WONDER WORDS.

Wonder, Ore., Jan. 22.
Editor Brady Standard:
Since I sent you "The Merchant's Dream" we have been having a great snowstorm.

I wrote to the Evening Telegram of Portland, Ore, a clipping of which I am sending to you, which will save me the trouble rewriting it.

We have had two days of partly fair weather and the snow is settling down, but it will be a long while before it is all gone, unless there comes a chinook wind and rain. In that event, there will be immense damage by floods.

The deer, pheasants and quail are having a hard time of it to find something to eat; and probably a great many will not live through it.

Five deer came in sight of my house yesterday. I have been feeding one flock of quail and a great number and variety of other birds that come to the house and barn and eat with the chickens. We feed wheat in this country. It is cheaper than corn and more plentiful.

"Wonder, Or., Jan. 18.—The recent snowfall here and west of this place has been unusually heavy, and the mail stages for Crescent City, passing here, are

having a difficult time in getting through. The snow at this place, 13 miles west of Grant's Pass, is three feet deep on a level, and on Hayes Hill, four miles farther west, it is lying seven feet deep, while on the divide, between here and Crescent City, it lies 12 to 15 feet. The stages leaving Grant's Pass, where there is little snow, load up with large quantities of mail; then, on striking the deep snow here and further west, they are compelled to leave portions of it at the small postoffices. The trip over the summit is made on snow shoes and only the most urgent mail is carried at that point. The temperature here runs from 36 degrees above in day time to 32 and a little lower at night. As a result of the high temperature the snow thaws during the day, and as the ground is not frozen under the snow, the moisture largely soaks into the ground."

Since writing the above article to the Telegram, I am informed that the mail contractor has sent dispatches to the postmaster general considering the situation and advisability of bringing the parcel post back and sending it to San Francisco on the Southern Pacific railway, and thence by water to Crescent City.

While I am at it I had as well tell you that several large barns and mills and other buildings have collapsed from the exceeding heavy weight of snow upon them. Those who took the precaution to shovel the snow off were wise. A man started to go to a mining camp a week ago today and has not been heard of since; another got lost in the storm, but was found and taken in.

Not Enough City Managers.

According to the Institute for Public Service, the supply of city managers is not equal to the demand. "The need for city managers and department managers is growing rapidly. No field offers greater opportunity for properly trained men of executive ability," says William H. Allen, director of the Institute for Public Service, in a leaflet reviewing what Gaylord C. Cummin, city manager of Jackson, Mich., has accomplished in one year.

Municipal employees were taken out of politics; \$383,000 of property formerly exempt from taxation without legal reason was returned to tax rolls. All purchasing was done thru purchasing agents. All cash discounts were taken. Sanitary inspection was made efficient for the first time.

A preliminary study was made of the inadequate sewer system and plans made for a comprehensive redesign of the whole system. A waste water

VAST, VARIED, VITAL.

Is Texas, Says Dr. A. E. Winship, Boston Editor.

The following article appears in the January 20, 1916, issue of the Journal of Education, published at Boston, Mass. The editor of this journal is Dr. A. E. Winship, and the article is from his pen. Dr. Winship was a visitor to Brady last fall, being one of the lecturers secured by County Superintendent E. L. White for the joint teachers institute held here at that time. As the article refers to Brady, as well as to Texas in general, it will be found of more than ordinary interest to our readers.

"By inheritance and tradition, historically and religiously Texas is southern. Commercially, industrially, socially and educationally Texas is northern and western. Everywhere and always Texas is extensive, but her ambitions are intensive.

"Looking backward will be fatal to Texas, looking forward she faces agricultural, industrial and commercial prosperity, limitless political and civic achievement and high social and educational influence.

"All railroads that start in Texas are headed for the North. There is sleeping and dining car service over several lines from every important city to Chicago and St. Louis, but you cannot get sleeping or dining car service from anywhere in Texas to Memphis. New Orleans is the only Southern city open to Texans by luxurious travel accommodations.

"Texas has her own gulf ports with ample harbors, and she comes nearer independence of the rest of the world than any other state.

"Cotton and rice, cattle and sheep, swine and poultry, nuts and fruits, fish and game know no limit.

"While I was waiting for a few minutes in Brady for a business man to take me in his machine to San Saba, forty miles away, he sold by telegraph \$56,000 worth of wool to my friend, Allan Emery, in Boston. This man sells a million pounds of wool in Boston each year.

"By the by, the most attractive and satisfactory week I have ever had in Texas was in the county seats of Brownwood, Santa Anna, Brady and San Saba, the four counties uniting under the magic leadership of E. L. White in a campaign never to be forgotten. It was really the best demonstration I have had of the community enterprise and professional aspiration of the rank and file of Texas educators.

"As usual the cities are the slogans of prosperity. Dallas and Fort Worth, Houston and Galveston, San Antonio and Austin are the triple twins of Texas.

"No language can convey the faintest impression of the enterprise, spirit and power of these cities to one who does not know them, and no one can know them by simply visiting them on a sight-seeing tour.

"The first time the North and the Old South awoke to a suspicion even of what is throbbing and thrilling the commercial and industrial life of Texas was when Dallas was selected as a Reserve Bank center accompanied with the fact that Houston was the only real rival in the entire Southwest.

"San Antonio yields nothing to any other Texas city in business prosperity and adds thereto rivalry of Los Angeles as a winter resort for tourists, and comes near making good her claim as to climate, scenery and hotel attractions in comfort and luxury, and Galveston challenges anything on ocean or gulf coasts when it comes to charm of beach, roll of waves, feast of fish and delight of hotel.

"El Paso plays a lone hand in the Lone Star state. The constant surprise to me is the number of prominent people in San Antonio, Austin, Houston and Galveston, Dallas and Fort Worth who have never been in El Paso. I met ten who knew Chicago and even New York to one who knew El Paso. And yet El Paso has the best high school building in Texas and will ultimately give the biggest and best cities of eastern and central Texas a lively race.

"As a Texas city El Paso can never be great. It is in the wrong corner of the state for that, but it is sure to be the Texas-Mexican-New Mexican metropolis. New Mexico has only begun to scratch the surface of its resources and El Paso will dominate a considerable part of the prosperity that has already dawned in that new state.

"And Mexico, despite its recent terrors and present nightmares, is to be a marvelously successful country with wealth-producing powers beyond even one's most venturesome dreams and El Paso will be the chief American beneficiary. When it comes to possibilities remember El Paso.

"Three \$5000 superintendencies in public schools are only suggestive of the way they do things in Texas.

"This is not intended as an educational portraiture of the state because I promise myself a better opportunity to know her educational institutions, but I cannot pass without comment, the State Agricultural and Mechanical College at Bryan, which has already fully recovered from the misfortune of ancient politics and is growing like a boom town in number of students, has an equipment that is worthy any state, has agricultural demonstrations that attract the attention of Manhattan, Ames and Corvallis. This college is second in the amount of

 The largest diamond drill core ever cut has just been presented to Lehigh university. It was cut in the Marcy vein, at the Maltby colliery, Scranton. The specimen is a core of an 11-inch diamond drill and the core is 10 inches in diameter. The object of the drilling was to drain some old workings at the Maltby colliery. A barrier of 183 feet had to be penetrated before the water, which had a head of 176 feet, could be tapped. The core shows the middle rock of the Marcy vein.

COUNCIL MEETING.
 Regular Session Held Tuesday Night.

The city council met in regular session Tuesday night, and several matters came up for discussion.

E. B. Ramsay came before the council to state his position in the matter of a contract between himself and the city for remodeling the firemen's quarters at the fire station. The contract was awarded to Mr. Ramsay last fall, the city agreeing to pay the bill January 1st, provided same was approved by a committee from the fire department which had been appointed by the council to supervise the work. On completion of the work a dispute arose between Mr. Ramsay and the committee as to the ownership of some material left over and the committee refuses to approve the bill until the material is returned by Mr. Ramsay and the council takes the position that, under the terms of the signed contract, they cannot pay the bill until it has been approved by the committee. Mr. Ramsay offered to arbitrate the matter, but the council refused to agree to this for the reasons stated above and the matter was passed over for future action.

A request from the fire department that its members in good standing be exempted from the payment of city poll taxes was taken under advisement by the council.

City Secretary J. C. McShan's monthly report was presented, showing the following condition of city finances:
 General fund, O. D. \$1721.19
 Street fund, O. D. 51.89
 Sanitary fund 64.78
 Bond fund 7503.74
 Waterworks Sinking 5727.97

An order was passed by the council instructing the finance committee to renew lease on the quarters occupied by the city for offices of the council and the water and light department for a period of six months, with the privilege of a still further extension.

The city secretary was instructed to draw warrant in favor of the county for \$400 in payment for a span of mules purchased by the street committee.
 An order was passed by the council instructing the city at-

torney to proceed at once to force collection of delinquent city taxes.
 No other business coming before the meeting, council adjourned sine die.

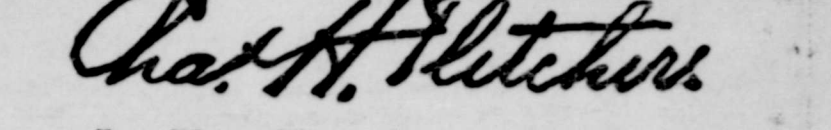

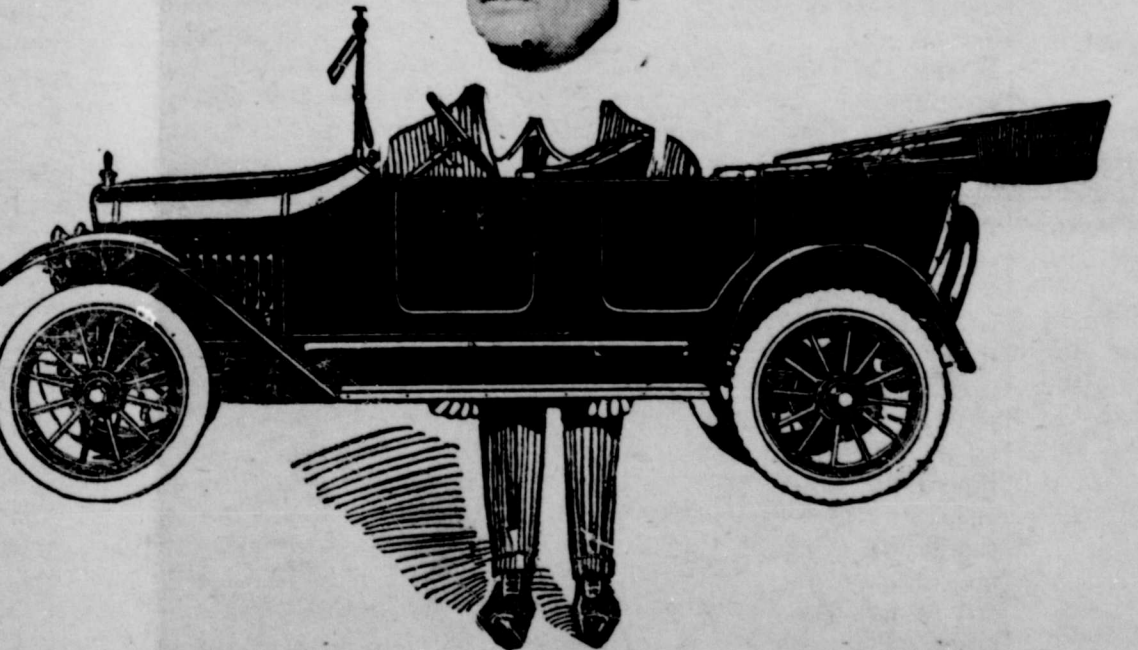

McCULLOCH COUNTY POULTRY EXHIBIT LAST WEEK.

T. J. Conway, Professor of Animal Husbandry of A. & M. College, Makes Awards.

No poultry exhibit could have passed off more smoothly than did the McCulloch County Poultry exhibit held last week under the auspices of the Y. M. B. L. of Brady. There was genuine enthusiasm displayed by the exhibitors; the premium list was among the best ever offered, and the judging of birds and awarding of premiums was in the hands of T. J. Conway, professor of Animal Husbandry of A. & M. college, assuring fair and impartial awarding of prizes. Consequently there was expressed satisfaction over the conduct of the exhibit throughout.

As a matter of fact, so enthusiastic were the visitors from neighboring counties of the exhibit at Brady that invitations were extended Col. Jack McGaughy, Commercial Secretary D. W. Rowlett and other local and county poultry enthusiasts to come to Mason and assist in arranging a poultry exhibit patterned after the McCulloch show.

In speaking of the McCulloch County Poultry association in our last issue, The Standard made mention of the address of Col. Jack McGaughy, and gave a brief resume of his speech. It seems The Standard did not quote Mr. McGaughy's address quite liberally enough, and thereby laid that gentleman open to the criticism of boosting Brown county. As a matter of fact, Mr. McGaughy has been a consistent booster of McCulloch county upon all occasions, not only in the matter of poultry raising, but in boosting for better livestock, hog clubs, baby beef clubs, and the like. Not only did Mr. McGaughy give statistics of the growth of the poultry industry in Brown county, but in McCulloch county as well. For instance, he directed attention to the fact that some five years ago the average McCulloch county hen weighed 2½ pounds, whereas today the average weight is 4 to 4½ pounds. Turkeys that five years ago averaged 6 to 8 pounds, today average 12 to 18 pounds. The export turkeys from McCulloch county five years ago totaled \$3,000, as compared with \$35,000 last year. These, and many more facts were contained in Mr. McGaughy's address. The Standard has printed these figures upon several occasions, and for this reason it was not deemed necessary to mention them Tuesday in connection with the address referred to.
