KILLS WIFE AND HIMSELF.

Double Tragedy Enacted at La Pryor, Near Uvalde.

Uvalde, Texas, Nov. 6.—A double tragedy occurred at La Pryor this morning at 9:00 o'clock, when C. L. Baker shot his wife and then himself. The weapon used was a double-barreled shot gun. Mrs. Baker was living with her father, T. A. Hibdon, and had been separated from her husband for several months, coming to La Pryor from Medina City. Baker arrived from that place yesterday. He was apparently reconciled with his wife, as he stayed at the Hibdon home last night.

The above dispatch to the Dallas News conveyed a shock to residents of Brady and McCulloch county. Mr. Baker and his wife having lived in Brady and McCulloch county within the past two or three years. Mrs. Baker's brother, A. E. Hibdon, at present resides near Rochelle. Baker was employed for some time with Will Dutton and later worked for Oscar Engdahl. No further particulars of the tragedy have been learned.

A SEVEN DOLLAR BILL.

Unusual Bit of U. S. Currency of 1778.

Mrs. H. Irwin is the possessor of a most remarkable relic in the shape of a \$7.00 bill issued by the United States government in 1778—two years after the Declaration of Independence. The bill is slightly wider than the present day currency, and scarcely more than half as long, consequently it presents a rather unusual appearance at first sight. The bill states that it is redeemable in Spanish milled dollars, and in the lettering the old-style long S is used. On the reverse side of the bill is depicted a mulberry leaf eaten out by a silk worm so that only the ribs of the leaf remain. Also a silkworm cocoon is shown. This strange embellishment is explained by Mrs. Irwin in that at the time of the issuance of the bill the silk worm had just been introduced into the United States, and it was thought that the silk industry would become one of the great assets of the country. Another feature of the bill is that it was hand-printed, printing machinery in those days being not in as general use as in these days—137 years later.

The rare bill is an heirloom in the Irwin family, having been in their possession over 100 years. Mrs. Irwin's mother, Mrs. S. J. Flannery of Hendrix, Oklahoma, is a first cousin of Wm. Goebel, the governor of Kentucky, who was assassinated several years ago, and it was through the Goebel family that the bit of currency came into the hands of Mrs. Flannery.

Mrs. Irwin also has a confederate bill, and recalls the time when her mother took a great stack of the currency of the "Lost Cause" out into the yard and burned it in so much trash. Mrs. Irwin, then going to college, rescued several bills from the flames and distributed them among her friends at college, the one now in her possession being the last of what once represented considerable wealth.

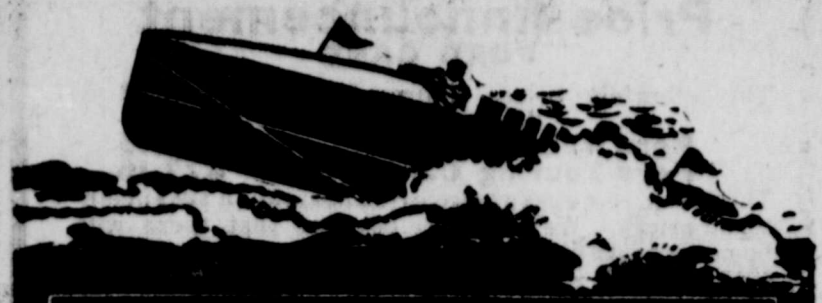

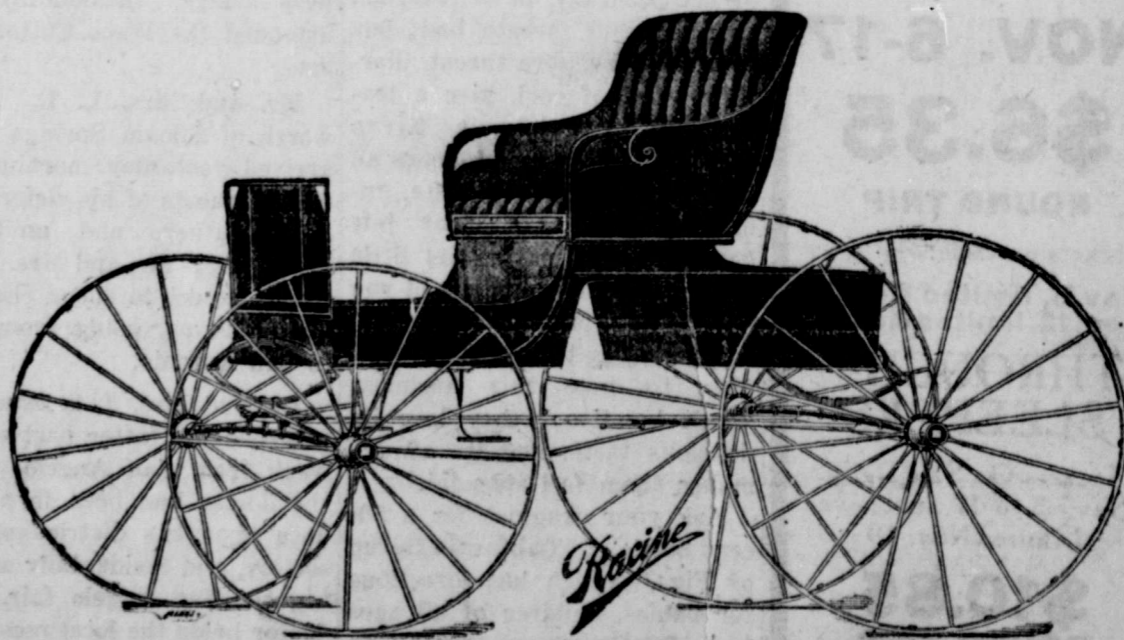
