HIGHEST HONORS WON

HIGH SCHOOL AFFILIATED WITH UNIVERSITIES.

Brady School One of Twenty in Texas—Equal Rank With Houston, Dallas and Cities

Brady high school has achieved highest honors for a high school in Texas, having been given affiliation with all Southern universities. This places the Brady school in the class of the high schools of Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and other cities, and gives it the added distinction of being one in twenty high schools in the state to gain this recognition. Another noteworthy feature is the fact that Brady holds this honor alone of the high schools in this immediate section of Texas, San Angelo being the nearest school to share the distinction.

As before stated, this is the highest honor which Brady could possibly achieve, as northern universities do not give affiliation with any high school, but require entrance examinations.

There are three classifications of high schools. The state board of education requires certain conditions to be met before a high school is designated of first class. The state universities prescribe certain requirements before a high school may be designated of second class and secure affiliation. The Southern universities also prescribe certain requirements which must be met before a high school is recognized as of the third class.

The first class is of no vital importance; in fact, these conditions must be met before a school may be considered a high school.

As is well known Brady high school, under the efficient superintendency of Prof. W. L. Hughes, was successful in meeting the requirements of the second class and in securing affiliation with the state universi-

ties, and now boasts of a credit of 14½ units. By the end of the year Mr. Hughes expects to increase this credit to 20 units, which would be every credit the state universities could give.

That these efforts at advancing the Brady high school to the highest degree were known and acknowledged is evidenced by the fact that when applications were made for affiliation with the Southern universities, it was immediately granted.

Too much cannot be said in praise of the efficient service given the Brady high school by Mr. Hughes, and in this connection it would not be amiss to state that his efforts receive a hearty second and full co-operation upon the part of the board of trustees, who work in full accord with him at all times. To this harmonious action may be attributed the fact that Brady has gained honors which any high school may envy.

COMMITTEES MEET.

Brady and Mason Good Roads Enthusiasts Discuss Work.

A committee of good roads enthusiasts composed of T. P. Grant, Lewis Brook, Sam McCollum, Dr. J. G. McCall, G. B. Awalt, Chas. Samuelson, W. D. Crothers, F. M. Richards, D. W. Rowlett and H. F. Schwenker drove over to Mason yesterday, where they met with a committee of Mason good roads enthusiasts to discuss the problems of placing the Brady-Mason road in first-class condition.

The Brady delegation is exceedingly complimentary in their mention of the courtesies extended them by the Mason folks. A committee composed of E. J. Lemburg, president, and Max Loeffler, secretary, of the Mason Business league, Carl Runge and others warmly welcomed the delegation and escorted them to the Mason hotel where an excellent dinner put everyone in good spirits.

The joint meeting was held in the Mason court house, Pres. E. J. Lemburg calling the meeting to order.

T. P. Grant, representing Brady, stated that Brady's object in coming to Mason was to assure Mason that Brady was willing and anxious to build a good road to the county line. That Brady's experience in road building had taught her many things and that it was deemed advisable to discuss these matters with Mason in order that the two counties might jointly co-operate toward maintaining a permanent first-class highway between the two cities. Mr. Grant stressed the point of maintenance, stating that experience had taught that money spent in building roads was thrown away unless the roads were properly kept up. He also stated that one of the most fruitful causes of making bad roads out of good ones was the transporting of heavily loaded wagons with narrow tires over the roads following a rain. He advocated the use of wide-tired wagons and requested the Ma-

son citizens to co-operate with Brady towards encouraging the widening of tires on wagons.

The matter of wide tires, proper drainage, opening of gutters, correct building of culverts and the like was then taken up for general discussion, various views and opinions being advanced by Messrs. E. J. Lemburg, John Banks, John Fulton, Road Superintendent Doell and Judge S. V. McCollum representing Mason, and Messrs. W. D. Crothers, T. P. Grant, Sam McCollum, Chas. Samuelson and others representing Brady.

The meeting was most harmonious throughout, and while opinions diverged in some instances, the discussion was of a friendly nature. The Mason folks stated that what they asked of Brady was that she build a road to the Mason county line as Mason has built to the McCulloch county line. They offered to co-operate with Brady in the matter of encouraging wide tires on wagons, and in the dragging of the roads following rains and such other efforts as were required to maintain the road in first-class shape. The Brady delegation, upon their part, promised to put forth every effort to build the Brady end of the road and that work would begin at the earliest possible moment. They assured Mason that they would leave no stone unturned towards the establishing and continuance of the most cordial and friendly relations between the merchants of both towns.

A mass meeting of the citizens of Brady will be called within the next day or two, at which time the problem of building a first-class road to the Mason county line will be presented and the co-operation of the citizens enlisted towards the solution of the perplexing question.

A Warning on Boll Rot.

Mr. V. O. Porter of Carlton, Texas, a successful farmer, warns against possible damage by the dreaded boll rot to the cotton growers of the South. He says for all farmers who have any 2-year-old seed to be sure to save them for planting next spring, as there will be very little of this year's seed fit for planting. Much of the damage thought to be due to the boll weevil, says Mr. Porter, is the result of dry rot.

This disease started some years ago on the Atlantic coast and this year it has spread over the entire cotton belt.

Mr. Porter further recommends that farmers plant more corn, oats and things to use at home.—Exchange.

THE STATE OF TEXAS.

To the Sheriff or Any Constable of McCulloch County, Greeting:

Whereas, on the 20th day of September, 1915, W. W. Sammons recovered in the district court of McCulloch County, a judgment against W. A. Gentry and G. W. Nichols for the sum of one hundred ninety-eight and 20/100 (\$198.20) dollars, with interest thereon from the 20th day of September, 1915, at the rate of ten per cent per annum and costs of suit; and, whereas, the said judgment is a foreclosure of a vendor's lien on the following described property, to-wit: Lots Nos. Eleven (11) and Twelve (12) in Block No. Nine (9), Spiller Addition to the town of Brady, McCulloch County, Texas, as said vendor's lien existed on the 3rd day of November, 1913, and it is ordered and decreed by said judgment that said property be sold as under execution in satisfaction of said judgment. And if said property shall sell for more than sufficient to pay off and satisfy said sums of money, the excess should be paid over to the said defendant, W. A. Gentry. But if said property should not sell for enough to pay off said sums of money, the balance due shall be made as under execution, and such order of sale shall have the force and effect of a writ of possession, and the officer executing same shall make a good and sufficient deed and place the purchaser of said property in possession thereof within thirty days from date of sale.

Therefore, you are hereby commanded that you proceed to seize and sell the above described property, as under execution, and make good and sufficient deed, and to place the purchaser of the same in possession thereof within thirty days after the day of sale, and you apply the proceeds thereof to the payment and satisfaction of said sum of one hundred ninety-eight and 20/100 dollars, together with the interest that may be due thereon, and the further sum of nineteen and 50/100 (\$19.50) dollars, costs of suit, together with your legal fees and commissions for executing this writ. And if the said property shall sell for more than sufficient to pay off and satisfy said sums of money, then you are hereby directed to pay over the excess thereof to the defendant, W. A. Gentry. But if you fail to find said property, or if the proceeds of such sale be insufficient to satisfy said judgment, then you are directed to make the money or any balance thereof remaining unpaid, out of any other property of defendant, as in the case of ordinary executions.

Herein fail not, but due return make hereof within ninety (90) days, showing how you have executed the same.
