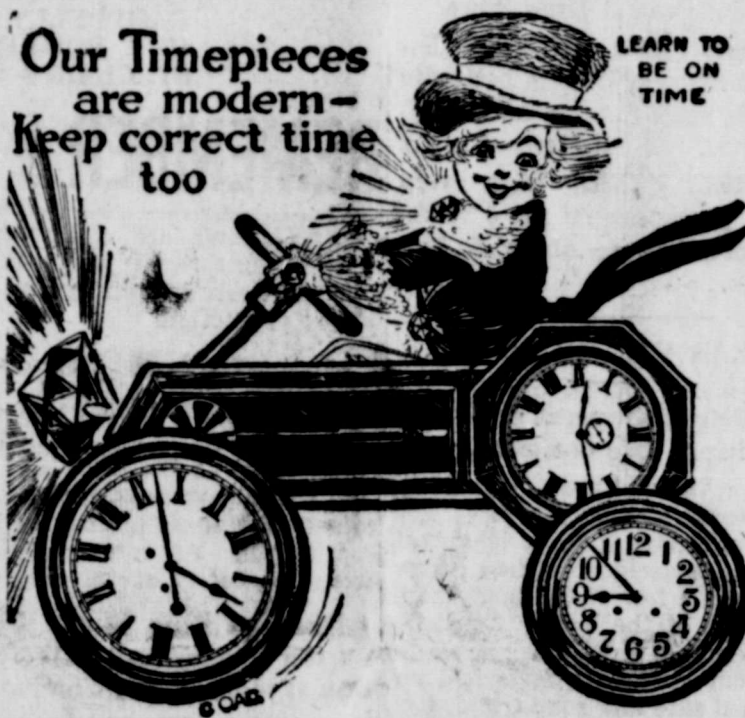

LOST CREEK ECHOES.

Dipping Stock As Cure for Tick Fever.

Voca, Texas, Sept. 20.
Editor Brady Standard:

There has been more ticks on stock this year in this part of the county than ever before, and a number of cattle have died from tick fever. I know of several men with small herds who have lost from \$60 to \$100 worth of cattle from tick fever. This writer lost cattle to the amount of \$80 from this disease. I dipped the rest in the midst of the fever, and not another one was lost.

I can see no reason why people should let their stock die from tick fever when they are so valuable and the dipping so cheap. I did not believe the result would be so satisfactory until I tried, but am convinced that it rids the cattle of the fever tick, and you have no more fever among the stock until the ticks get back, which will take about one month. I am convinced that if every community would dip their stock, say about the 1st of July and the 1st of August, and the 1st of September it would soon make a clean swipe of the ticks.

Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald of the Fort Worth Record says that the live stock industry is at a loss annually of \$80,000,000 on account of the tick, and he says why, in addition to this, refuse to band together for the extermination of the tick. All the answer that I can give is not the little expense attached to the dipping, but the trouble of handling the stock. They prefer letting the cattle and the ticks have it out. But I believe the time will soon come when there will have to be something done, and the sooner the better.

The recent rains were the heaviest that we have had before for some time. About eight inches of rain fell in 36 hours. All the creeks and the river was on a big boom.

The pecan crop is the best we have had here for several years; good threshers will soon be in demand.

Mat Champion Dead.

Friends of Frank Champion of this city will sympathize with him in the loss of his brother, Mat Champion, who died at Temple Monday night. The Brownwood Bulletin contains the following notice of the death:

"Mat Champion died at midnight Monday in a Temple hospital, where he was taken last week for treatment. The remains passed through Brownwood Tuesday night, accompanied by Rupert Champion, a son, enroute to Bangs, where interment was made Wednesday. The funeral will be in charge of the Masonic lodge of Bangs, assisted by several prominent Masons from this city.

"Mr. Champion had been ill for six weeks, and last week was taken to Temple for surgical treatment. His condition was well nigh hopeless, however, before he was taken to Temple, and his death was not unexpected. Mr. Champion was 44 years old, and had been in Brownwood for forty years. He formerly lived in this city, but for the past few years has made his home in the Bangs community, where he was a successful stock farmer. Some of the finest animals which have been placed on exhibition in this county have come from his farm, and one of his sons, Raymond, is prominently identified with the Brown County Baby Beef club. Mr. Champion was a member of the Masons, the Odd Fellows and the Woodmen of the World, and for many years had been a member of the Baptist church. He was a good man and a splendid citizen.

"Surviving the deceased are his wife and five children. They are Rupert, Raymond and Harvey, sons; and Maud and Edith, daughters. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Fannie Champion, and by five brothers: Messrs. John Champion of this city, Frank Champion of Brady, Jim Champion of Roswell, N. M., Billie Champion, whose home is a few miles north of town, and Ed Champion, who lives a few miles south of this city."

Make Good Grades.

W. M. Swift, postoffice examiner, was in Brady last Tuesday, part of his work here including a test of the efficiency of the local force. While this was the first visit of the kind with the postoffice boys, they made a splendid record and received compliments from Mr. Swift on their work.

In the test for speed and accuracy in handling mail matter, Otto M. Armstrong graded 98.63 per cent and E. E. Spiller 98.44. The test included handling 1092 pieces of mail matter, Mr. Armstrong handling 1077 pieces correctly, 11 incorrectly and 4 unknown. Mr. Spiller of the same number handled 1075 correctly, 14 incorrectly and 3 unknown. In time, Mr. Armstrong handled the 1092 pieces in 40 minutes, or at the rate of 27 per minute; Mr. Spiller in 43 minutes, or at the rate of 25 per minute.

The test came as a surprise to the boys and consequently they worked under stress, hardly equalling their usual speed and efficiency, but at that they made a record of which they are justly proud.

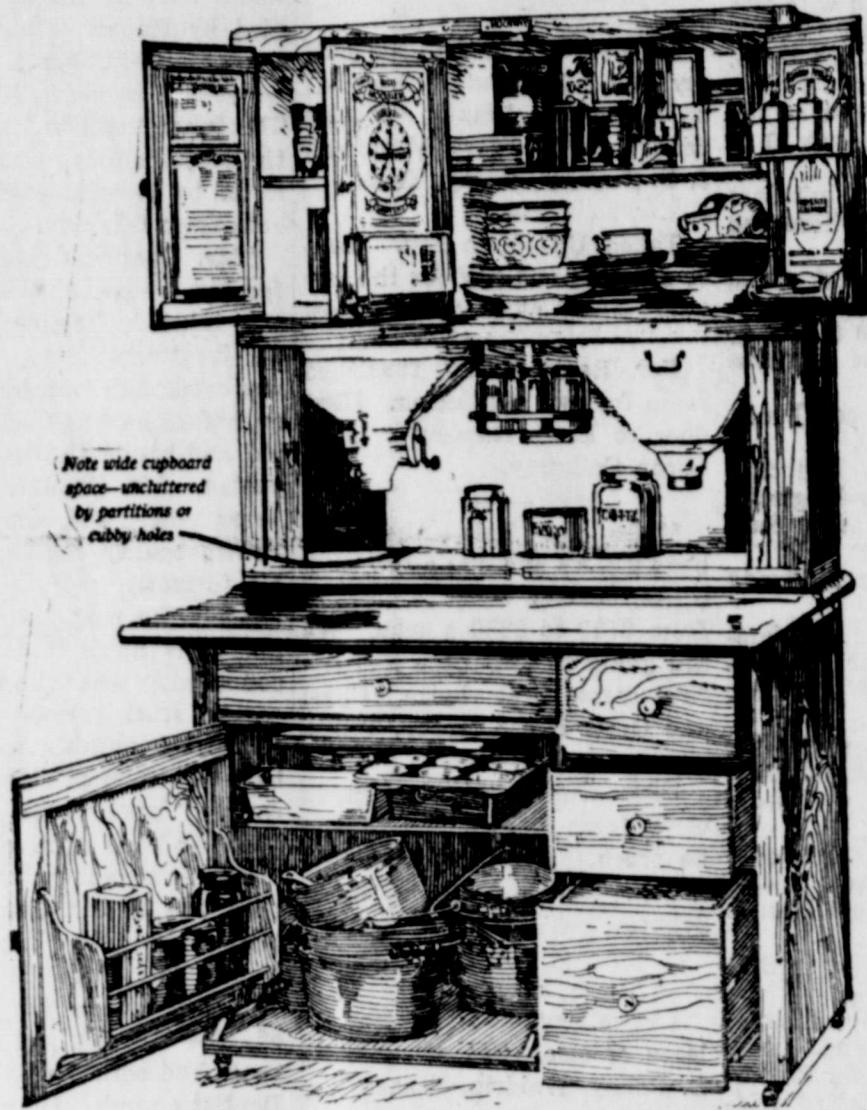

With oats weighing 32 pounds to the bushel these figures represent something like 122,000 bushels for shipments to date.
