RECOVERS MONEY.

Negro in Jail Charged With Theft of Purse.

Jim Stepney, colored, was arrested last Friday night by Sheriff Wall and placed in jail on the charge of theft of a purse containing \$56.16. When searched the negro had something over \$63.00 on his person.

The arrest followed the loss on Tuesday afternoon of a purse containing the first-named sum by a young man from Whiteland, named Wrench. Wrench came to Brady on a mission for his brother-in-law, W. DuBois, station agent at Whiteland, and among other duties cashed a number of checks belonging to the Wells Fargo Co., intending to carry the equivalent of the checks, \$56.16, back to DuBois in currency and silver. After cashing the checks Wrench went

to Polk's barber shop for a bath, and then visited several stores about town on business. He had gone not more than a block or two before he discovered the loss of the purse, but diligent search and inquiry failed to bring to light any trace of the same.

The negro, Stepney, who was employed as porter at the barber shop, stated he had seen nothing of the missing purse, and as he had been employed in Brady for a number of years and had always borne a good reputation suspicion did not rest directly upon him.

The negro's integrity first came into question when he developed illness, and talked of giving up his position. Mr. Polk examined the bath room and noticed a hole in the floor near the drain pipe. With shrewdness akin only to that of Sherlock Holmes, and with detective ability equaled only by the immortal William J. Burns, Mr. Polk crawled under the barber shop to the place where the drain pipe led under ground, and there found the missing purse with one cent and an adding machine slip showing the total of the checks cashed, as its only contents.

Sheriff Wall was at once notified, and placed the negro under arrest, lodging him in jail. After being lodged behind the bars Deputy Sheriff John Martin gave the black a grueling examination and the culprit finally admitted his guilt. His examining trial will be held today.

In the meantime Mr. DuBois is rejoicing over the recovery of the money, and Mr. Polk is likewise rejoiced for his fame as a detective is everywhere being heralded, and he is seriously thinking of writing some novels that will make Sherlock jealous.

JIM GIBBS MEETS DEATH

SLUGGED TO DEATH BY FOOTPADS IN DALLAS.

Sad News Received by Phone Message at 11:00 o'Clock Last Night—Is Robbed.

A phone message received at 11:00 o'clock last night by Mrs. Jim Gibbs announced that Jim Gibbs had been found dead just outside the door of the garage at which he was employed at 9:15 o'clock last night. Death resulted from a blow on the head with a piece of pipe, and was evidently instantaneous. That robbery was the motive of the crime was evidenced mutely by the fact that the dead man's pockets were turned inside out and their contents rifled.

Further advice to City Marshal J. M. Anderson from Chief of Detectives Tanner of Dallas stated that while the Dallas authorities had a party under suspicion the evidence against him was only circumstantial, and it is highly probable that the culprit will never be brought to justice.

The news was a great shock to the community, Mr. Gibbs having left Brady only about two months ago, going to Fort Worth, where he was employed at his trade as automobile mechanic. He had been in Dallas only a few days.

Mr. Gibbs was well known throughout this section, having lived here for a number of years. He was married about six years ago to Mrs. E. M. Shore, of this city, who, with a sister in Boulder, Colo., survives him.

The body will be shipped to Brady, arriving on the Frisco tomorrow morning, and the funeral services will be held here, interment being made in Brady cemetery.

A total precipitation of 1.1 inches was registered by the Commercial National bank gauge.

An abundance of stock water was also put out.

ROUT TYPHUS WITH PERFUME

Infected Soldiers Are Bathed in and Clothing Sprinkled With Lous-Smelling Cologne.

Cheap, highly scented perfumery has been found to be the greatest enemy of the typhus insect. Instead of being washed with soap and water and having their clothes sterilized, soldiers infected with the typhus insect are now bathed in cheap cologne and their clothing is sprinkled with the same highly odoriferous perfume. It has been found very efficacious, especially when the soldier is first attacked with the vermin.

In regard to the recent circular of the German imperial board of health, advocating the use of a preparation containing sabadilla vinegar in exterminating the typhus vermin, Andrew Balfour of the Wellcome Bureau of Scientific Research, London, calls attention to some statistics from Venezuela on the exports from that country of sabadilla.

In 1913, 258 tons of sabadilla seed were shipped from La Guaira to Germany, the shipments in former years averaging something over 100 tons annually. A little of the seed had been shipped to the United States, but none to England. Mr. Balfour considers this another proof of German preparation for the "great day."

J. BARLEYCORN, BAD DRIVER

His Hands Shake, His Knees Wobble and His Conscience Is More Than Half Asleep.

John Barleycorn is a bad chauffeur. His hand shakes, his knees wobble, his eyesight is poor and his conscience half asleep. And anyone who permits this reckless driver to sit at the wheel of a motor car is a menace to life.

That is why little sympathy is felt for the Baltimore man just sentenced to two years in the penitentiary because, while intoxicated, he ran down and killed a woman. And if this convict fancies himself the victim of a great injustice, he should compare his fate with that of the woman whose neck his carelessness broke.

One does not have to be intoxicated to deserve prison for reckless driving. Nor does one have to be rich, as the Baltimore man is. Indeed, the plight of this man should have an equally sobering effect upon all careless drivers, tipplers, teetotallers, plutocrats and poor.

Russia's Trade Language. Merchants doing business in Russia are advised by the Merchants' association of New York to use the Russian language in preference to the French in commercial letters to Russian correspondents. As the result of several inquiries on this matter the association a few days ago asked the advice of C. J. Medzikhovsky, commercial attaché of the Russian embassy in Washington. He stated that it would be better and more advantageous to use Russian rather than other languages, French included.

Before the beginning of the war German was more widely in use as a business language in Russia than the French language, but at present it is not advisable to use German in any correspondence with Russia. There are a number of firms in Russia with whom it is possible to correspond in the English language, and there are agencies for the translation of English into Russian at Petrograd, Warsaw and other large cities.—New York Times.

Rabbit Makes Home Run.

Though he was the first man up, two runners crossed the home plate when Jake Thielman, formerly a big leaguer, now of the St. Cloud team, lined out a hit to center field in the game with Long Prairie.

The ball, that was driven clear to the fence, hit a rabbit that was browsing in the long grass. The hare started for the diamond, touched second base, sped along the base line a few jumps ahead of Thielman, rounded third base on account of the fans on the side line and dashed across the home plate with the player hard on its heels.

"If we'd had another base to go," said Thielman, "I would have had to tell the rabbit to get out of the way and let someone run that could run."—New York World.

Each Has His Drink Dole.

One of the most singular views on drinking ever recorded occurs in a letter from Sir Henry Ingelby on August 21, 1861, printed in "Fryings Among Private Papers."

"Sir William is so ill," wrote the baronet, "one of his doctors told me yesterday there was no manner of hope. I have been taught that Jupiter allows every man who comes into the world a different proportion of drink, which, when he has dispatched, there remains nothing for him to do but to die, and that the proportion and expedition make great differences in men's ages."—London Chronicle.

No Italian Anthem.

Musicians will doubtless wish to add an Italian national anthem to their repertoire. They cannot find it. Italy has many patriotic songs, as the "Royal March" and "Garibaldi's Hymn," but no recognized national anthem, though the last-named song has almost come to the supremacy. In this respect Italy is at the same disadvantage as Turkey. After the revolution the Young Turks offered a prize for a national anthem, but so far the poet of patriotism has not come forward to claim it.

WONDER WORDS.

Wonder, Ore., Nov. 15.
Dear Brady Standard and Its Many Readers:

One of my neighbors is cutting Christmas trees—young firs. He has four or five car loads to ship to Los Angeles, Cal. A car will hold 4,000 trees. Of course the prices vary according to size of trees, ranging all the way from 25 cents to \$50. The evergreens in this country are very symmetrical in shape and very beautiful.

Well, we have had a good ground-soaking rain at last and farmers are busy sowing grain. The tops of the mountains got white with snow about two weeks ago.

Kind reader, especially the old timers and early settlers of McCulloch county, it is possible that my memory is so deceptive? I noticed in The Standard of the 5th inst, a statement that "on Nov. 3, 1874, a frost was had that killed all the cotton in the lowlands of that section of the country." Now, it happened that ye scribe moved to McCulloch county in the spring of 1877, (the next year after Hayes and Tilden ran for president), and it is my recollection that it was a veritable stock range at that time. One of my neighbors brought a few cotton seed with him from Bell county, and planted them as an experiment near where Voca is now—there was no Voca then. I remember that on the night of the 9th of June there came a frost that killed some of my corn, which was on high ground, and T. S. Wood (everybody called him Tom Wood) had a nice piece of corn on Lost Creek almost in roasting ear which was killed dead on the morning of the 10th of June.

Look up the county records and see what year McCulloch county came out from under the jurisdiction of San Saba county and was re-organized. See who was the first county officers, etc. Maybe there was a cotton gin at that early date. Maybe so! Maybe so!

Say, mister, I want to tell you it gets foggy here sometimes! A man told me he took his lantern one night to go to the spring for water and the light only penetrated the density for a radius of a few inches and he lost his way, and almost lost his lantern while feeling around for the trail. Another told me he was shingling a barn and came to the end and kept on shingling out onto the fog for a few feet and all at once he broke through and fell a distance of twenty feet and fractured his whiskers.

O. I. C. U. R. RIGHT.
Editor's Note.—The item in regard to the frost on the night of November 3, 1874, was a misstatement in a measure. The frost on that night killed cotton in the lowlands in some sections of the state, but the cotton on the upland continued green and growing until in January of the year following, the winter of 1874 having been very mild. In regard to the re-organization of McCulloch county, this took place in 1876.

EGGS SHIPPED FROM CHINA

Consignments Have Been Lighter From the Celestial Republic During the Current Year.

Shipments of eggs from China to the United States were lighter during the first quarter of 1915 than they were during the same period of 1914. The main reason given in commerce reports is the withdrawal of transpacific merchant steamers owing to the war.

Shanghai is one of the chief ports of shipment. During the first three months of the present year 410,760 dozen Chinese eggs, valued at almost \$65,000, were shipped to Pacific coast ports of the United States. The record for January, February and March, 1914, was 1,818,737 dozen, valued at more than \$300,000.

Eggs most popular for shipment are those from Brown Leghorns. No poultry farms or henneries, as understood in this country, exist in China. The eggs are obtained by buyers—similar to our hucksters—and assembled for export. They are shipped abroad fresh, dried or frozen. Northern routes are preferred, because of the saving in refrigeration.

The egg supply is most plentiful during the spring and summer. Chinese chickens are fattened on rice. The cost of production is small, labor being had for 10 cents a day. Shipments from the interior to Shanghai come by rail, river or canal, and sometimes considerable time elapses before the cargoes are ready for exportation.

The Chinese farmer generally sells his eggs at about \$4.60 a thousand, the price varying according to supply and demand. The interior transportation charges are usually defrayed by the merchant. The poorer qualities of Chinese eggs are extensively used for commercial purposes, entering into the manufacture of chemicals, the tanning of leather, etc.—Indianapolis News.

"TIPPERARY" SUNG NO MORE

Soldiers in the Trenches Now Chant "Is This Mr. Reilly?" Instead of Old Air.

Although it was first thought that the men responsible for "Tipperary" were Americans it afterward appeared that although they had both spent some time in this country they were actually of English birth. Now that song has ceased to be the chant of the British soldiers in the trenches. They have turned enthusiastically to another, which is also said to be of American origin, although an English composer has just asserted that he wrote the music more than thirty years ago.

The song heard just now wherever the Tommies are gathered together is nothing else than our old favorite, "Is This Mr. Reilly They Speak of So Highly, Is This Mr. Reilly That Keeps the Hotel?" Several months ago it became a craze with the English soldiers. In order to buy the rights for this country a song-publishing company set out to learn the source of the song.

It was written by Pat Rooney, one of the most popular of vaudeville comedians a score or more years ago. His son is now on the variety stage. Pat Rooney was an Irish impersonator and singer, who wrote "Is This Mr. Reilly?" in 1883.

Those Locomotive Orders.

An order for 400 locomotives looks big on its surface. The allies, particularly Russia, have been buying locomotives by the hundreds and many orders have been placed in this country. Americans are apt to run to the conclusion that each locomotive so ordered is of the American standard, a monster costing about \$25,000. A railroad man said recently that it would be a fairer estimate if every locomotive order placed by the allies were divided by five.

"I mean," he said, "that one big American locomotive is equal to about five of the foreign locomotives. Some of the foreign orders call for trench locomotives, little dinkies of the Coney Island type. They are just little playthings compared with our tractors. They might better be called steam trucks, but 'locomotives' sounds better."—New York Times.

Deaths on the Highways.

During the first six months of the present year there seems to have been an alarming increase in the number of deaths and accidents on the public highways. This increase is not confined to any character. For instance, the fatalities due to automobiles in New York state increased from 183 in 1914 to 241 this year. In New Jersey during the same period there were 48 deaths and this year 88. Population grows and so does the number of vehicles in use on the highways, but neither are sufficient to account for this unreasonable increase of deaths on the highways. Drivers and pedestrians both have their rights, but the observance of ordinary care on the part of the man in the vehicle and the man on foot would undoubtedly cause a big decrease in the number of avoidable deaths.—Philadelphia Inquirer.

Value of Expert Testimony.

If a man doesn't demonstrate his mental incapacity to the extent that it is observable to the judge and the jury there isn't much use to attempt to prove him crazy by expert testimony.
