TEACHERS INSTITUTE

FOUR-COUNTIES INSTITUTE OPENED YESTERDAY.

Attendance Is Good, and a Most Profitable Meeting Being Enjoyed.

The joint teachers institute convened in this city yesterday morning at 10 o'clock, the opening session being held in the district court room, at which something like two hundred teachers from the counties of McCulloch, Menard, Mason and Concho were in attendance. Quite a number of the citizens of Brady were also present for the opening session.

After invocation by Rev. I. T. Morris, pastor of the Methodist church, an address of welcome on behalf of the city was delivered by Judge Joe A. Adkins in his own inimitable style, and by Mrs. R. A. King, on behalf of the Parent-Teachers club, of which she is president.

Supt. L. T. Litsey of Mason responded for the visiting teachers, after which the remainder of the forenoon session was given over to registration of the teachers.

Yesterday afternoon the sectional meetings were held in the central school building, with Supt. J. T. Russell of Menard in charge of the high school department, Prof. Boyd Commander of Melvin, the intermediate and Mrs. W. F. Roberts, Jr., the primary. In each of these departments the programs were carried out in detail.

Last night the visitors were tendered an informal reception at the K. of P. hall by the Parent-Teachers association, at which time practically all the teachers were present in addition to a large number of citizens of Brady. Music for the evening was furnished by the Mexican orchestra, and dancing was enjoyed by the younger set throughout the evening. Fruit punch was served.

The general sessions of the institute are being held at the Methodist tabernacle each forenoon, and these meetings are proving most popular, not alone with the teachers, but with the citizens of Brady, as well.

COUNTY COURT.

October Term Convened Yesterday Afternoon.

The October term of county court convened yesterday afternoon at 1:30 for a three week's session, with County Judge J. E. Brown presiding.

This week the time of the court will be given over to the trial of criminal cases, while the civil jury docket will be taken up next week. The third week of the term will be devoted to probate and non-jury civil cases.

The first case called for trial yesterday afternoon was that of Henry Brown, a negro who had been convicted in the corporation court on a charge of disturbance of the peace and a fine of \$10 and costs assessed against him. Not satisfied, he appealed his case to the county court, and on trial of the appeal yesterday afternoon, the jury found him guilty and assessed his punishment at a fine of \$40 and costs.

The next case called for trial was that of J. T. Pearce, charged with violation of the local option laws. The case was still on trial when adjournment was taken last night, and will likely occupy the time of the court the greater part of this forenoon.

Contract Let Yesterday.

The board of trustees of Fairview School District No. 3 met here yesterday for the purpose of awarding the contract for the erection of a new school building for the district, bonds for which were voted last month.

The bid of E. B. Ramsay of this city was accepted, and the contract was drawn up and signed late yesterday afternoon. The contract calls for the beginning of the erection of the building today, and for its completion within a period of six weeks, barring unfavorable weather. Mr. Ramsay's bid was \$1827.20.

The new building will contain three rooms, two of which will be 24x28 feet and one 24x24 feet and will be completed by December 1st, at which time the 1915-16 term of school is announced to open.
