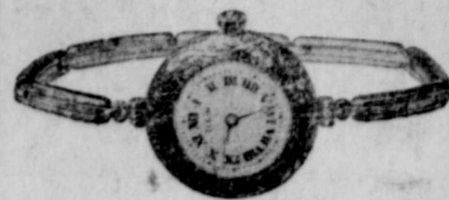

TEXAS GINNINGS 2,614,521.

Probably Three-Fourths of Entire Crop Gathered.

Washington, Nov. 22.—The fifth cotton ginning report of the season, compiled from reports of Census Bureau correspondents and agents throughout the cotton belt and issued at 10 a. m. today, announced that 8,777,794 bales of cotton, counting round as half bales, or the growth of 1915 have been ginned prior to November 14. That compares with 11,668,240 bales, or 73.4 per cent of the entire crop, ginned prior to November 14 last year, 10,444,529 bales, or 74.4 per cent in 1913 and 10,299,646 bales, or 76.4 per cent in 1912. The average quantity of cotton ginned prior to November 14 in the last ten years was 9,257,817 bales, or 73.0 per cent of the crop.

Included in the ginnings were 86,582 round bales, compared with 31,904 last year, 74,167 in 1913 and 62,768 in 1912.

Ginnings prior to November 14 in Texas, with comparisons for the past three years and the percentage of the entire crop ginned prior to that date in the same years, follow:

Texas—1915, 2,614,521 bales; 1914, 3,511,762 bales, 80 per cent; 1913, 3,333,443 bales, 87.8 per cent; 1912, 4,020,939 bales, 86.6 per cent.

COTTON GINNED.

Approaching 5,500 Bale Mark in Brady.

The local gins were all in operation Thanksgiving day, and the total number of bales ginned was swelled by the day's run to 5370 bales. Although the crop is nearly out, it is quite likely that the gins will be in operation for some time yet winding up the scattered remnants.

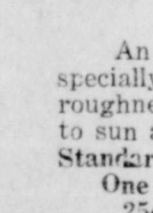

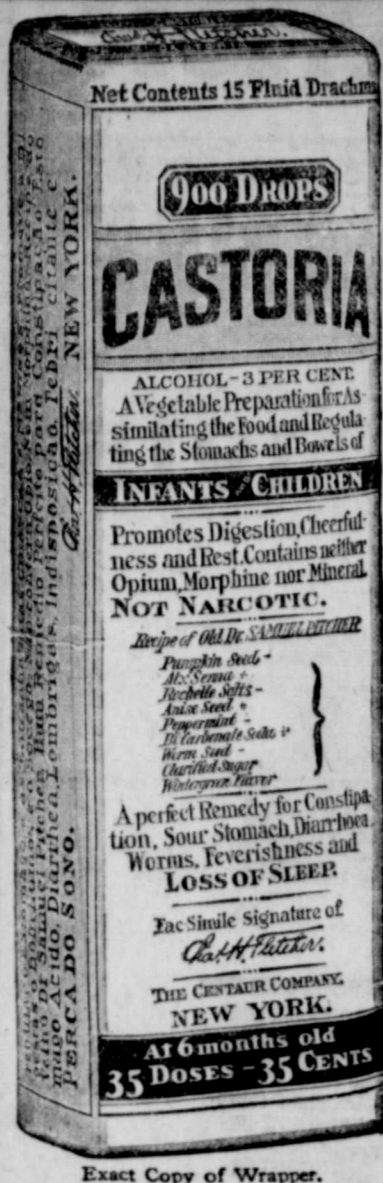

MASON MAVERICKS

From The News.

Friday morning at the hour of 9 Ed Boston passed away at the home of his parents in Mason, having been in failing health for about one year. The young man was born in Mason county July 28, 1879, being 36 years, 3 months and 14 days of age, just in the prime of glorious young manhood, when a malady that baffled medical science, supposed from working in cement, fastened itself upon him and proved conqueror.

A. M. Finlay and family were here from Fife on account of the death of Mrs. Bailey.

Geo. Kidd reports having sold a good bunch of hogs to Chas. Kothmann, and because of their being better stock Mr. Kothmann paid a better price. Of 1300 head bought by Mr. Kothmann, Mr. Kidd's hogs were the best.

Dave Camp and wife and Holmes Doole were over from Brady to attend the funeral of their grandmother, Mrs. Bailey.

Monday at noon a committee from Brady came over to discuss the good roads proposition.

The committee was composed of Messrs. T. P. Grant, D. W. Rowlett, G. B. Awalt, W. D. Crothers, Chas. Samuelson, Sam McCollum, H. F. Schwenker, Lewis Brook, Dr. McCall, F. M. Richards. A number of Mason people met them at the court house and E. J. Lemburg called the meeting to order and asked to hear from the Brady committee. Mr. Grant responded and stated that his people wanted the Mason people to use their influence to have the freighters use wide tires on their wagons so as not to cut up and destroy the roads.

After much discussion of roads and the help wide tires would be in protecting them and enabling the team to pull heavier loads, it was decided advisable to agitate the wide tire as being advantageous in every way and that Mason would use every persuasive effort to have wide tires on wagons adopted. With this assurance the Brady committee hoped to interest their people in raising funds to rebuild a good road from Brady to the Mason county line.

Up to Nov. 1st, 1915, Mason county had ginned 2552 bales of cotton, against 3631 bales last year up to same date.

One night last week W. C. Cavaness, living 5 miles west of Mason, was bitten upon the lip by a skunk. He was taken at once to the Pasteur institute at Austin for treatment and is reported doing all right.

Friday morning at 9 o'clock Mrs. Chas. Bailey died at her

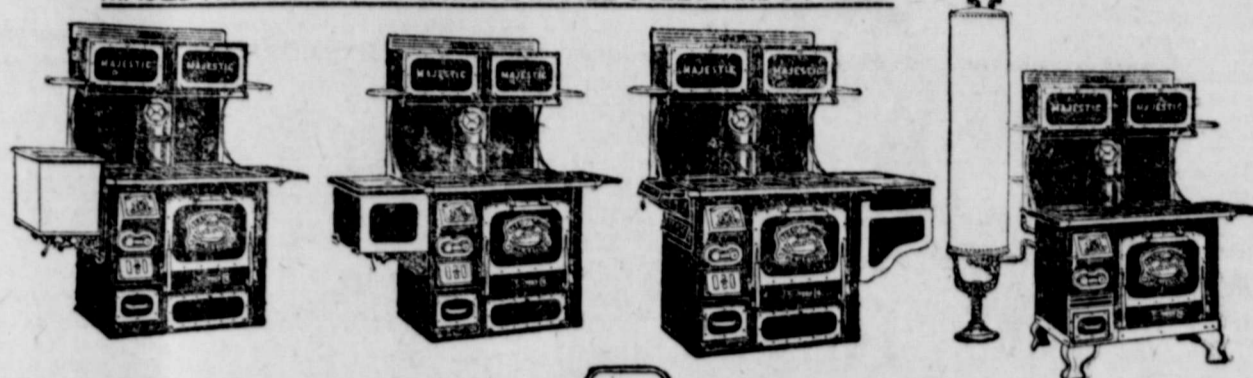

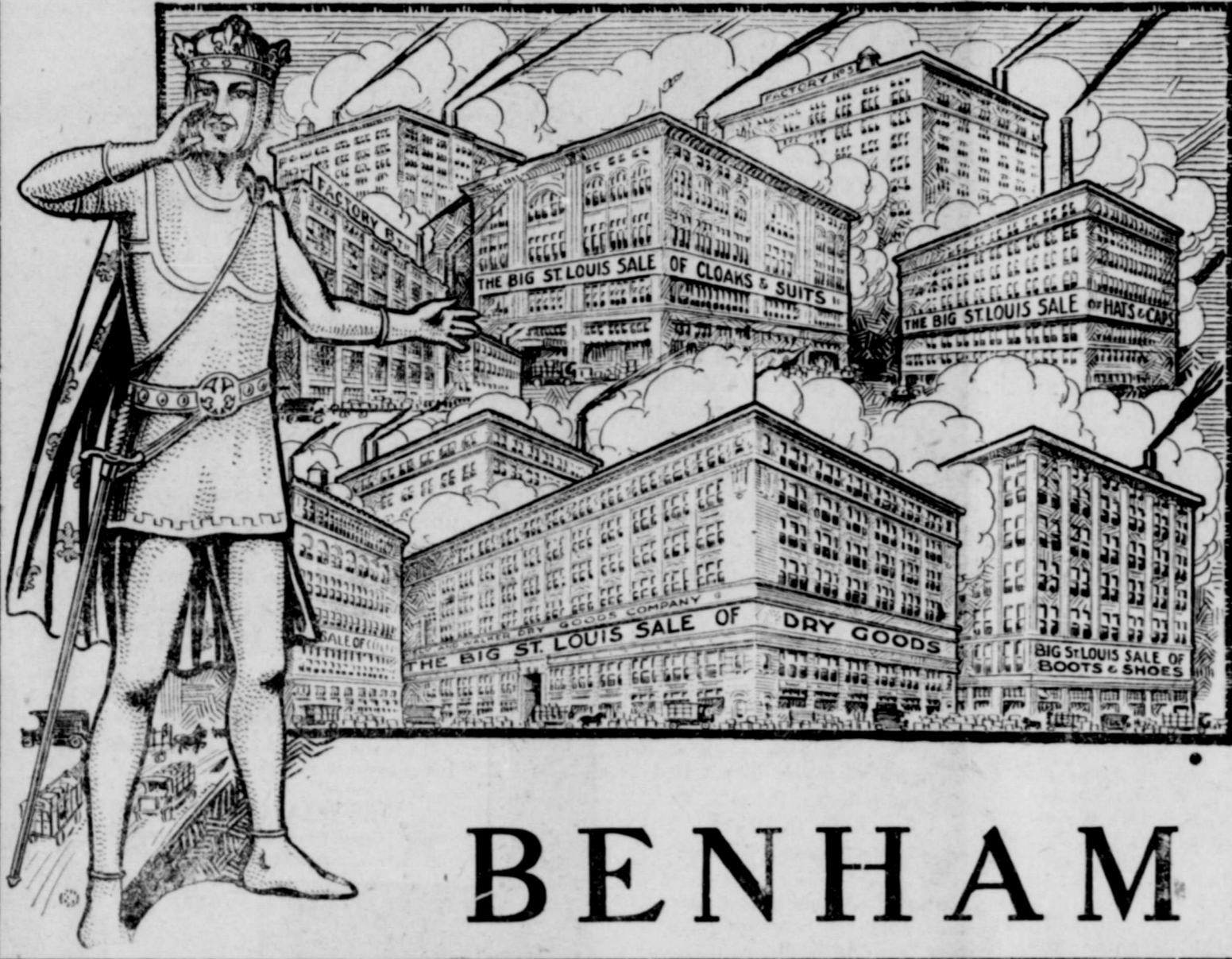

Y. M. B. L. HOLD RALLY

ROUSING MEETING AND SMOKER TUESDAY.

Good Roads Receive Hearty Endorsement—\$8,000 to Be Raised for Mason Road.

An enthusiastic meeting of the Y. M. B. L. was held on last Tuesday night in the building on the west side, and while the attendance was not as large as had been anticipated, yet the good roads questions and other subjects taken up for discussion received an impetus that is sure to result in good work being accomplished.

The meeting was called to order by President Sam McCollum, and the Constitution and By-Laws of the organization as gotten up by the committee and accepted by the board of directors was presented to the body for adoption. Judge F. M. Newman moved that the Constitution and By-Laws be adopted without reading, and upon second the motion was unanimously carried.

The report of the Mason good roads committee was then made through T. P. Grant, chairman of the committee, who urged the importance of building a first-class permanent highway to the Mason county line, and who stated that approximately \$8,000 would have to be raised by the citizens of Brady and McCulloch county toward assisting the county in the work of building the road. The proposition was then taken up for general discussion and various views were set forth, the consensus of opinion being that the work of raising funds and the starting of the work should be begun at once. Motion was made and adopted that the chair appoint a committee of three to solicit funds for this purpose. The chair took the matter of naming of the committee under advisement, and will make his choice known later.

Jack Savage in a few brief remarks urged attention to the maintenance of roads already built, as well as the improvement of other roads in the county. His remarks were well received, but no immediate action was taken upon the matter.

No other business coming before the meeting, President McCollum then called T. P. Grant to the chair as toastmaster for the evening. Of all the capacities in which Mr. Grant has served during his residence in Brady, to none could he be better suited than that of toastmaster, and the pleasing and suave manner in which he presided kept interest alive throughout.

Mr. Grant, upon taking the chair as toastmaster, called attention to the refreshments provided by the refreshment committee, and stated that while preparations for the serving of the refreshments were being completed, there were a number of speakers whose names had been given him who had matters of interest to present to the league, and that the league would now hear from these speakers.

Sam McCollum was first called upon and stated that a committee of the Y. M. B. L. had been waited upon by a committee of ladies, who desired to organize a club of Civic Workers, and requested the aid and cooperation of the Y. M. B. L. The club was specially desirous of enlisting the assistance of the league in matters of civic pride, such as the cleaning up of the streets, alleys, vacant lots and last, but first in the order of "clean-up", the stores. Mr. McCollum also called attention to the necessity of doing away with the stabling of teams and horses about the court house square, and called attention to San Antonio, Ballinger, Coleman and other places where the public square was a thing of beauty and a joy forever, and where every nook and corner not used for a special purpose was given over to the making of a little park or green spot.

He urged the Y. M. B. L. to get behind the move to do away with the hitch racks on the square, extend the court house lawn and convert the same into such a park that all Brady folks and Brady visitors should have the benefit and enjoyment of the same. Mr. McCollum's remarks awoke a ready response, and approval of the improving of the court house square was unanimously voiced.

In continuation of Mr. McCollum's remarks upon matters urged by the committee of Civic Workers, H. F. Schwenker called attention to the value of good walks to a town, and the urgent necessity of walks in Brady. The value of a community house, strict enforcement of city laws and enactment of traffic laws were other matters urged upon the attention of the league.

The matter of commission form of government and the city manager plan was brought up for discussion, together with a discussion of the new state law requiring all cities and towns to cease draining sewage into streams and creeks. This law becomes effective January 1, 1917, and forces upon all towns the providing of a sewerage system or some adequate means of disposing of sewage other than the draining of same into creeks or streams. The method now being tried out is that of disposing of the sewage by a process of compressed air. This matter was taken up for discussion by Dr. J. G. McCall and others.

Mine Host Harry Irwin interrupted the flow of oratory by announcing the refreshments ready for serving, whereupon the discussion of the question of good roads and other matters was continued informally and in groups to the accompaniment of munching of assorted sandwiches, and the sipping of coffee, followed by the passing of cigars.

The occasion was, by general verdict, a great success, and now that the ball has been started rolling in the Mason good roads move, and in plans

for other good moves, great things may be anticipated in the way of civic improvement.

(Taken from the notes of Dr. Foote, a surgeon of the Confederate Navy, who was at that time a prisoner with the condemned man.)

In May, 1864, a young Confederate wearing a Union uniform over his citizens clothes, crossed the Union lines into New York, intent upon paying a visit to a lady friend. He was captured by a squad of Union men, carried to the state prison, tried and condemned as a spy. His friends interceded in his behalf and planned an escape for him, but were unsuccessful. Then Booth went to Lincoln and laid the case before him. Lincoln granted a reprieve and Booth left on the next train, bearing the glad message. But in the meantime a wire had flashed from Washington ordering the execution of the prisoner at daybreak. So when Booth arrived he found the lifeless body of his friend dangling from the scaffold. Then Booth avowed vengeance upon Lincoln and daily awaited his opportunity, which did not come until April 14, 1864. The supposition is that Stanton, secretary of war, having learned of the reprieve, sent the wire. Lincoln was not guilty of breaking his word.

Between now and that date one of the rural school supervisors will visit the county and investigate the various schools to see whether the law as to physical conditions, lighting and sanitation of the schools has been met, and upon his report will depend each school's success in the participation.

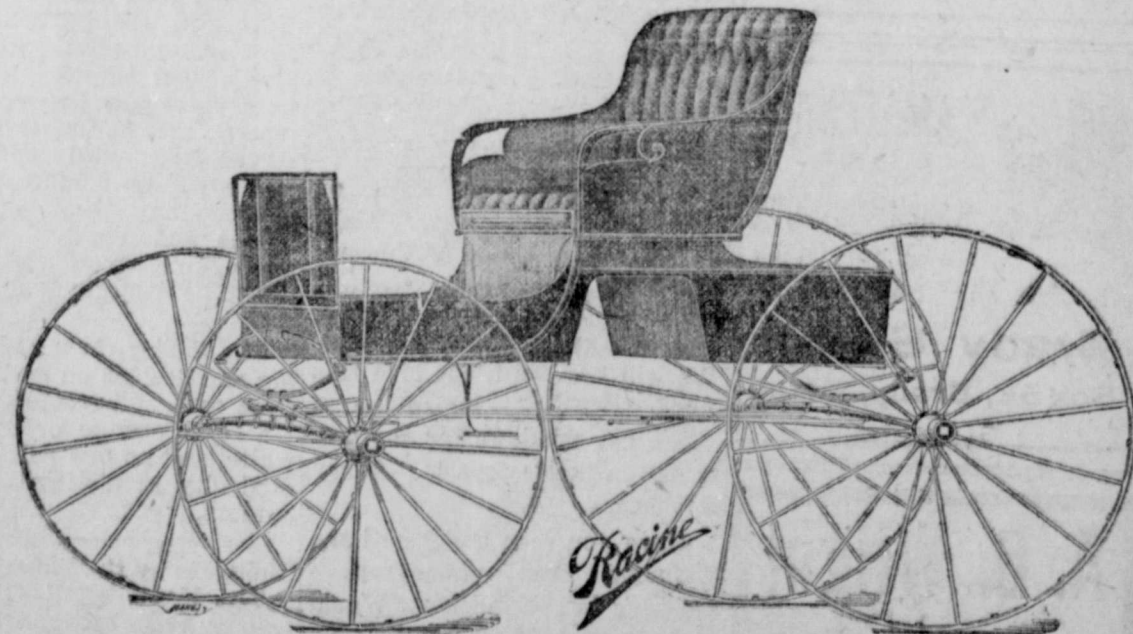
