**HOME DESTROYED.**  
**Sam Wilensky Suffered Heavy Loss Yesterday.**  
Fire yesterday morning destroyed the 5-room dwelling southwest of the Central school building occupied by Sam Wilensky, and with it all the contents, but one or two articles of household furniture having been saved.  
The fire originated when Mrs. Wilensky, following the filling of a gasoline stove, stepped on a match, the blaze communicating to overflow gasoline, and in a second's time the whole kitchen was a blaze. The fire alarm was sounded at once, and the fire boys made record time to the fire, laying 1200 feet of hose, starting at the southwest corner of the square and up the school house hill. When the hose had been run out, it was found that more hose was required, and a hurry up trip was made to the station.  
With the aid of 300 feet more hose it was possible to turn the water on within 50 feet of the building. In the meantime, however, the fire had gotten such headway that the whole building was a mass of

flames and tumbling walls, and the efforts of the firemen were directed toward putting out fire brands upon adjoining dwellings.  
Mr. Wilensky estimates his loss at between \$1200 and \$1500, with no insurance. Included in the destruction was a diamond lavalliere valued at \$175, which, however, was later recovered from the ashes.  
The residence was the property of E. L. Jones, who estimates his loss at \$700, fully covered by insurance.

### THE FIRE BOYS.

The Brady Standard holds no brief for the fire boys. Neither do the fire boys need defense. Yet we believe it timely to discountenance unthoughted remarks upon the part of some citizens to the effect that the fire boys could have rendered greater service at the fire yesterday.

There are three plugs from which a line of hose could have been laid to the fire. The actual distance from the fire plug at the southwest corner of the square to the scene of the fire is 1676 feet; from the M. E. church is 1328 feet; from J. F. Davis, 1278 feet.

While the fire plug at the Davis corner was nearest, yet the route was over impassable streets. With the exact location of the fire unknown, the logical connection was the plug at the southwest corner of the square, it being on the air-line route which the fire truck took.

There can be no reasonable criticism of the fire boys. Had a fire plug been within reasonable distance of the fire, the boys would have been on the scene in ample time to save the burning building, with comparatively small loss.

In the calm of sober reflection, we must realize that the fire boys are offering their services gratuitously, and without the hope of reward. When the fire alarm sounds, they leave their duties, unmindful of the damage that may result to their clothes, or the risks to life and limb which they may run, and rush to the assistance of the citizens whose property is endangered.

If the citizens of Brady will now and then give the fire boys a flower in shape of words of encouragement and praise, and in the meantime boost for more and better distribution of fire plugs, they will be expending their efforts to better purpose.

### Cotton Prices.

Cotton prices have had a decidedly downward trend this week, and the only encouraging indication is the fact that the market gained about 30 points this morning. Monday cotton still brought 12c, and the ginners' report had a rather "bullish" tendency, but the overloading of the market, coupled with the fact that cotton factors had already filled all October contracts, soon sent prices tumbling. Yesterday the market quotation was 11c, middling basis, although cotton sold in Brady for 11.25. Cotton seed also felt the effect of the decline, and where it had brought \$38.50 per ton, the price quoted yesterday was \$38.00. Local cotton seed dealers said that it was surprising where all the cotton seed was coming from, and that the high prices had resulted in cotton seed being marketed faster than they could handle them.

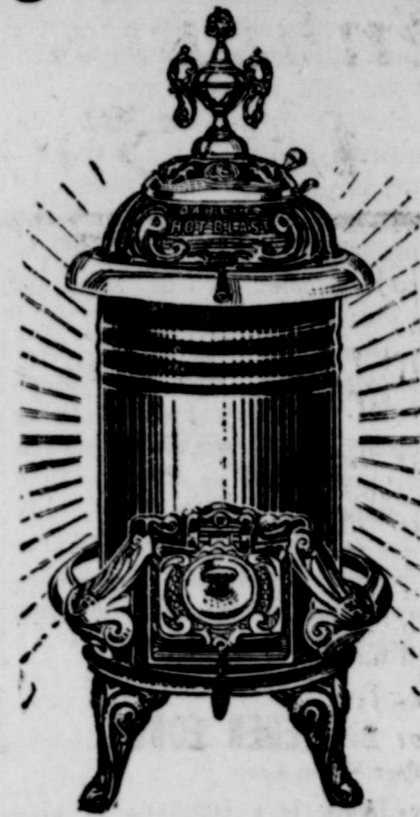

T. C. Ward is another farmer who is sowing small grain. He is planting 43 acres in wheat, and expects a good yield.

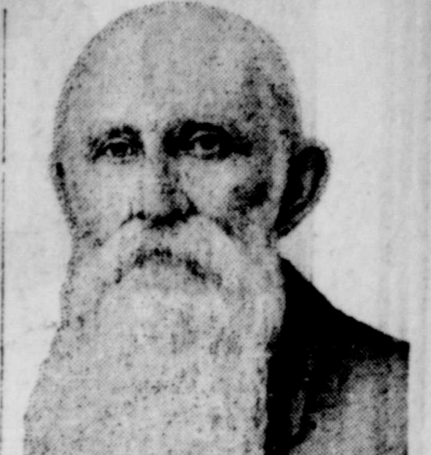

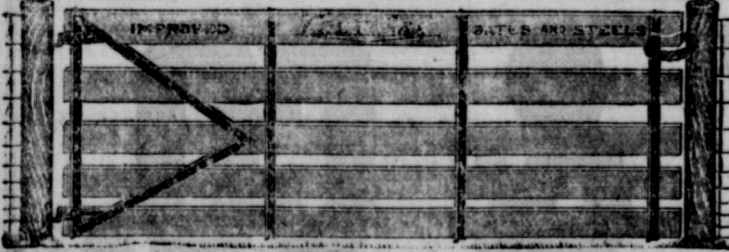
